PAINTINGS DONATED FOR AUCTION

Variety is the word which best sums up the stories of the artists who are contributing pictures to be sold at the auction being held by the Sanibel-Captiva Art League on March 14 at 8:00 at Casa Ybel Auditorium. There is great variety in their styles of painting and also in the artists' education, art training, work and travel. A few of those who have donated pictures at this time are:

Elizabeth N. deVicq, who winters on Captiva is a graduate of Massachusetts College of Art. She has two sons, Tech. Sergeant Joseph E. deVicq of the Air Force and Commander David C. deVicq, a civil engineer with the Navy. To quote Mrs. deVicq, "I'll bet I am the only artist in the auction with a Japanese daughter-in-law and two beautiful Japanese-American grandchildren." When at home at Gloucester, Mass., she is active in several artists' associations. For the past few years whe has specialized in watercolor paintings of mushrooms. Her most recent one-man show was held this winter at Stuart, Florida.

Margaret L. Dugdale, who has spent winters on Captiva for 32 years, also finds inspiration for her watercolor work in the forms of nature. However, her specialties have been paintings of the life cycle of butterflies native to Maryland (her home state) and Florida, sea life from live specimens, and a portfolio of the plant life of Captiva and Florida. Mrs. Dugdale was a friend and protege of "Ding" Darling for whom the



sanctuary is named.

Mary Pevear, who has a home on Captiva near her sisters, Mrs. Harold Bixby and Mrs. Audenreid Whittemore, makes a unique contribution to the auction. She studied over five years with internationally known decoupage artists Maybelle and Hiram Manning in Boston, From the typical two dimensional decoupage requiring 25 to 30 time consuming coats of varnish, her work has evolved to a three-dimensional form for which Mrs. Pevear often uses copies of the famous Currier and Ives prints. It is one of these which she has donated. Mrs. Pevear is also unique among the artists in that she is the only one who has three greatgrandchildren.

Born in Savannah, Georgia, and educated at Georgia Tech, Leon Levy found his way to New York where he established his reputation as an architect. Best known of the buildings he designed and brought into being is the New York Coliseum. After retiring to Sanibel, Mr. Levy turned his artistic talent to painting. He has experimented with many materials and techniques with such success that he has won numerous prizes in area juried shows and has sold paintings to many private collectors. Since retiring, he and Mrs. Levy have travelled in the United States and Europe.

Some of the world may have rubbed off on Oneita McCulloch as she tasevelled to many far places with her husband, Paul. The color and mood of her oil paintings have been affected more by remembered vignettes and vistas from Bali to Greenwich than by formal education and training. DOUBLE BILL AT PIRATE PLAYHOUSE


Another double bill will be presented at the Pirate Playhouse on Feb. 28 and March 1.



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Letter To The Editor

To The Islander:

I would like to quote from a letter received by the Planning Committee from the firm of Sasaki, Dawson, DeMay Associates, Landscape Planners, one of the finest and best known such outfits in the country. Mr. Richard E. Galehouse, who signed the letter, is a frequent visitor here.

Because the Islands are unique and physically fragile, the land use controls which guide their development must be carefully designed and tailored to the Islands' special qualities. Low rise, high quality development is consistent with the unique qualities of the Islands. High rise, high density development is incompatible and in all likelihood would destroy the very characteristics which make the islands so attractive.

This firm planned the Sea Pines Plantation development on Hilton Head, S.C. Building heights there are limited to 35ft, -- none rise over the tree tops. With such an authoritative opinion, Adley Associates should certainly stop insisting that high rises are all right on Sanibel and Captiva. Each one of the Commissioners received a copy of Mr. Galehouse's letter in the brief prepared by our attorneys.

To The Islander:

I first came here five years ago for two days of shelling with my late husband. Two years ago I returned with my little girl and found Sanibel pretty much the same. It was then, on a longer visit, that I discovered the wonderful birds there.

Last year I noticed a much greater change and as a member of the National Audubon Society I became alarmed and before I left joined the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Association, I subscribe to the Islander too so that I might keep posted on developments here.

