BONDS FOR SANIBEL ARE DROPPING BRIDGE

The price of bonds for the Sanibel Bridge dropped to a record low last week, with repurchase by Lee County of 58 of them at \$82 on the hundred.

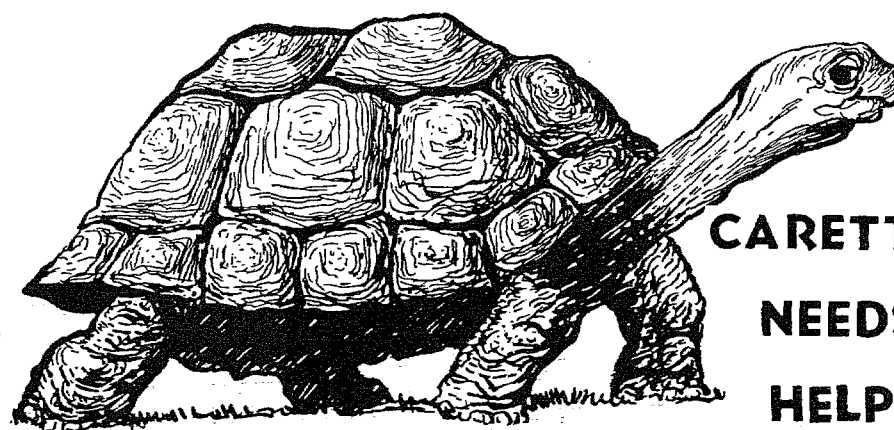
The face value of the bonds is \$1,000 each, maturing at \$1,050 and paying an annual interest of 4.375 percent. The price paid through a New York broker represents a \$2 drop on the index price, which was \$84 for the previous bonds repurchased.

The purchase of \$47,560 from the bond redemption account represents a savings of \$13,340 over the \$60,900 maturity price for the bonds, or about 4,446 crossings at \$3 per trip by passenger cars on the toll bridge.

A reduced toll is now available to those who wish to buy books of 10 tickets at \$2 per ticket or \$20 per book. Dick Schmidt, comptroller to the County Commission, said, that between Oct. 1, at the start of the sale, and Oct. 15 some 293 books had been sold for \$5,860. During the same period 1,464 of the 2,930 tickets had been used.

Last year the bond price cuts were started by Commissioner Bruce J. Scott. Scott argued with the Board to have them undercut an offer. He

**CARETTA
NEEDS
HELP**

Many visitors to Sanibel and Captiva Islands often ask what or where can one go to find something of interest here on the Islands? Well, how about the Caretta Research? This is carried on under the guiding eye of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc.

Marine turtle studies on Sanibel and Captiva began in May 1959. Countless hours, sleepless nights, frustration and fatigue were finally overcome by pure persistence. Finally through the efforts of Charles R. LeBuff, Jr., Clifford Grimard and the LeBuff children, Leslie and Chuck, much of this was accomplished.

Work in earnest on Caretta began in early 1969. The project or "Turtle Farm" site is located on the shore of Tarpon Bay. Mr. & Mrs. Jim McGuire, operators of Tarpon Bay Marina and the Red Pelican Shop furnish the land, the electric power to operate the pump, freezer and grinder which are all essential to the diet preparation.

The first eggs were collected on May 21, hatched July 17 and there have been many more since then. They were hatched at the hatchery on Point Ybel. About three thousand eggs were hatched and taken to the Turtle Farm. Those assisting in this operation go to Pine Island to get fish, bring it back, grind and freeze it. About four hundred pounds per week is needed to feed these hungry turtles every other day.

If you have any fish you don't know what to do with, please do not throw them away. Take them to the farm and they will be used. The project had to release about 1,000 smaller turtles to make room for the 2,000 larger ones. These will be released in June 1970 and all are invited to the release celebration.


The Foundation hopes to make room for more turtles in the near future by adding larger tanks, etc. But this takes money. Although the Foundation has about 100 members, not all are from Sanibel-Captiva.

A sponsorship is necessary. A \$25.00 co-sponsorship or less than \$25.00 gifts are accepted. These are payable to Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation Inc. Help is needed if they are to bring these turtles back from their rapid approach to extinction.

