#### LIGHTS BANNED TO AID TURTLES

The Lee County Commission heard a request from Caretta Research Inc. that lights be banned on Turners Beach from May 15 to Aug. 15 each year.

The research organization is investigating the biological characteristics of the loggerhead turles and is seeking a way to prevent their extinction. The request outlined the need for remote areas where the turtles may come ashore each summer to nest. The turtles eggs, as well as newly hatched turtles, are the target of many predators. The female will not come ashore where lights are displayed. The Commissioners decided to study the situation and set a hearing for Dec. 3. Commissioner P. A. Geraci wanted to be certain no precedents were being established which might deny the beach on the southern end of Captiva to human beings entirely. On Dec. 3 the Commissioner passed the request.



#### DR. HABER'S OFFICE NOW OPEN

Dr. Mordecai Haber's office at Box 673 Gulf Drive, telephone number 472-4333, is now open. Thanks to the good efforts of the builder, Ralph Cimato and the sub-contractors whose aid he enlisted. Dr. Haber has purchased the H. C. Perry residence on Gulf Drive and has both his office and home there in the old, "Webb House."

Dr. Haber's background may be of some interest to Island residents who have been waiting his arrival to practice on the Islands. He is a graduate of Tufts Medical School and had practiced general surgery and medicine until 1951 including five years with the U.S. Army Medical Corps in the U.S., and overseas in World War II. He left general practice in 1951 for a residence in psychiatry in California and has practiced psychiatry in New Jersey and Florida since that time. He is a diplomate, certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology.


In January of 1957, he came to Florida as Clinical Director of the 1000 bed South Florida State Hospital in Hollywood, Florida, where he stayed until late 1959. During that time he served as Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Miami Medical School. In 1959 he left for the private practice of psychiatry in Fort Lauderdale until his move to Sanibel.


Dr. Haber commutes to Fort Lauderdale each Wednesday in order to continue therapy with certain of his patients who have not yet completed treatment.

There has been recognized recently in medical training a growing need for doctors in general practice to have some psychiatric understanding of their patients as individuals in family settings and groups, and doctors who have backgrounds and interests in both psychiatry and medicine are being urged to serve as teachers or as practitioners of this new concept of "family medicine," in order to fulfill the need for the old "family doctor" in a modern setting. This new specialty has engaged Dr. Haber's interest for some time and having been invited by the University to indicate an interest in teaching it, he has decided rather to practice it—hence his move to Sanibel-Captiva where he and his wife, Virginia, have been charmed visitors for the past fifteen years.

While still ordering supplies, the office is in fair order now and Dr. Haber will abandon his "kitchen practice" of the last month and a half, and will accept regular calls and appointments. He will be available for emergencies at all times possible of course (except for Wednesdays when he is at Fort Lauderdale and for occasional low tides or good fishing on Sanibel-Captiva.)

Having come to the Islands to pursue a way of life, Dr. Haber has found the warm welcome and assistance he has been given in getting settled; "like promises of a happy time to come," he says and he would like to thank everyone for many kindnesses and acts of thoughtfulness to him and his wife.




Despite 83 objections the Cabinet approved sale of four acres of submerged land on the north and west side of Captiva Island to the Captiva Islands Co. for \$4,000,00.


The action was recommended by Apthorp who said the firm owns 129 acres of adjacent upland. A dredge and fill bulkhead line is in effect beyond the submerged land.

The sale was strongly opposed by Vincent Honc of the Lee County Conservation Assn., who said the sale is based on "wrong information" about high tide marks and the conveyance actually amounted to 80 acres. Apathorp said the state had to rely on data about the high water mark traditionally used in Lee County and, on the basis of that, four acres were all that invited.

# THRU THE TEN THOUSAND ISLANDS by Mariam Johnson

On Nov. 18 Mrs. C. A. Kalman and Mrs. Belton Johnson started on this trip just before sunrise. We left Captiva via Naples through Everglades City to Chokoloskee Island, where we loaded and boarded a boat with Capt. Belton Johnson as guide.

