More than 200 scientists are taking part in the project, the International Symposium on Atomic, Molecular and Solid-State theory and Quantum Biology. The annual assault on the secrets of life by the world's masters of quantum theory began Monday on Sanibel Island and continue through Jan. 24.


The symposium has been sponsored annually for more than 10 years by the University of Florida and Uppsala University in Sweden.

Its director, Dr. Per-Olov Lowdin, holds a professorship at both the University of Florida, where he heads the Quantum Theory Project, and Uppsala University. He conducts a winter institute in Florida, a summer institute in Sweden.

More than 100 scientific papers will be presented during the week at Sanibel, providing more ammunition for specialists in quantum theory-a mathematical process to probe the inner structure of matter-seeking a better understanding of life,

During the symposium the International Society of Quantum Theory will meet. The society was formed during the 1969 symposium. Dr. Low-

To The Islander:

You are the people who have the future of Sanibel and Captiva in your hands.

Your decision on Feb. 10 will either make or breakthe islands. On the one hand you have The Destroyers. Those rampant throughout this land who have the cancerous drive to eat away the very last vestiges of beauty, serenity and freedom. Yes, freedom. For, as has been proved over and over again, the galling confinement alone of this kind of hypocritical "progress" kills freedom not only of movement but of: the mind.

The same leeches that have already destroyed so much of America, witness their work right in your own back yard --Fort Myers Beach -- are now put ting tremendous pressures on you gain their ends. They don't care about you, except how to use you. They don't care about Sanibel and Captiva, except how to use them. To them, once this usefulness has been spent, you and the islands are a thing of the past.

On the other hand you have those of us who have no meny to gain by preserving the essential worth of the islands. We're not pressuring you for our own material gains. We're not expecting any more from Sanibel and Captiva than what they have been giving to thousands and could give to thousands more.

MEALS FOR MILLIONS (Birds, that is)

This reporter and her family drove through the Ding Darling Sanctuary around 4 p.m. on the same day as the Audubon Nature Walk, and had the amazing experience of watching hundreds of birds gorging themselves on the dead fish that were floating on the surfaces of the canals. Wood storks in great numbers, gulls, laughing and ring-billed, pelicans and vultures were stuffing themselves almost to the point of becoming ridiculous. Great wood storks were right out in the middle of the road, seemingly hardly able to walk, gulls and pelicans were flying low, pelicans barely able to take off, their great pouches full of fish, and the vultures were everywhere, attentively scavenging. None of th birds was the least afraid of . or the car, they just went right on dining, fish sticking out of their bills. The wood storks especially seemed absolutely gorged, and we had never seen so many so close to us that we could almost touch them. But no matter how many fish were eaten, there were as many left -- all along the canals, mostly on the right hand side, fish were floating, hundreds of small ones and further along some rather large snook. For the two people with us who had never ' ۹n through the Sanctuary befo. ít was a startling experience, and for us we hope it was one that may never be repeated.


BROILED FLORIDA FISH OR LOBSTER


In saucepan, melt one stick of butter or margarine. Add 1/4 cup lime juice, salt and pepper to taste, a pinch of garlic powder, a pinch of celery salt and 1 tsp. DRY mustard powder. Spoon mixture over cleaned fillet of fish (skin side down even if they to the skin off) or lobster tails spin half (this latter, by the way, is

easily done with a pair of scissors) in broiler with rack at least 10 inches from flame or heating element. Broil until done and browned -- anywhere from 5 to 15 minutes.

SHELL FAIR LIVE EXHIBIT

Cold mornings and lowtides a good combination for finding shells that are better than ordinary and you may come across something live that you'd like to either donate or loan for the Sanibel Shell Fair Live Exhibit.

Ed Webb is again serving as chairman for this interesting phase of the Fair and already has tanks set up and is receiving live speciments.

Take them by Kona Kai, Ed's home and he'll take over from there. If he's not home, Kay Webb, his lovelier half, knows what to do for them.

Let them know whether it's a donated shell or whether you'd like it back after the Fair and also how you can be reached if you want it back. Sometimes specimens brought in for the tanks are too far gone to survive, and in that case it would be returned to you sooner.

Remember, the tanks are ten gallon size so cannot accomodate huge specimens of sea life such as large octopus or oversize fish.

It's fun to have a hand in and observe your own 'find' as others enjoy seeing living specimens. And you never know what exciting event may occur. One year scientists attending saw cones laying eggs for the first time that this has been observed. Several times baby sea horsed have emerged from papa sea horse's pouch, minute and perfect.

din is its president.

Presenting the symposium's opening address Monday was Dr. Ragnar Edenman, governor of the province of Uppsala in Sweden. A former minister of education, he discussed the international exchange of scientific information.

Symposium participants represent the major institutions of education in the United States and Canada. Many come from European and Asiatic countries such as England, France, Germany, Sweden, Finland, Austria, Isreael, India and Japan.