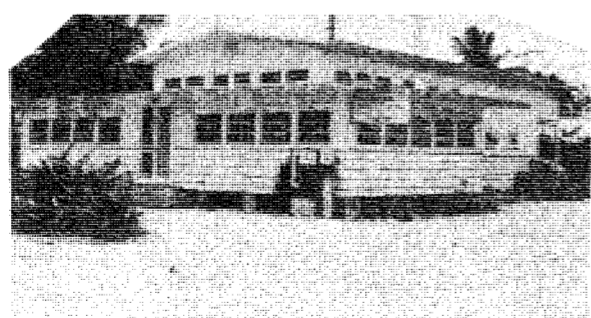

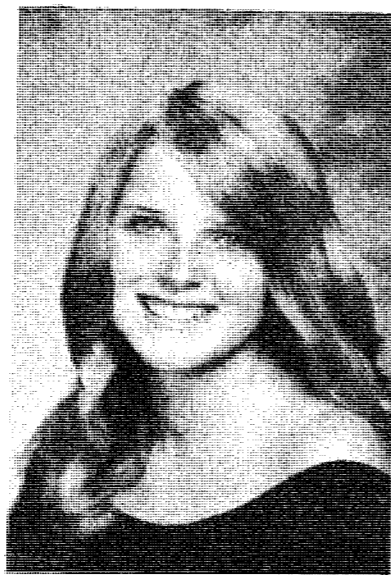

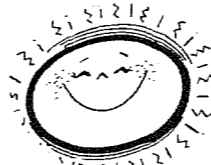


WHO'S WHO AND WHY

There is still time to qualify. Price range --- \$35,500 to \$49,500.

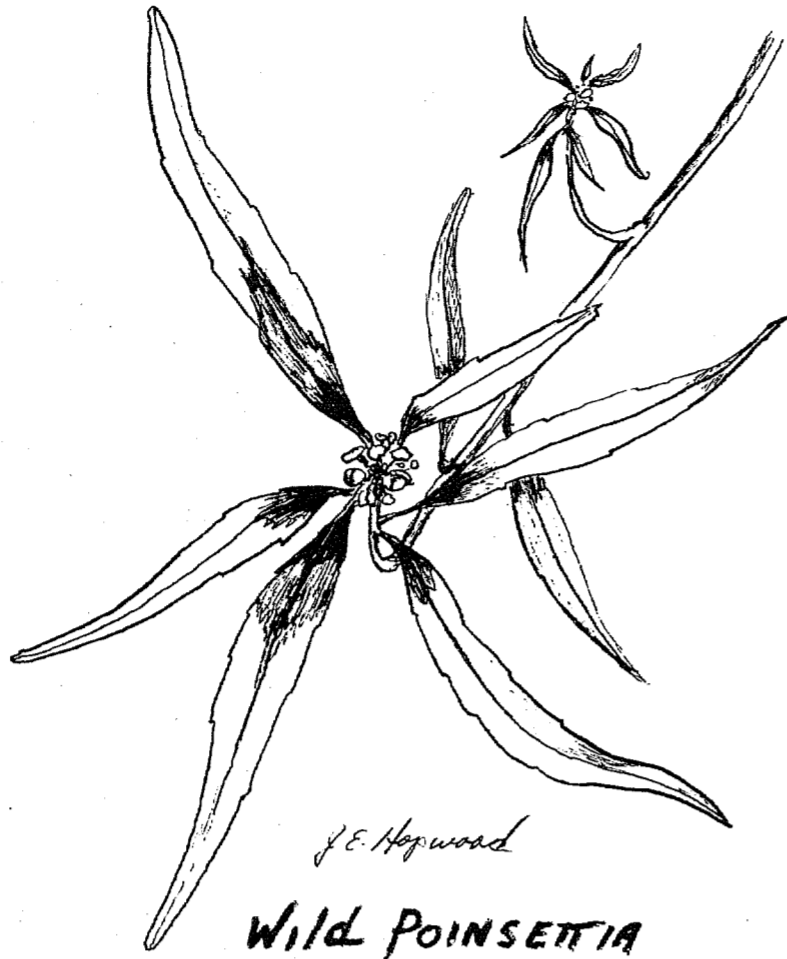
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THE LITTLE HYPOCRITE

No flowering shrub is more spectacular or more beloved than *euphorbia pulcherrima*, the Christmas flower that everybody knows. That the poinsettia has a country cousin, a slender-stalked, many-branched wild flower of delicate design is one of the happy surprises for the Sanibel newcomer. Its name, hypocrite poinsettia *pinetorum*, is a giveaway to its sly characteristic, because it just isn't what it seems to be, even as a hypocrite in human form.

