LEMON BREAD
(Local Lemons of Course)
by Mrs. Hervey Roberts

1/3 cup melted butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs unbeaten
1 1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup whole milk
Grated rind of one lemon
3 tbsp. lemon concentrate
1/2 cup ground almonds, unsalted
and blanched

Mix the sugar with the melted
butter, beat in the eggs. Mix and
sift all dry ingredients together.
Add alternately with the milk and
beat just enough to blend. Fold in
the grated lemon rind and the
ground almonds. Bake in 350 de-
gree oven, in pound cake size pan
for 50 minutes. While still hot
drip the juice of one lemon in 1/2
cup of sugar over the top. You may
use frozen concentrate here.

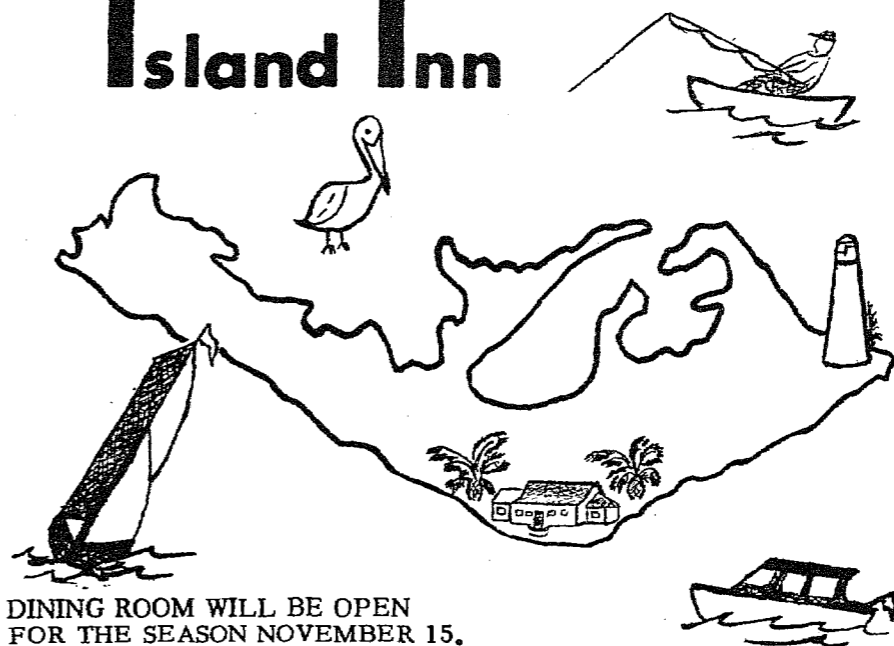

"That's just the point. How would you like to be lumped together with the Hairy-Nosed Wombat and the Short-Tailed Albatross?"

There was one point on which Chelon Caretta and all of his associates agreed: the Caretta family has received lousy publicity except on Sanibel. Again Chelon acted as the spokesman: "Mister," he pleaded, "can't you do something to get us a better image. Something like Melville did for the White Whale or what Steinbeck did for mice and men. We never get any good literary treatment."

Chelon was so plaintive we tried to reassure him. "What about 'The Tortoise and The Hare'," we said, but we were sorry the minute we said it. Chelon abruptly reminded us that "slow and steady" may have been all right in Aesop's time but that it doesn't win any medals in the 20th century.

"By the way," Chelon threw out as we were sneaking away, "When are you fellows going to stop discriminating and let a Caretta have a shot at the Presidency?"

It was then we realized that Emerson was right; "All thoughts of a turtle are turtles, and of a rabbit, rabbits."

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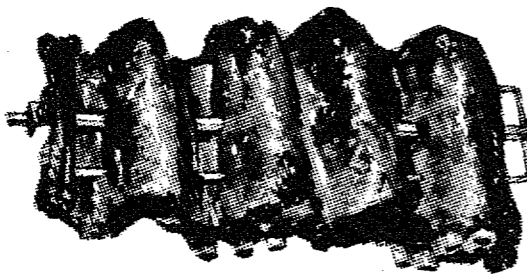
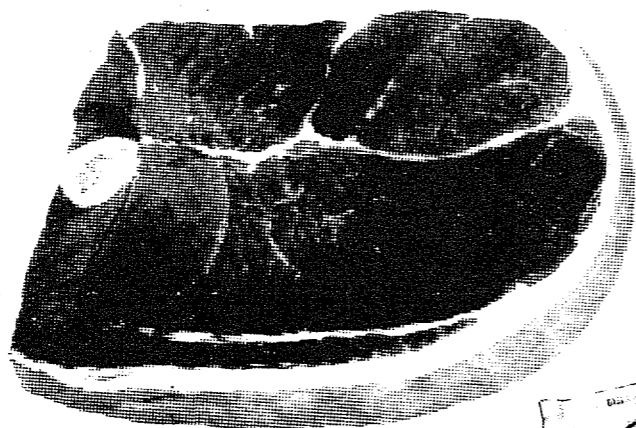

MOCKER, THE MINSTREL by Julie Miller

Are you listening? There are lots of sounds: a shrill whistle from a telephone wire, soft and burbling notes from a coconut palm, a rollicking string of musical pearls chirruping again and again from a sea grape tree, and all this interrupted by screams, chucks, peeps, catcalls, grace notes and trills. You don't have to see him to recognize our aptly-named friend, the Mockingbird.

Like Gilbert and Sullivan's wandering minstrel, he has a tune for every occasion -- gay, gentle, ribald, sentimental, and he can sing up a storm arguing with another mocker over property rights. He mimics other species with startling accuracy; one famous mocker was proved to imitate more than thirty different birds -- and he can sing all day and half a moonlit night, and never weary.

Mimus polyglottos, 'mimic of

many tongues,' is our state bird since 1927, chosen by the school children of Florida. Protected by law at all times, he knows it and is completely and fearlessly at home everywhere. Here on Sanibel he is abundant and non-migratory and you probably have his family living it up in your yard.

So rare a musician as to be called 'the most beautiful avian songster in America' by eminent ornithologists, he is also a handsomely - proportioned arrangement in gray and white, smartly tailored and stunning. His long and flashing tail is cleverly designed to catch your eye as he flicks it up and down, patrolling his bailiwick (and yours) qualifying as gardener's friend by filling himself on insect pests while filling the air with melody.

Our Sanibel minstrel is a happy embellishment to life on this lovely island, a feathered troubadour to be cherished.
