

vising that the bridge would be open in about a week.


Jean Culpepper, chairman for the 1970 brochure, brought a sample copy and reported that the brochures are en route and will be in for distribution in the immediate future.







ISLAND CHEF

LEMON BREAD (Local Lemons of Course) by Mrs. Hervey Roberts

1/3 cup melted butter

- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs unbeaten
- 1 1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt

1/2 cup whole milk

Grated rind of one lemon

3 tbsp. lemon concentrate 1/2 cup ground almonds, unsalted and blanched

Mix the sugar with the melted butter, beat in the eggs. Mix and sift all dry ingredients together. Add alternately with the milk and beat just enough to blend. Fold in the grated lemon rind and the ground almonds. Bake in 350 degree oven, in pound cake size pan for 50 minutes. While still hot drip the juice of one lemon in 1/2 cup of sugar over the top. You may use frozen concentrate here.



So we decided to go right to the source. We would interview the turtles.