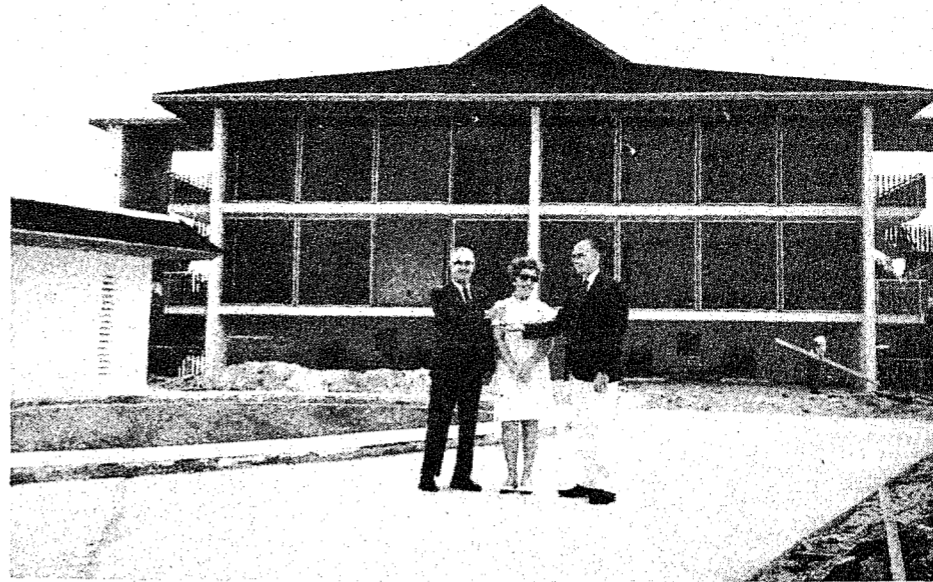
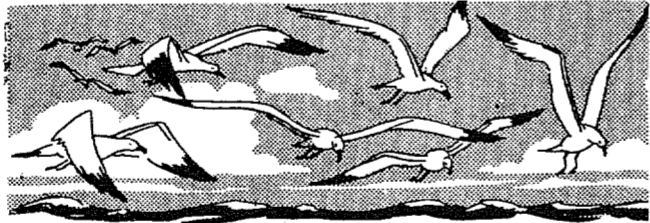
Its long, very narrow green leaves expose tiny poinsettia-like flowers, miniatures of our Christmas plant. But they are not flowers at all, they are simply splashes of red at the stem end of the green leaves, almost as

if pasted on purposely to deceive the eye of the passer-by.

The actual flowers are inconspicuous yellow flowerets coming from a cluster of small green buttons, each not much bigger than a pinhead. Modest they are indeed, but parents of future little hypocrites.

These slim and engaging plants grow to 36 inches high, in pinelands (hence *pinetorum*), along roadsides, in among other flowers like the periwinkle where their little red lights twinkle like tiny Christmas decorations. They are not plentiful, they are not easy to locate even when they may be close by, but they are worth the search.

Keep a watchful eye and when you see them your reward will be the sight of one more of Sanibel's treasures.

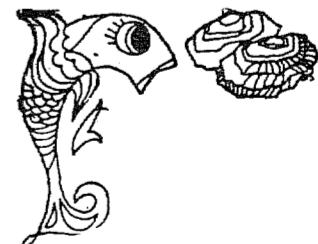
CRAB MEAT IN SHELLS

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup flour
Few grains cayene
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
3 cups milk
1/2 lb. crab meat
1/2 cup minced parsley
4 hard cooked eggs, chopped
1/2 cup buttered crumbs
Melt butter; blend in flour and seasonings. Add milk and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Flake crab meat, be sure no spines, add to parsley and eggs. Place in buttered shells and top with buttered crumbs. Brown in moderate oven (375 F) about 10 minutes. Serves 8.

Mrs. P. McIntosh suggests this desert to go with them.
1 pkg lemon jello
1 med. can pineapple (crushed)
1/2 cup sugar
1 tall can milk
3/4 pkg. Phila. cream cheese
1 jar Maraschino cherries
1 cup finely chopped nuts

Cook crushed pineapple with 1/2 cup sugar for five minutes and add pkg. of jello, then let it cool. Whip can of milk fairly stiff, add cream cheese then the jello mixture. Put in 9 x 13 pan, sprinkle on nutmeats and place cherries about two inches apart. Chill for 4 to 6 hours.

Your crab in shells, spiced tea and this desert makes a fine Island meal.

