AUDUBON LEADERS MEET

Back from Palm Beach, where he attended the Florida Audubon Society's Fall Leaders Conference, Mario Hutton reports that the event was among the most significant and constructive of its kind held to date. The near 200 participants exchanged views and reached agreement on strategy to follow in order to better achieve the goals held essential in the fields of conservation and wildlife protection. Diversified topics were discussed, such as endangered species, dangerous pesticides, status of the cross Florida Barge Canal, aquatic preserves, and the menace to the Everglades posed by the intended jetport. Several Florida senators and representatives participated in the work of some of the Committees, so that a better understanding on many problems was established with members of the State Legislature.

Mario Hutton was invited to show some of his latest "photo-verse" features at the coming annual Convention of the Florida Audubon, to be held at Cocoa from Jan. 29 to Feb. 1. This is the fifth time that he has

presented a program at Florida Audubon gatherings.

Land is Our Land." Everyone joined in the singing.



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

In lieu of flowers the family requested that contributions be made to the Sanibel Conservation Foundation, Inc.



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


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




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WHO'S WHO AND WHY





CRAB-BURGERS From the kitchen of Julia Miller

2 cups Crab Meat (Sanibel Blue Crabs, of course) 1 cup Bread Crumbs 1/2 cup milk 2 tbsp. chopped parsley eggs, beater

Mix well, form into burgersize patties, fry gently in butter. Serve on toasted hamburger buns with tarter sauce. This amount will make six large patties.

This recipe is an adaptation of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Crab Patties, from her cookbook and is a pleasant island change from the universal hamburger.






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LEE COUNTY FREIGHT AND TRAFFIC BUREAU IN ACTION

The Lee County Freight and Traffic Bureau has been very active during the past several weeks. In addition to investigating a number of local claims for loss or damage, your Bureau, along with others, has been successful in defeating an effort by truck lines to impose a "Delivery Charge" on shipments of under 1,000 pounds. A recent effort by one truck line to add an "Arbitrary Charge" of \$1.50 on all shipments of under 1,000 pounds was protested by your Bureau and withdrawn before the Interstate Commerce Commission ruled on it.

Freight forwarders and railroads now limit their liability on concealed damage claims to 50% of the net loss. Mr. Dwight Green of the Bureau said, "To circum-vent problems, I would strongly reommend that any shipments received be carefully inspected, and where cartons or containers appear to have received rough treatment that they be opened for inspection in the presence of the driver with any damage notated on the freight bill. Even though the regulations limit the liability, court procedure is still available where it is felt that a good case can be made."

Two announcements of local importance have been made by the Bureau. Pony Express has been granted temporary authority for movement of packages up to 125 lbs, and shipments up to 500 lbs. in Lee and several other Southwest Florida Counties, and interstate railroads will increase their rates by 6% effective Nov. 18, 1969.

If you need information concerning your traffic problems, such as freight rates, routings, export procedures, damage or overcharge, it is available free of charge from your Freight and Traffic Bureau at the Chamber of Commerce Office.

CURBHOLIDAY DEATHS WITH TOTAL EFFORT

Only a total effort can keep this year's Thanksgiving holiday from following in the bloody footsteps of last year's near record the Florida Highway Patrol said today.

The Patrol made the call for an all out effort by the motoring public as they predicted 37 people would die in traffic accidents across the state during the 102hour holiday period.

Colonel Reid Clifton, Director of the Patrol said, "Atotal effort is the only way we can stop the deaths. A total effort by law enforcement, judges, safety organizations and drivers can help prevent highway slaughter, but without driver support safety campaigns cannot be successful."

Clifton said the Patrol will have all troopers and auxiliary personnel patrolling during peak traffic hours. They will be using unmarked cars, radar, VASCAR, and aircraft to apprehend law breakers and will be receiving assistance from Conservation and Wildlife Officers.

The holiday period begins at 6 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 26 and

ends midnight, Sunday, Nov. 30. Last year 46 people were killed in a similar 102-hour Thanksgiving holiday. That death rate, one every 2.4 hours, is the second highest holiday toll on record.

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TOLL TAKE RISES

The Sanibel Bridge took in \$648,097 in tolls last fiscal year, ending Sept. 30, an increase of 29.8%, Bruce J. Scott, bridge committee chairman, reported. Fourth quarter income was \$150,000, up from \$116,000 of the year before, and first quarter earning for the present year are projected at nearly \$158,000, even with reduced toll tickets.

Letter To The Editor

To The Islander:

It was with great interest that I read Mr. Christensen's letter in last week's Islander.

However, he was incorrect on one item --- namely, that dealing with a wendletrap, which he in-terpreted as "wentletrap." While wentletraps are not news, wendeltraps are.

It is a wooden slatted struct-ure stamped "wendeltrap" and was designed in the last century by the R. J. Ward Company of Hoboken, New Jersey, to trap the sea creature wendel in. The rea-

Incidently, the never finds a wendle in the sea is because the traps were so efficient, the wendle (a nasty creature which fed on junonias and lavender olives exclusively) is now extinct.
