

Here we built and are managing our motel. In the short six months that the motel has been opened we discovered that there are many other people who feel as we do about Sanibel. This is to be expected from its residents, but what has amazed us is the strong feeling of motel guests, coming from all the states,

Well to do couples from all along Florida's east and west coast, who have the where-withall to pay for gracious living come to Sanibel to get away from the high rise buildings, the city atmosphere and the commercialism of the other beaches. They all say, "Don't let them take away the charm of the island; don't let them do here that which is happening to all other places." If the people who are in the upper bracket of nice living feel the need for what Sanibel offers, what about the families who spend their time amidst the concrete walls of a city? If they wish a vacation such as Sanibel can give, very soon the only places open to them will be the Sate or National parks.

For the people who feel the need of life in a high rise apartment there are many places to welcome them. To the south of Sanibel there are undeveloped islands; why not make high rise apartments there the rule? The people who are buying land for homes on Sanibel have chosen the island because of its difference, why must high rise buildings be imposed on Sanibel in the name of progress?





Sanibel and Captiva Islands and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation received nation-wide publicity in a recent issue of "The Nature Conservancy News," a periodical published by The Nature Conservancy, Washington, D.C.

In an article by Terry Blunt, who had toured the West Coast of Florida inspecting conservation projects and future proposals for such projects, the Sanibel-Captiva conservation project was given a most favorable review by Mr. Blunt.

Following is an excerpt from the article: "Off the coast of Lee

County, at the mouth of the Caloosahatchee, lie Sanibel and Captiva Islands, famed for the wealth of seashells that once washed onto their beaches. Sanibel Island is fortunate in having a dedicated group of conservationists who, after helping to put together the 'Ding' Darling Sanctuary for the Fish and Wildlife Service a few years ago, have followed up eagerly with other projects. Calling themselves the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, the citizens group is closely allied with The Nature Conservancy.

"Funds are now being raised for two major purchases on Sanibel. Running nearly the length of the Island is a unique fresh water slough known alternatively as Sanibel River or Sanibel Slough. A core 138-acre section of this slough, the most strategic tract, will, unless it soon finds protection inevitably will be drained and filled. The Foundation is immediately concerned with the purchase of this tract as a key to the entire slough.

"On Pine Island Sound, an area of approximately 22 acres with a thousand feet of frontage on the sound is also being purchased. This area, protecting the tidal areas, is intended as a supplement to the slough and will be the site of the Foundation's marine laboratory being planned in cooperation with Florida Atlantic University.

"The total plan for Sanibel-Captiva is extraordinarily well founded and when completed might serve as a model for other communities blessed with unspoiled natural areas.

"A recent gift to the Conservancy is the Akers Reservation, a $12 \frac{1}{2}$ -acre tract donated by Admiral and Mrs. E.G. Konrad. Although at some distance from the core area now being purchased, it is part of Sanibel Slough and will hopefully at some future time be linked with the other tracts to form one preserve.

"There is only one way to appreciate the Akers Reservation and that is to see it by canoe, through the criss-crossing channels. In order that the area may remain wild, visitors are now discouraged unless on scientific business.

"The anhinga, an unlikely bird, roams beneath the surface, prying for food into any vegetation that looks promising. When he comes up for air, his long, slim neck and head seem completely reptilian. Others stand in the branches above, their wings hung out to dry, for, though one would imagine that on a bird so aquatic in habit, water-proofing would be standard equipment, it is not.

is not. "As we come upon them around a corner, half a dozen puddle ducks rise and vanish before we can identify them. The herons that seem to be everywhere in Florida are here as well --great blues, little blues, greens -- and, of course, the egrets, the kingfishers, and the kestrels.

"Of all the Florida birds, it is not a waterfowl but a bird of the sky that seems most ubiquitous, the beautiful little kestrel. At least this was so in January. Few creatures are a greater treat to the eye than this graceful, handsome, spirited little hawk. His strong wing beats, his hovering, his diving, his splen-did maneuvers - - all mark him instantly and he seems to be everywhere. The wonder is that he survives in such numbers when so many of his fellows vanishing. Possibly the mice grasshoppers and sparrows that sustain him are less poisoned with DDT than is the larger prey of the peregrine or the merlin.

"There are alligators in the Konrads' tract, and we noted three young ones, less than two feet long, and one very large and very black adult swimming ahead of our canoe, very fast. She swung around a corner and vanished, though no doubt we remained under her surveillance."

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The sheepshead, according Homosassa Springs' Ray Randall, is probably one of the best known of the sport fish caught along coastal fishing grounds in Fla.