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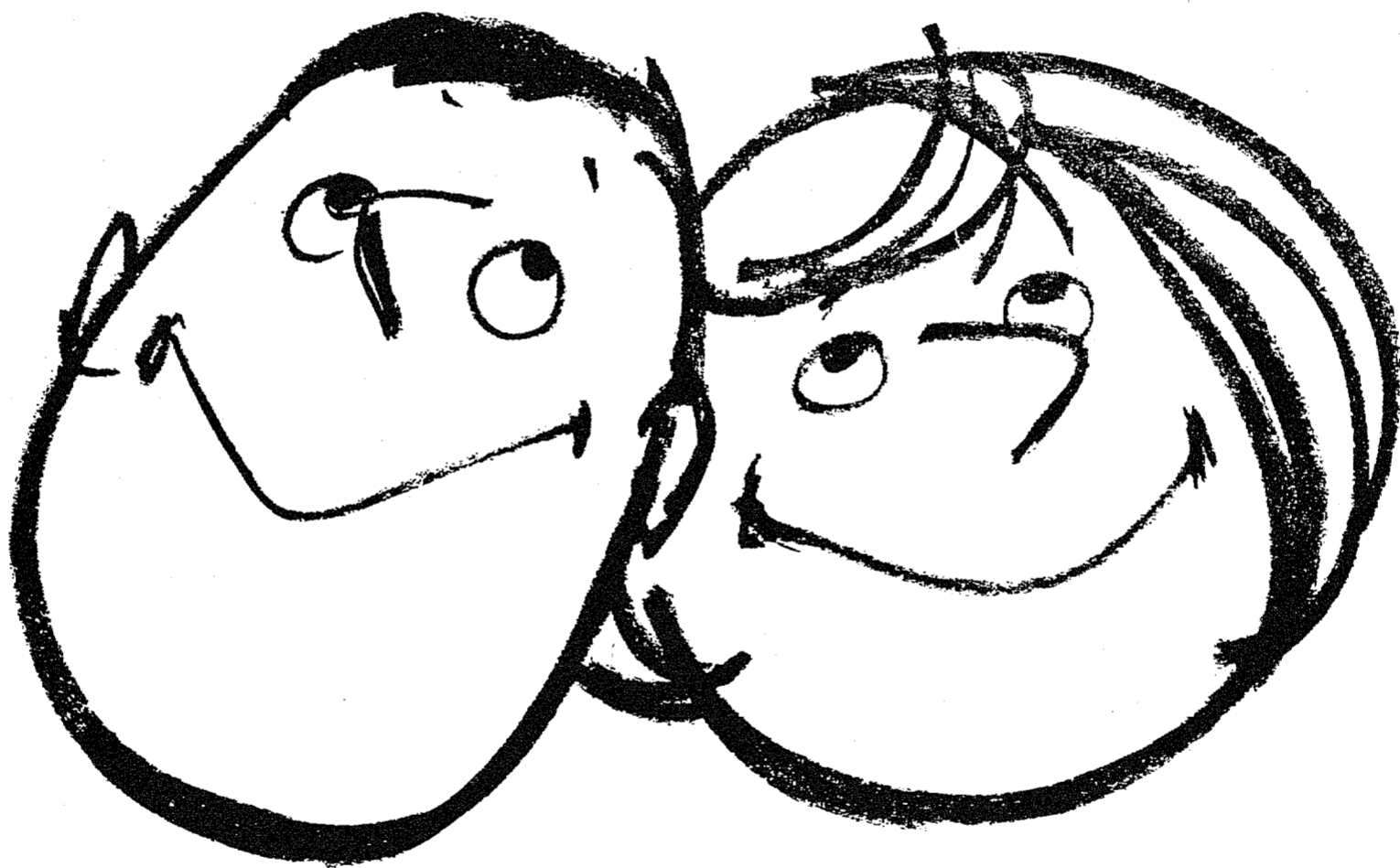
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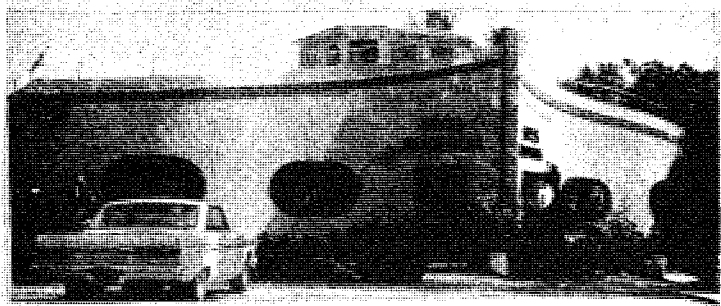
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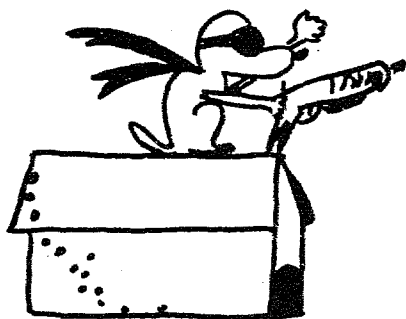
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