The big question this week is the high-rise and how to keep it out. I'd say developers are just as big a menace. At present at least six are bulldozing trees and digging canals. How many next year and how many in 1972. One developer's salesmen told me when I inquired about a lot that I wouldn't "be allowed" to build a wooden house in their development. Concrete block, stuccoed homes may be O.K. in the rest of Florida and I'm sure some prefer them to frame here because of upkeep but one after another in the same area is hardly "Sanibel Island style."


Three years ago I left Chicago for the south suburbs. As an exhibitor of show dogs and an owner of two Spaniels I had to "shop" the best area with the most liberal attitude toward pets. All municipalities have their own rules and regulations about hundreds of things. Perhaps you could incorporate into a town, village or city and write your own ticket, Your county is being pushed by strong and persistent people who have the money to continue the battle. Elect your conservationists to the legislative bodies and you might be able to stop this before it gets out of hand.


The Everglades has been spared the jet-port, save the islands from the developers whose first business of the day is money and not nature.

This magnificent show of strength, over 300 people, made a very deep impression on both the Commissioners and those who oppose us. We regret so many had to stand but your presence not only greatly encouraged our speakers but also indicated, beyond the shadow of a doubt, where we stand on the high rise controversy. Consequently, the Commissioners have Indicated, that if Sanibel and Ca tiva can be designated as a special area, they probably will agree to a 35 ft, height restriction for us. Our attorneys are presently working with the County Attorney on such an ordinance. However, since we are not yet out of the woods on this, and will not be until all the legal procedures have been completed, we ask your continued help by sending in cards, writing the Commissioners, and making what contributions you can to help defray our continuing legal costs. 


THE ISLAND CHEF FLORIDA SHRIMP COCKTAIL 1 lb, green shrimp, cleaned a ' cooked 1/2 cup chili sauce 1/2 tsp. prepared horseradish 1/4 tsp. Worcestershire 1/4 tsp. lemon juice 1/3 cup finely diced celery Heart leaves of lettuce Chill cooked, cleaned shrimp thoroughly, combine remaining ingredients except lettuce and mix with shrimp. Serve in small sherbet glasses or cups lined with heart leaves of lettuce. 5 servings. SHRIMP CREOLE medium-size onions, peeled 3 and sliced thin 1/2 cup chopped green pepper 1 can (3 or 4 oz) chopped mushrooms 1/2 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. paprika 1/4 tsp. curry powder 1/8 tsp. pepper 1 can (about 1 lb) stewed tomatoes 2 tsp. sugar 1 lb. deveined shrimp 3 cups hot cooked fine noodles Combine onions, green pepper, mushrooms and liquid. salt, paprika, curry powder, pepper, and tomatoes in a largefrying pan; stir in 2 tsp. sugar. Heat slowly stirring constantly, to boiling; simmer 10 minutes, or until onion and green pepper are tender. Stir in shrimp. Simmer 10 minutes longer, or until shrimp are heated through. Spoon noodles onto 6 heated serving plates; spoon shrimp mixture on top. 6 servings. CLAM JUICE STINGER Just before serving: Into medium pitcher, stir one 7 1/2 oz. bottle clam juice, chilled, with one 12 oz. can vegetable-juice cocktail, chilled, 2 dashes Tabasco and 1 tbsp. lemon juice.

- 2 tbsp. snipped parsley
- 3 egg whites

Skin fish fillets and cook in one quart boiling salted water 10 minutes or till fish flakes easily when forked. Drain fish and flake with fork into fine pieces. Combine mashed potatoes, butter, milk, seasonings, and egg yolks, beating till light and fluffy. Add onion, parsley, and fish. Beat egg whites with dash of salt to stiff peaks; fold into fish mixture. Spoon into 6 well greased individual casseroles. Place in shallow pan and pour hot water into part to depth of 1 inch, Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees for 30 minutes or till tops are browned. Makes 6 servings.

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

These are only a few of the contributing artists whose works the Sanibel-Captiva Art League is happy to have for the auction. There will be more later.





MEETING NATURE HALFWAY


