




PORTFOLIO ? WINS WHO

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



MANY HAPPY RETURNS



We all wish her many more happy celebrations on Sanibel.





A full moon shining over the Causeway greeted Ruth and Philip on their return as well as a contingent of loud voiced jolly froggies.





Smith met this week with Governor Claude R. Kirk, Jr., who signed a proc-lamation heralding "Realtor Week" in Florida.

The proclamation cites Realtors for contributing to public confidence by their pledge to uphold the code of ethics of the National Association of Real Estate Boards; hails the right of private property ownership; and honors Realtors for their contribution to every level of local and state government by their participation in public affairs and charitable and educational causes.

"The term, 'Realtor,' Smith explained, "means that an individual is a member of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, the Florida Association of Realtors, and a local Board of Realtors. To be eligible for membership, a candidate must demonstrate a superior knowledge of the business, possess a record of business integrity, and subscribe to the strict Realtors code of ethics."

Realtors, well known for consulting with home seekers and home sellers, also serve as appraisers, industrial experts, property managers, company counselors, farm experts, and in other capacities related to real estate.

Special messages in these churches will be designated to help Goodwill improve and expand its vocational rehabilitation services to disabled and disadvantaged persons.

Goodwill-Suncoast started 16 years ago in St. Petersburg with 16 handi-capped workers. Today it operates Rehabilitation Centers in St. Petersburg, Manasota, Fort Myers, Tallahassee and is activating another Rehabilitation Center in Ocala.

In larger cities, Goodwill provides home pickup service to collect repairable clothing and household materials, donated by generous residents. For smaller articles, there are more than 700 bright yellow and blue Goodwill deposit boxes conveniently located at leading shopping centers.

Goodwill operates 24 retail outlets for the sale of these repaired garments and articles. Proceeds are used to pay the wages of handicapped men and women who are learning to qualify for jobs in private employment.

The theme of this year's National Goodwill Week is, "Goodwill Builds People for Jobs."







There are bargain plants available, at usually you get what you pay for according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). The new program sponsored by the nurserymen throughout the state called "Gold Seal" can give you a better plant. The way you determine the quality of a plant is to look for the gold seal tag. If a plant has this tag on it, it has been graded and the grade should appear on the tag. This gives you the assurance that you are buying a plant that is free of disease and insects. It also assures you that the plant is true to name and variety. It will have a dense foliage, correct shape, and a strong root system. It is better to pay for a gold seal plant than to buy a bargain plant. A bargain plant may be infected with diseases and insects and there is a possibility that it will need to be pruned and shaped. It also may not be true to name and variety.

The spring rains have washed out a lot of the fertilizer added in February and March. If your shrubs and trees are showing a light green color, it may be you will need to add additional fertilizer before you had planned. The FNGA suggests that you use a fertilizer containing a high percentage of organic nitrogen. The plant obtains a portion of the fertilizer as soon as it is applied, and then the organic material breaks down to feed the plant over a longer period of time.

Azaleas are forcing out a lot of new growth now, and if you have need for shaping or pruning of your plants do it quickly. Azaleas form their buds in early June. If they are pruned after this date you may have a lack of blossoms on your plant next year. Don't forget, azaleas need both iron and manganese. Both of these materials can be applied at the same time scattering them evenly on the ground around the plant. Iron in the sulfate form will stain concrete, so avoid getting any on the driveway or sides of the house.

Scale insects on all of the plants are producing young at this time of year. Scale on citrus, camellias, hibiscus, and ixora can be controlled more easily now than at any other time of year. Use malathion and oil for best results. Mix both of these materials carefully and according to directions in order to avoid damage to the foliage. Repeat a spray of straight malathion without oil in 10-15 days.