At this time of morning with perfect weather we set out into a luscious, luxuriant and fascinating world, away from the usual one. Peace, serenity and indescribable beauty blended into the seemingly unreal everywhere. The muffled noise of a few boats skimming out to the fishing grounds together with ours and our voices were the only foreign sounds in the element.

As our small boat noisily made its way, I thought of the many Indian canoes which had slipped so quietly thru these waters for years and how they and the Indians always blended with the surroundings so perfectly. But we did not see any of them on this trip.

After leaving Chokoloskee Bay, we were soon in a most exciting waterway, Crooked Creek, with its winding banks and sharp quick turns. It was real fun to ride in this fascinating part of the Park. As we approached a bank before a quick turn, we took pictures, some of the beautiful green tunnels while the water reflected the clouds and sky overhead.

The varying names of the many waterways, the creeks, the rivers and bays and the history associated with the Islands as told over and over by different people is more exciting than reading about them in any book. To go to the actual spots of the settings in these tales is a fulfillment of desires of a life time.

Looking for the markers against the early morning sun is not easy. They blend in with the water and the plant growth. At times we used the binoculars to pick them up and also to get a closer view of the birds.

We arrived at Chevilier Bay where we were going to pay a visit to Arthur Darwin who is quite a character, privileged to live on an island in the Park. We took pictures of two islands in the Bay: the first, a small one in upper Chevelier Bay where Indians have gone ashore to camp. We called it Indian Island. The second Island was just before we got to Darwin's place. It is known as Moss Island, due to the long beards of moss left by Hurricane Donna on the tall trees. This island is spoken of by many old timers.

Dinner 6:30 - 7:45

It was still early in the morning so Capt. Johnson gave us a bonus trip through Alligator Creek, which was very scenic. I felt so excited at its magnificence. Capt. Johnson and Mrs. Kalman's father, Herman Dickey, had traveled Alligator Creek many years ago when it was very narrow and Mr. Dickey had taken movies of it. It's a nice passage way for a small boat since some of the trees have been cut out and removed.

As we entered, there was a tall dead tree standing to the right like a stately sentinel. I pondered whether to take pictures because I did want to save my film to take pictures of the Darwins and Watsons place.

We passed on into the Creek and for some unaccountable reason the engine stopped. As we drifted back I did take two pictures. Then the motor started again and we went on into the fern by the tall cabbage palms, hearing the birds and seeing a boat filled with silent fishermen. The Captain told us we were approaching the opening to Alligator Bay; lying close to the left band was a land mark of many years -- a beautiful bleached long dead log. Incidentally on the way back I took a picture of this sentinel but the current moved us so fast I am not sure I got it.

We went out into Alligator Bay and Capt. Johnson showed us twin islands where many beautifully plumed birds had lived and were killed before it became illegal. The islands are known as The Alligator Bay Egret Rookery, one of the famous plume bird rookeries, but no birds nest there now, We took pictures of the bare green trees covering the islands and then started back to Alligator Creek. We were practically there before we saw the opening. This adds to the beauty and mystery of the islands. You can get lost and turned around in no time.

The people that rent the boat will come looking for you if you are not in by dark. Also the Rangers will follow the route that you told them you would take when you started. Upon hearing voices, you are supposed to flash a light if you are lost and they will come to your rescue. The Rangers also protect the people in the Park.

We enjoyed the trip coming back through the Creek as much as starting. Our fishermen were still there and upon approaching the entrance I took pictures of a tree's roots that formed an arch over our heads, like dripping graceful fingers.

We arrived at Darwins place and he proceeded to show us about his island and then we had a lunch

which was most gratifying as we had had a very early breakfast. Darwin lives at the Chevelier Place which has a most interesting history. He told us that he has a panther and a deer visit him regularly during the dry season and the panther drinks water from his cistern so it was necessary to put planks down into the cistern so that the panther can get in and out. He didn't want him to get down in and not be able to get out. Darwin has many friends and passerbys who stop to see him and envy his unhurried and peaceful life. He always has time. He is up in age, but healthy and strong working about his place and making trips into Chokoloskee by himself.

