YOU ASKED FOR IT

The residents of Sanibel and Captiva are determined to secure approval on certain zoning restrictions for the island. In the event they do not receive satisfaction, there are growing threats of reprisals, including the possibility of secession from the Union.

"After all," one resident commented, "England is an island and it has its independence. Why shouldn't we?"

However, the secession plans are being formulated in utmost secrecy. Usually voluble sources have proved most uncommunicative. But all of

the evidence points to a seething unrest that could lead to a revolt.

On a recent visit to Bailey's General Store, we overheard a lady asking for the Minute Maid -- clearly a Florida euphemism for Minuteman. Although we have found no hard evidence that arms are being cached on the island, we have heard enough to convince us that there is an ample supply of shells. There is even public discussion of circulating a petition to island residents, presumably to determine if it is not high time to rise up.

There are already growing indications of nationalism on both Sanibel and Captiva. Signs are appearing with the injunction to "Keep our Island Clean ' -- no doubt a subtle jibe at the main-landers and certain to fur-

BRIDGE DELAY

The delay in the completion of the bridge on Periwinkle Way near Causeway Road is beginning to cause considerable concern among residents of Sanibel. There seems to be less interest on Captiva, where they are said to have their own problems.

There has even been some speculation that the delay is caused by a deliberate slow-down inspired by the Miami Chamber of Commerce or other hostile elements, but in the opinion of this column such speculation is unwarranted. We even doubt that the delay is deliberate hecause after repeated visits to the construction site, we couldn't find a

soul deliberating. Informed circles in Key Biscayne, the nation's weekend capital, also report that President Nixon has not been involved directly in the bridge construction. But one skeptic pointed out that the same denial was issued by the White House during the Green Beret case. This veteran President-watcher speculated that Nixon was annoyed because the bridge was not dedicated to him.

After all, this V-P-W pointed out, "Hoover has his dam, Pulaski has a skyway, and Lincoln has a tunnel. Why shouldn't Nixon have a little bridge on Sanibel?" His story sounded pretty good, but it was hard to believe that the President of the United States would sabotage our


On a return visit to the construction site we thought we saw someone actually working on the bridge. But it turned out to be a peliican fishing in the canal. Since there isn't any water in the canal, because there isn't a bridge for it to go under, the pelican didn't seem to be making much progress either.


We decided to check with a construction expert. He waved a finger in our face and said: "Rome was not built in a day." We wanted to reply that this little Sanibel bridge was not exactly the Ponte Vecchio, but then we remembered that that bridge is in Florence rather than Rome. So we were left speechless.

But that led us to wonder how long it would have taken a few good Roman workmen to complete a bridge. We found that the first Roman bridge of record was built in 621 B.C. across the Tiber in less time than it now takes to just get approval from the zoning board. And that old wooden bridge lasted 900 years! A few years later, about 219 B.C. the Romans built one out of hewn stone at Martorell, and it is still in good shape. But after Rome fell it appears that bridge building sort of went to pot. They just didn't build them like they used to and took longer doing it. We found, for example, that it took about fourteen years just to build the Brooklyn bridge.

All of this research led us to the conslusion that our little Sanibel bridge is coming along just fine. After all, Rome was not built in a day! And why not -- Nixon Bridge? In the meantime: "Don't cross the bridge

till you come to it, is a proverb old, and of excellent wit.





THEISLAND CHEF

FISH MULLIGAN As Prepared by Fred Bunnell

1 lb, any firm lean fish 4 large potatoes 2 large onions 6 cups hot water 1/3 cup uncooked rice 2 green peppers, diced

1/3 cup diced bacon or salt pork 2 tablespoons minced parsley dry bread

corn or peas (leftovers) salt and pepper

Cut fish into chunks, slice potatoes and onions 1/2 inch thick. Place in a kettle, add water and bring to a boil. Add rice, green pepper, bacon or salt pork. Simmer about 30 minutes or until tender. Add parsley and three or four slices of dry bread. Leftover vegetables, such as corn or peas may be added. Season to your taste. Bring to a boiling point only, then serve. Will do for 6 adults.

DIVISION OF HEALTH NEWS

That old refrigerator you put to one side when you bought that new model may be a death trap for some unsuspecting child, according to the Division of Health (formerly the State Board of

Two children -- a five-yearold boy in Polk County and a three year old girl in Lake County -have already died this year in refrigerators and ice boxes. 14 other children have perished in this manner since 1961 -- the year the health agency started keeping this type of statistical

records. Exploration and concealment are normal activities for children two to five years of age, according to the Division of Health. It is a part of their growing pattern. An empty refrigerator appeals to children as a "good hiding place," "playhouse," and excellent "jail" because it is

difficult to escape from.

If a child becomes trapped in one and is not released within 10 to 15 minutes he faces almost certain death. The old-fashioned appliance with the mechanicaltype, latch lock is the most dangerous type.

Many communities have local laws requiring that the doors of abandoned refrigerators be removed and that the appliances be disposed of in a safe manner. Manufacturers also cooperate with safety councils and public health programs by urging the purchasers of new refrigerators to properly dispose of old ones.

If you plan to abandon, discard, or junk a refrigerator, the Division of Health urges that the appliance be carted away or destroved. It recommends removal of the doors, or that the door be fastened so that it cannot be open-