SHERRIED FLORIDA BLUE CRAB

6 tbsp, butter or margarine 1 cup fresh bread cubes

- 1/3 cup diced green pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 lb. mushrooms, thinly
- sliced
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- $1 \ 3/4 \ cups \ milk$
- 1 lb. Florida blue crab meat.

drained and flasked 1/2 cup diced sweet gherkins

1/2 cup alcea sweet gherking 1/4 cup sherry (optional)

About 40 minutes before serving: In large skillet over medium heat, in tablespoon melted butter or margarine, toast bread cubes 3 to 5 minutes, tossing frequently. With slotted spoon, place bread cubes on paper towels to drain. In same skillet over medium heat melt remaining butter or margarine and cook green pepper 7 minutes or until tender. Add onions and mushbrooms and cook 5 minutes longer.

Over low heat, blend in flour and salt; gradually stir in milk, cooking until mixture thickens. Add crab and gherkins and continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until bubbling hot, about 15 minutes. Stir in sherry. Serve in chafing dish with bread cubes on top. Makes 6 servings.



STORM WARNINGS

If you are boating in the vicinity of an officially designated storm warning display station, periodically observe the tower or mast for the signals that warn of approaching storms. Official display points include many Coast Guard stations and yacht clubs. Learn to recognize these signals and lights.

DISPLAY SIGNALS

SMALL CRAFT WARNING: One red pennant displayed by day and a red light over a white light at night to indicate winds up to 38 miles an hour (33 knots) and/or sea conditions dangerous to small craft operations are forecast for the area.

GALE WARNING: Two red pennants displayed by day and a white light above a red light at night to indicate winds ranging from 39 to 54 miles an hour (34 to 48 knots) are forecast for the area.

STORM WARNING: A single square red flag with a black center displayed during daytime and two red lights at night to indicate that winds 55 miles per hour (48 knots) and above, no matter how high the velocity, are forecast for the area.

HURRICANE WARNING: The hurricane warning is displayed only in connection with a tropical cyclone (hurricane.) Two square red flags with black centers displayed by day and a white light between two red lights at night to indicate that winds 74 miles an hour (64 knots) and above are forecast for the area.

FIVE SKILLS FOR ACCIDENT-FREE MOTORING LISTED

The driving skills of experts need to be learned and used by more motorists to insure accident-free driving the Florida Highway Patrol said today.

ida Highway Patrol said today. Colonel Reid Clifton, director of the Patrol said, "Many professional drivers have developed expert driving skills and habits in the course of their training and experience, and the average driver would do well to follow their example." Five basic rules for expert driving were explained.

Aim high in steering -- this means looking well ahead of the path of your car and analyze traffic before you get to any place of potential hazard.

. Get the big picture -- keep an allinclusive watch over the entire roadway both ahead and to the sides and be aware of both sights and sounds around you. . Keep your eyes moving -- move

your eyes to the rear, near, far ahead and to both sides, never letting your gaze fix on any one object for more than two seconds.

. Make sure they see you -- let others know what you are doing or going to do by using your horn, lights, turn signals, stop lights or hand signals.

. Leave yourself an out -- keep a space-cushion around your car, don't get boxed in, allow extra space at night and give yourself time and space in which to see, decide and act.



FISH STEAKS TARRAGON

4 fresh fish steaks, 3/4" thick (about 2 lbs.)

Salt 1/4 cup butter or margarine

1 tbsp. all-purpose flour

1 vegetable bouillon cube, dissolved in 1 cup boiling water 1 tsp. dried tarragon 1 tbsp. lemon juice 4 thin lemon slices Pimiento strips Green peas

Rinse fish quickly under running cold water and drain on paper towels. Sprinkle lightly with salt. Melt butter in an 11" to 12" skillet over low heat. Sprinkle with flour and blend well. Stir in vegetable bouillon and cook, stirring, until thickened. Season with the tarragon and lemon juice. Arrange steaks in sauce in skillet and bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 12 to 15 minutes or until fish is opaque and flakes easily

until fish is opaque and flakes easily with fork. Lift fish to serving plates. Spoon some of sauce on each steak and garnish with a twisted lemon slice and a pimiento strip. Serve with green peas, if desired. Makes 4 to 6 servings.



King Arthur and his Knights certainly were cats never. They were people and there is a great deal of doubt


They ever lived anywhere or even moved about." "Sire," said Clawed, "I'll be real polite and say


