PICTURE DONATED FOR ART LEAGUE AUCTION

Hugo Asbach of Captiva and New York has donated an oil painting of an island scene which will be given away in a drawing at the Sanibel-Captiva Art League Auction on March 14. Proceeds from the event (donation \$3.00) will go to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

Mr. Asbach is well-known in Southwest Florida art circles. He has displayed in exhibits in the Ringling Museum in Sarasota. In 1967 he won best in show with an oil painting "Topkapi" at the Cape Coral National Art Show. His oil, "Macao," was best in show at the Art Council of Southwest Florida Annual Exhibit at Edison Junior College in 1968. This year he was back at the Cape Coral National Art Show again, but this time as one of the judges.

Hugo Asbach was born in Germany in 1913, and started painting early in life. After completing his school education in Switzerland, he went to the Art Academy in Frankfurt, Germany; and, subsequently, became stage designer at the Frankfurt Opera. Later he worked as a designer for a well known jewelry concern.


For the last thirteen years he has devoted all of his time to painting and he works alternately at his studio on Captiva and on his farm in New York state. In recent years Asbach's paintings have been shown in four one-man exhibitions in New York City, Paris, Rome and Munich.



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

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

Mrs. Leigh Bair of Sanibel Island has been named to replace Miss Reddy.



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
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RECAPTURING CAPTIVA PROGRAM

BARBECUED SHRIMP

2 lbs. fresh shrimps, peeled and develned 1/2 cup salad oil

1 large onion, sliced

2 large cloves garlic, smashed 2 tbsp. lime juice Itsp. dry mustard

1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. celery salt

Fort

1/4 tsp. freshly ground pepper Combine all ingredients in mixing bowl, tossing well. Marinate for 1 hour. Remove shrimp from marinade and place in single layer on piece of heavy aluminum foil on grill over white coals of barbecue fire. Cover shrimps with another piece of foil, forming hood. Cook 6 to 8 minutes. Six to eight appetizer portions.

GROUPER PARMESAN

2 lbs. grouper fillets 1 cup dairy sour cream

1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese t tbsp. lime or lemon juice

1 tbsp. grated onion

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

Few drops bottled hot pepper



Skin fish fillets and cut into serving portions. Arrange in single layer 12x8x2 inch shallow baking dish. Combine rest of ingredients and spread over fish. If desired, sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or till fish flakes easily when forked. Trim with snipped parsley. Makes 6 servings.

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


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

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

Lee County Commissioners Fort Myers, Fla. Gentlemen:

It was my good fortune to be present at the recent dinner at Sanibel at which three of you were present. It was obvious that those present, including Sanibel residents and visitors, much appreciated your being there, and your fine spirit.

This is the fourth recent winter of which I have spent a part on Sanibel. I believe that Sanibel represents and incalculable asset to Lee County — an asset of which a great many Lee Countians are not fully appreciative. Furthermore, it is not necessarily an asset which will continue to be as great as it now is.

Speaking very plainly, I happen to know of various visitors to Sanibel, including members of my family, who will be much less interested in visiting Lee County in general and Sanibel in particular, if the rapid expansion and development of Sanibel, including vast bull-dozing and erection of high-rise apartments such as hoped for by a few developers, is permitted to continue. Visitors who want that kind of development can so easily go to the Miami area or elsewhere, instead of to the unique and wonderful place which Sanibel now is.

I sincerely hope that you may see your way clear to act promptly toward the preservation of Sanibel, thus helping to a void over-development, which can so easily happen, thus driving many visitors away.

SHRIMP OMELET BAKE

2 tbsp, butter or margarine
6 oz, shrimp diced into small
pieces

2 tbsp. finely chopped onion 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. Tabasco 2 tbsp. dry sherry

5 eggs 3 tbsp. flour cups milk

Add shrimp, onion, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco to heated butter or margarine in a saucepan; stir and cook 3 to 5 min. Remove from heat and mixin sherry. Turn mixture into a buttered 1 1/2 qt. baking dish. Set aside at least

30 min. to allow flavors to blend.

Beat eggs until foamy and light. Beat in flour, remaining salt and Tabasco, then milk. Pour into baking dish over shrimp mixture.

Bake at 375 F. 30 to 35 min., or until mixture is set and lightly browned. Garnish the top with whole cooked shrimp. Serve with heated canned newburg sauce. 4 to 6 servings.

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