The theories derived from quantum scientists have contributed to progress in space exploration, helped develop the transistor radio and are providing information to biologists in their efforts to solve the problems of mutations, aging and cancer.

Two recent grants awarded the University of Florida are supporting quantum theory

One, for \$9,846 from the U.S. Air Force, is to support the symposium on Sanibel Island.

The second, for \$56,000, is a two-year grant from the National Science Foundation in supporting of the year-round Quantum Theory Project operated at the University of Florida under direction of Dr. Lowdin and Dr. Yngve N. Ohrn, associate professor of chemistry who came here from Sweden.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NEWS

1. We have installed brochure racks, where each business can place their own brochures or cards, and this, to avoid any partiality, will be arranged alphabetically.


2. There is an advertising panel where advertising space can be acquired if wanted.

3. We have installed a table and chairs where the incoming visitor can look over the brochures, pick out the ones they are interested in, and call them free on an unlisted telephone that has been installed for this purpose, thereby making it unnecessary to consult the Secretary at the desk.

A committee of Floyd Snook, Dan Moore, and Wm. Snyder will consult with Mr. Newman in working out a prefactory that will be used by Mr. Newman and his assistant in advising inquiring visitors as to the motels, shops, and other attractions on the Islands.

5. We are spending more money for an as vistant secretary for Mr. Newman and during the rush season she will work as many hours as necessary. Much of this office work had been done heretofore by volunteer women on the Island, but as there had been complaints that these women were partial to their own business, a ruling was passed that no one connected with a motel could help with the tremendous amount of office work our Chamber is now handling. It will probably be necessary to use some of the money that in the past has been spent for advertising to pay for the hired assistant secretary.

The Board feels sure that these steps that we have taken will meet with the approval of all members.



COLD FISH

The unusual cold weather we endured on these islands only a few days ago gave rise to an equally unusual situation involving our fish. During the weekend of Jan. 1 and 11 our canals and bayous teemed with dead and dying fish -- snook, bream and other varieties of warm-water fish were cast on the banks, lay dead eries and Wildlife at the Lightin the shallows and on the bottoms.


The Dixie Beach canal, for instance, on that Saturday and Sunday, showed literally hund-reds of fish of all sizes from tiny pinfish to very large snook, dead and dying, floating, stuck in mud or mangrove roots, or clearly visible on the canal bottom. By noon Sunday a steady stream of cars parked there and men, women and children pulled in the fish in whatever way they could, by boat, net or just by hand. Happy families went off with enough icy cold fish to furnish a nourishing and appetizing meal besides plenty to stow in their freezers.

There were varieties of opinions as to whether or not this


fish-lifting was really proper and legal. What about the limit on snook, for instance? Certain long-time residents maintained this was in improper procedure, that the dead but perfectly refrigerated fish should be left unused, regardless of how impractical that seemed.

A visit by this reporter to the office of the Bureau of Sport Fishhouse settled the question, at least for her. It is perfectly within the law to take fish under such circumstances, the legal limit does not prevail, and they may better be used to advantage than allowed to spoil in the water.

On this last point, however, the dead creatures remaining in the water do not constitute a hazard, since they very soon become nourishment for the many forms of aquatic life that constantly require sustenance. They simply and inevitably join the great cycle of life under water that begins with atoms and diatoms and progresses through minute forms of plankton to small and then large and larger marine varieties, each of which plays its own important role in the sea around us.



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

- $1 \ 1/2$ lbs, fresh Florida cubed fish
- 1 can corn (16 oz.)

1 tall can evaporated milk

Lightly brown onion in margarine, add potato, salt, pepper, basil and water. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Place diced fish on top of potato, cover and simmer 15 minutes longer or until fish flakes easily and potatoes are tender. Stir in corn and liquid, then blend in evaporated milk, cover, heat to just boiling and serve. Serves 6.


BOILED SHRIMP

Fill a large pot with about 2 inches of water. Add 1 cup vinegar, 1 half cup juice from hot cherry or banana pickles, one of the hot pickles, 4 bay leaves, salt and garlic to taste, and enough coarse ground black pepper to cover the surface of the water. Bring to boil and drop in unshelled frozen or fresh shrimp. Bring back to boil, simmer for 2 minutes. Drain and either eat or refrigerate for later use. (They taste better if you remove the shells after boiling, but before eating.)

BAKED OYSTERS

- 36 Fresh Florida shucked oysters 1/2 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. marjoram 2 tbsp. minced onion
- 1/2 tsp, black pepper

Shuck and drain oysters; place on deep half of shells. Sprinkle with onion, salt, pepper, and marjoram. Dot with butter. Place oysters in baking pan, and bake in hot oven 400 degrees for 10 minutes or until edges curl. Serves 6.

ART LEAGUE TO HAVE MEMBER SHOW




