better electric service to the islands and letters had been received from Senator Spessard Holland and Congressman James Haley who are both contacting R.E.A. on our behalf.


Bob Dormer presented a resume covering efforts of the board of directors toward bringing a doctor to the Islands.





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CANOE TRIP ON THE SANIBEL RIVER

"Happenings" are where you find or make them whether it be on Sanibel or Timbuctu. Recently two Sanibel residents went on an adventure right here at home and came away richer for the experience and with a real story to tell. Mrs. Forrest (Julie) Miller of Dinkens Bayou and Mrs. Morrison (Kay) Casparis, of Blind Pass Cottages rented a canoe for a tour of the Sanibel River, a trip that had held a fascination for them both for several years. Being relative newcomers to the island they asked Jeanne Hopwood to go along as guide to help identify all they hoped to see of the natural flora and fauna of the area. All three were completely delighted with the abundance of birds and wildlife they encountered. Blue Herons, Black and Yellow Crowned Night Herons, Snowy Egrets, Gallinules, nesting Anhingas and a Florida Banded Water snake, quite harmless, coiled around a branch of mangrove peacefully sunning himself. Everywhere they were close enough to reach out and touch these creatures of the wild.

They were so enthused about their adventure that Julie went right home and wrote their experiences into story form and asked Jeanne to illustrate the most telling incidents which they sent off to the Florida Naturalist, the publication of the Florida Audubon Society. If you have seen this July issue of the Naturalist you will be able to enjoy that same trip throught Julie's words and Jeanne's pen starting on page 126.

But if you are of a more venturesome spirit you can rent a canoe for yourself and drift leisurely on the Sanibel River to your own rendezvous with nature and can reach out to touch the natural beauties hidden off the normal tourists lanes. 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

All adults as well as children should keep their immunizations up to date. Tetanus and smallpox immunizations should be renewed at least every ten (10) years and a booster at time of any traumatic injury. Also, under Florida law, ALL persons handling food and beverage are required to carry an active Health Card. These services, rendered by the Lee County Health Department, FREE, are available at the Sanibel Community House on the third Tuesday of each month. You are urged to make use of these services.
