the New Year's Holiday period. Patrol Director Reid Clifton said, "As usual, alcohol will probably contribute to many of the 34 traffic deaths we are predicting. If you plan a party, be a friend first and then a good host. Don't let guests leave your home to drive to their death because you felt you had to be a good host."

Clifton urged hosts to have non-alcoholic beverages on hand for drivers or help make arrangements for transportation for those who might have too much to drink.

The New Year's Holiday period begins at 6:00 p.m., Wednesday, Dec. 31 and ends at midnight Sunday, Jan. 3. If the Patrol's prediction is correct, one person will die every 3 hours during the long 102-hour holiday period.

To help curb the expected highway deaths Clifton said that all available troopers and auxiliarymen will be assigned to traffic duty and will be working with aircraft, radar, VASCAR and unmarked Patrol cars during the entire holiday period.



## Letter To The Editor

To The Islander:

Your editorial in the Dec. 18 Islander concerning the high rise question was very "ify" and quite misleading. If there were a good plan for approaching our zoning problems through density alone. we would have small cause for concern. Unfortunately, we must cope with the original "concept plan" done by Adley Associates for the Lee County Commissioners. To me, it is so ill-conceived I am convinced that if a firm representative visited the islands at all, he must have been blindfolded! Among the more obvious goofs, is a super highway through Ding Darling Sanctuary and destination of one end of Sanibel and all of Captiva, except for Turner Beach, as a highly concentrated urban area! We are suppose to stand still for that? As for your hypothetical 100 acres, I can't

imagine a developer agreeing to put nothing on his land while his neighbor builds a 15 story apartment building. Instead of straying into the "if only...", let's stick to the hard. cold facts: unless the Commissioners decide in our favor on Feb. 10, high rises can be built anywhere on either island that is not now zoned for duplexes or single family residences. As soon as the first one goes up, the lid is off and Sanibel and Captiva as all the world knows them, are doomed.

We wish we had time to consider any and all alternatives. We don't. At this moment, certain developers are literally standing by with equipment ready to start building high rises as soon as the moratorium is lifed. We have a finer in the dike, just that. Our stand was carefully considered before it was taken, our planning

committee is not lacking in professional qualifications, and we have tried to make it representative. Among our members is a well-qualified engineer, an expert on pollution, the property manager of a large development, a real estate broker, a former zoning board member, a restaurant owner-manager, a motel owner-manager, officers from both the Conservation Foundation and the Audubon Society and resident family members whose real estate holdings are extensive. All are residents giving freely of their time and talents because of deep conviction that an ordinance restricting the heights of buildings, here on Sanibel and Captiva, only is absolutely essential for the good of the community. We have neither the desire nor intention of dictating to the rest of Lee County. Perhaps, given the time and available funds, we can hire a competent professional planner who would give esthetic values the priority they deserve but that is in the future. We must deal with the here and now. The islands, the county, the state, the nation cannot afford to put high rises here. The cost is too tragically high. /s/ Elinore Dormer

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
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

#### BAKED RED SNAPPER FLORIDA STYLE

3 lbs. Snapper Salt Pepper Flour 1 stick of butter 1 onion, finely chopped 2 cups chopped celery 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 3 cups canned tomatoes 1 tbsp. Worchestershire 1 tbsp. catsup 1 tsp. chili powder 1/2 lemon 1 garlic clove, minced 1 tsp. salt Cayenne Dredge fish inside and out

with salt, pepper and flour. Melt butter; add onion, celery, green pepper and simmer until tender. Add tomatoes, Worcestershire, catsup, chili powder, lemon, garlic, salt and cayene. Cook for about 45 minutes, then pour over fish and bake an hour or longer, basting frequently.





#### THE ISLAND GARDENER

Have you noticed a rather obnoxious smell in your yard? If you have, the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA) says there's a good possibility that one of the mushrooms called the stinkhorn is hiding among your shrubs or ornamentals. There are two distinct types of stinkhorns in Florida. The one that is most commonly found looks generally like an orange basket, except that the top of the basket is closed. The odor is almost unbearable from this one. The other type has a long white stem much like a common mushroom but with a grayish-brown head or top resembling a sponge. Neither one of these stinkhorns can be controlled effectively, although some oldtimers say that lime applied to the lawn will help. But the modern-day pathologist would rather see you use a combination fungicide such as terrachlor plus captan. In either case, control is most difficult and probably not worth the expense nor the effort. The mushrooms last for a relatively short time, emitting their odor to attract insects that scatter the spores or seeds to other areas.

Frost may have damaged some of your tender plants such as crotons, hibiscus, or poinsettias. What do you do now if this is the case? As the football play-er jokingly says, "You punt!" But that's a little hard to do with a plant, so to take another attack, if you can stand the unsightly appearance, leave the old foliage on the stems. This will protect the plant from further cold damage. Pruning only exposes bare branches and open ends to more cold. Not only this, but you may


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
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
