FINAL HEARING ON BUILDING HEIGHT RESTRICTIONS



AUDUBON ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTION

At the closing meeting of the 1969-70 season, held on April 9, the members of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society elected unanimously the following officers for 1970: Mario F. Hutton, president; Griffing Bancroft, vice-president; Louise Goodwin, secretary-treasurer. Elected directors for three year terms were Hal H. Harrison, Erard A. Matthiessen and Julie Miller. Dr. Elmer L. Severinghaus was elected to a two year term, and Roy E. Bazire was appointed 'ex-officio' to a one year term, in his capacity of Chairman of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. Serving unexpired terms from previous years will be the following boatd members: Marion Cannon, Edm und Carnahan and Clarence R. Conklin.

In submitting his annual report, President Mario Hutton stated that 1969 was another year of achievement and continued progress for the local Audubon, with further increase in the number of members and improvement in the association's financial conditions. Among accomplishments worth mentioning, he listed many interventions on the national, state and local levels in matters regarding conservation problems in general, and in particular the defense of our island's unique ecological treasures, Mr. Hutton also stated that several groups such as 9 Florida Audubon Chapters, also the President and other leaders of National Audubon were escorted and fully acquainted with the islands' natural assets during the past twelve months. He also announced that the Board of Directors of the National Audubon has accepted the invitation to hold their meeting of January 1971 on Sanibel, spending three days here. Finally, as a token of the local Audubon's closest and wholehearted cooperation with the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, it was announced that the Chapter's Borad of Directors has unanimously approved taking out a one thousand life membership in the Foundation, considering this the worthiest investment for its surplus funds.





THE FEMALE OF THE SPECIES LESS DEADLY THAN THE MALE

Nobody knows whether men are better drivers than women or vice versa. But insurance underwriters know that behind the wheel women are better auto insurance risks than men, says the Insurance Information Institute.

During 1968, for example, 59,500 men and 10,500 women drivers were involved in fatal accidents. And 19,600,000 men and 6,400,000 women drivers were involved in all kinds of auto accidents -fatal, non-fatal and property damage, according to the National Safety Council.

In that year, studies show, there were 61,500,000 men drivers and 43,500,000 women drivers. On the basis of these figures, coupled with figures on miles driven, here's how the sexes shape up with respect to accident involvement:

For every million miles driven, 84 men were involved in fatal accidents as against 35 women.

In auto accidents of all kinds, 277 men were involved for every ten million miles driven, as against 212 women.


These figures indicate that a women is less likely to be involved in an auto accident than a man and, therefore, women drivers are regarded as better auto insurance risks than men.

But are women really better drivers than men?

The National Safety Council points out that a part of the difference in accident involvement between the sexes appears related to the time, place and circumstances of the driving.

While males do nearly 75 per cent of all the driving, this percentage increases in rural areas, where the mileage death rate is highest, and it drops in urban areas, where the rate is lowest. Also, men drive more after dark when the mileage death rate is three times higher than during the day.

Although the accident rate for women is rising, many observers share the opinion that women as a class are more careful and more considerate of others on the road, and, therefore, are safer drivers as a class.



SANIBEL AND CANCER RESEARCH

In response to a call for Spanish bayonet (Yucca aloifolia) in full bloom, by the A. P. Cooke Memorial Cancer Laboratory, Florida Souther College in Lakeland, which appeared in a local newspaper recently, Mary Nix contacted them offering all blooms she had and agreed to contact local property owners for permission to cut blooms on their land.

There was immediate response and a field team from the National Leukemia Research Society, Denver, Colo. made two trips to Sanibel to collect blooms. Miss Catherine Gibson headed the team, assisted by Bob and Barbara Hanson. They may come here again to increase their supply. Several thousand bloom stalks were needed.

Tom and Mary Nix assisted in gathering the blooms which were rushed back o Lakeland for immediate processing.

Calls were made to many property owners and, without exception, all generously offered whatever they had, including Gerald Martin, Howard Dayton, Tom Mitchell, Priscilla Murphy, Roy Bazire, Elinor Dormer, Marty Holts, Bob Aycock, Dr. Larimore and John Oster. The research team contacted the roads commissioner and received approval to collect on the rights of way.