Leaving him we went up Chatam River to the Watson Place.
E. J. Watson was a well known and interesting character of the Ten Thousand Islands, in the early part of the 20th Century.

His home at Chatham Bend on the river was especially interesting and one I had wanted to visit for many years.

It's now a Park campsite and picnic spot with a well preserved cistern divided across the middle, containing green water and an excellent foundation of blocks; a fine syrup kettle filled with rain water has a brick foundation with two square openings on each side.

Approaching and leaving these spots was impressive. Strong poinciana roots, laced like large gnarled arms, extended over the waters like a hanging garden, holding up the precious contents of soil, local plants with a red hibiscus ashore adding to the natural colors of yellow, tan and green. Two coconut palms reared their stately heads as though on watch. We saw one roseate spoon bill in bright color along the shore, also three ospreynests in one area. The dead trees stand among the green growth intriguing graceful.

There was the dragon extending away out in the water drinking, the nonchalant man pointing that way, the huge wishbone, pictures of them in their settings would be worth the trip.

As we returned to the dock, fishermen were dressing their catches at a very convenient place where the boats were rented. A long pelican sat on a post undistrubed. As we drew near, the gulls filled the air, a picture-sue and fitting ending for a perfect day in the Everglades. Our catches were in our minds. We had done the only legal shooting, with cam-

Our trip home was quite different, coming by, where the Tamiami crosses Turner River in a setting of breath taking primitive beauty, then westward by Immokolee with its canal and plant beauty, and the board walks from homes across the canal to the road.

We left before daylight and arrived home after dark. A wonderful day to remember.




#### FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH CHRISTMAS CANTATA

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


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
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THE ISLAND GARDENER

The hustle and bustle of the holiday season is advancing rapidly, and the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA) suggests you keep in mind the possibility of giving plans or good garden books for gifts. How-to-do books are not readily available for Florida living, but there are a few that warrant mentioning. The Sunset books from California which almost every garden supply store and nurseryman carry seem to give the best advantages for the Florida gardener. A recent revision of two separate volumes written by John V. Watkins can be of great benefit to Florida gardeners. The book is entitled 'Florida Landscape Plants.' The small paperback publication by Lewis E. Maxwell serve well the new resident in Florida.

Poinsettias have begun to color up quite nicely and on the cool winter nights when frost is a hazard they should be protected by heaters or by wrapping in heavy materials. Do not use plastic next to the plant since this will easily cause a collection of cold and more severe damage.

Heater blocks of various and assorted sizes are available from nurseries and garden supply stores. There are those that utilize fuel oil and those that are compressed fuel. For the homeowner, the FNGA suggests the compressed type blocks. These are easy to light, give out an in-tense heat, and are relatively easy to handle. Heater blocks weigh very little and come packaged most of the time in plastic. To avoid damage to some of your tender ornamentals, you should have readily available heat of some type.

Annual flowers have now begun to bloom and will require fertilization for the second or third time. It is suggested that you use a soluble fertilizer since the soil will be cold and organic nitrogen will not break down readily.

Ryegrass that has been sown earlier in the year will need additional fertilizer. Many times the ryegrass goes off color only because of a lack of fertilizer and water. Apply regular lawn fertilizer such as a 6-6-6 or 8-8-8 using the rate of 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

Ryegrass must be mowed frequently to give you a neat lawn appearance. Avoid using a dull mower on the lawn as this will fray the ends of the blades and cause a browning effect throughout the lawn.

Don't overlook watering and caring for your house plants this month while you are hustling around for the holidays. House plants need more frequent watering in the winter because of the heat in your home. A light feeding with a soluble fertilizer will also help.