Should our yucca blooms prove to be the break through in the fight on Leukemia, our little island can take humble pride in having helped.

The yucca is a beautiful plant whether used as a hedge or massed in clumps and comes into full bloom around Easter. It thrives in this area and requires little care, or none-each leaf terminates in a needle like point so it requires careful handling but the end result is well worth the effort.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY by Russell Kay

In spite of the fact that we are now paying the highest rate in U. S. Postal history for a first class letter, it appears that we will soon be paying four cents additional or a total of 10 cents. We are also warned that even this increase may not be enough to keep our Post Office Department operating in the black.

I don't know about you, but I am on a limited income. I am taking steps to meet the situation. I am sending the following notifications to my relatives and friends:

"Dear Folks: You have been receiving a letter from me at frequent intervals just to let you know of my affection and friendship but at 10 cents a throw it is beyond my means. So do not look for my occasionaly letter from now on. If anything happens that I consider important enough to advise you I will telephone after 7 p.m. or on Saturday or Sunday, a free enterprise operation not burdened by politics and governmental inefficiencies."

I am sending the following notice to my creditors. "Gentlemen: This is the last check I will send through the mails. Don't worry, I intend to pay you, but I will deliver my check in person. It will be cheaper than use of the mail at present rates."

For ten years I sent Christmas cards to about 1,200 people at two cents postage for each card, I cut the list to about 300 when the rate advanced to five cents and cut it again when it reached six cents. So next year please don't expect a card from me. Just know I love you and think about you and I will certainly not expect a card from you. Save your dime on postage plus the cost of the card and we will all be better off. And the poor postman will not be overburdened.

My Christmas presents this year will be sent by railway express so our overworked post office will not be burdened, Locally I will deliver them myself.

In the meantime, I am marking every piece of junk mail "return to sender" instead of throwing it in the waste basket. I hope the Post Office Department will return it and charge them the full postage. But even if they do it would be a lot less than the 10 cents I am asked to pay to write a personal letter.

Another thing that gripes me is the crazy mixed up publicity I receive from my congressmen and senators telling me the state of the nation, how they love me and what they think they are doing about it. I am paying the postage for their mailing privilege.

I don't know about you, brother, but I think we are being taken and I don't like it. Let's rebel and show the Post Office Department and the politicians that we have had enough. And I do mean enough.

SHRIMP ROMA

1 lb. peeled and deveined shrimp (fresh)

3 tbsp. olive oil

1 tbsp, butter or margarine

1 clove garlic, minced

medium sized onion, sliced cans (8 oz. each) tomato sauce

1 tbsp. brown sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. basil, crushed

1/4 tsp. marjoram, crushed 1 tbsp. chopped parsley

1/2 lb. small shell macaroni,

cooked and drained Add garlic and onion to heat-

ed olive oil and bu. . or margarine in a skillet. Cook until onion is tender but not browned. Add shrimp and cook about 5 minutes. Remove shrimp with a slotted spoon and keep warm.

Add tomato sauce brown sugar, salt, basil, marjoram, and parsley to fat in skillet; simmer 5 min. Mix shrimp into sauce and heat thoroughly. Serve over hot macaroni. Garnish with parsley. About 4 servings.

FISH STUFFED PEPPERS

2 lbs. fish fillets

6 large green peppers

6 tbsp. diced bacon 3 tbsp. chopped onion

1/4 cup chili sauce

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

2 tbsp. butter or margarine, melted

1/2 cup soft bread crumbs

Skin fish fillets and cut into 4 inch pieces. Cut a thin slice from top of each green pepper and remove seeds and membrane. Simmer peppers in boiling salted water 10 minutes or till almost tender. Drain. Fry bacon till crisp; add onion, celery, chili sauce , seasonings, and fish. Simmer 10 minutes. Fill green peppers with fix mixture; combine butter and bread crumbs and sprinkle over fish mixture. Bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
