CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

The Florida Chapter, The Nature Conservancy has proposed the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation for the Governor's Award for 1970 to a conservation organization in Florida.

Below is the summary of the Foundation's programs which was included in the material presented by the Florida Conservancy. Creating a unique "open space community" within and part of a national refuge-

Creating a unique "open space community" within and part of a national refugeprivate sanctuary, plus educational-research recreational complex, is the ultimate goal of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation's programs. "The total plan... is extraordinarily well founded and when completed might serve as a model for other communities blessed with unspoiled natural areas," reported The Nature Conservancy in its "Summer News," 1969.

Basic programs embrace (1) perpetual protection of the J. N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge and its expansion per the Concept Plan prepared by the U. S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries & Wildlife; (2) creation of a fresh water wetlands sanctuary in the interior of Sanibel as an essential complement to the "Darling" Refuge; (3) establishing a "learning-research" nature center as an educational tool to be used from elementary school to university, and for the general public; (4) establishing a marine research laboratory to be operated by Florida's major institutions of higher learning; (5) conducting continuing programs of research, using the natural resources and physical facilities of the preceding.

The Foundation's first project was the investigation of the feasibility of a Nature Center on Sanibel. This was undertaken by the National Audubon Society with funds granted by the Alice O'Brien Foundation at St. Paul, Minn., through the island organization. Development of this facility is long-range and will depend upon raising an endowment to assure its successful operation. In the meantime, a beginning use of the Nature Center site by the Lee County School system has been worked out by Mr. William Hammond, Environmental Science Director for the Lee County Schools.

Three annual conservation conferences were sponsored by the Foundation, starting in January 1968. From these the Board of Directors hammered out the program of action outlined above, and its implementation in landpurchases, marine research, Lee County School program, specialized research on the loggerhead turtle, and a membership and fund raising program. Land purchases began with the acquisition in March 1969 of 147.8 acres of interior


Land purchases began with the acquisition in March 1969 of 147.8 acres of interior slough lands on Sanibel for the nature center site, and 22 acres of land on Pine Island Sound for the marine research laboratory site. Total cost was about \$170,000.00. In addition, nine parcels of interior lands totalling about 24 acres and valued at more than \$50,000.00 have been given to the Foundation.

The Foundation is now working with the National Audubon Society and the Nature Conservancy on a new land acquisition program for which a major foundation grant has been requested. It is hoped this may lead to further acquisitions with matching Federal-State funds. The Foundation has prepared a proposal outlining plans for the Fresh Water Sanctuary in detail, but this cannot be revealed until it has been presented to the proper officials.

The marine research program began in 1969 with Florida Atlantic University, Boca Raton, involving marine, terrestrial and ecological studies by faculty and students of that institution. At the third annual Conservation Conference in January 1970, representatives of five major Florida institutions of higher learning and of the Florida Institute of Oceanography attended. They expressed great interest in the study of the island environment and a beginning program of research is being developed with them, as well as a continuing program with Florida Atlantic.

Major specialized research has been the loggerhead turtle research project of Caretta Research, sponsored by the Foundation.

Recognizing that acquisition of land is meaningless unless accompanied by steps



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to preserve it from pollution, the Foundation early began studies through the faculty

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

CURB HOLIDAY DEATHS

The Florida Highway Patrol today announced plans for a massive enforcement effort to curb their predictions of 14 traffic deaths for the July 4th holiday weekend.

These plans supplement Governor Kirk's "Arrive Alive" safety campaign which begins July 1.

The weekend period begins at 6 p.m. Thursday, July 2 and ends midnight Sunday, July 5.

Commander of the Patrol, Colonel Reid Clifton, said, "Our experience shows that intensive enforcement with great numbers of troopers patrolling the highways works to reduce traffic accidents and deaths. We plan to have every available trooper and auxiliaryman working traffic."

Patrol plans include cancelling days off, assigning all troopers to patrol duty for the holiday period, and extensive use of aircraft spotters, unmarked patrol cars, radar and 200 recently installed VASCAR speed computers. Last year there were 17 people killed

during a similar 78 hour period.


THE ISLAND GARDENER

One of the most voracious worms, according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA) is the canna leaf roller. Almost every canna growing at this time of year can be found with ragged, jagged, and chewed leaves. In addition to this, there may be many leaves folded over; and beneath this fold is a long, grayish-green worm with a large brown head. This is the canna leaf roller. He can literally devour a leaf in two or three days. Control is difficult. It is best to keep a stomach poisoning on the leaves throughout the summer months.

You may want to use chlordane or sevin.

Hibiscus are producing many blossoms now and if you are picking the blossoms or cutting the plant back use extreme care. Why, you may ask? The main reason is that the saddleback caterpillar feeds on hibiscus and if you touch this caterpillar with your arm you may find a severe stinging sensation and later a large blister. Generally saddleback caterpillars are kept under control by a parasite, but frequently they are to be found feeding on hibiscus. There is no good control other than a stomach poisoning Ixoras frequently show iron defic-iency according to the FNGA. This deficiency can be corrected by applying either iron sulfate or iron chelate. It is more desirable to use iron chelate since it will not stain the house or the driveway. One application should correct the con-dition. Iron deficiency usually is associated with a soil that is very sweet. When iron is lacking in a plant the leaves are extremely yellow and the veins are dark green Bird of paradise plants require an organic fertilizer and broken shade for best blooms. These plants are related to the bananas and also require quite a lot of water. Bird of paradise plants need to be at least 3 or 4 years old before blossom. ing. It may not be too early to find a few sod webworms in your lawns, St. Augustine grass particularly is subject to sod webworms, and the damage will appear as a trashy brown area in the lawn. If you find such a condition it is suggested that you spray with sevin. You may need to repeat application of spray in about 10 days. Watch closely for any other worms. They can work rapidly in a lush, green lawn.

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WE CAN PRESERVE THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENTS

A general disregard for the natural environments of our inshore marine waters has been in practice in this country and in other parts of the world ever since man first took up residence on the sea coast. Losses resulting from this procedure of ignorance and greed have been quietly insidious. Little by little natural marine habitats have been adversely changed. Step by step, in a manner hardly noticed by the casual observer, our bay and sea beaches have been blocked from the general public as if they were private property; many productive marine habitats of our bays and estuaries have been scooped up as a source of fill or covered to provide building sites or seaside golf courses.

At the same time that this has been going on, pollution has been running rampant, expanding logarithmically. Untreated sewage and industrial wastes are converting our bays and inshore waters into giant septic tanks. DDT and other forms of broadly toxic and persistent pesticides or herbicides are accumulating in our inshore waters, even in the sea as a whole, and sometimes rendering sea foods dangerous or at least open to suspicion. Radioactive by-products continue to be an ominous threat.

Here at Sanibel and Captiva, islands famous the world over for the great variety and beauty of their mollusk populations, there has been a reduction in abundance of some of the most desirable species. Those now less abundant may have suffered somewhat from the collecting of living specimens, but not so much on the part of individuals as from wholesale gathering of everything in sight. They may also be suffering from a change in the environment.

This has happened in Tampa Bay. Let me illustrate.

Back in 1942 and 1945 when agar was a critical war material, we were harvesting certain kinds of seaweeds in lower Tampa Bay. The harvesting did not affect the abundance of these plants as only loose material was gathered. It would have eventually washed ashore anyway. But since the early 1940's, there as been a steady decline in continued to page 8

the abundance of several kinds of seaweeds in lower Tampa Bay, and I believe this is the result of a man-induced change in the environment.

I think most anyone will agree that during the past 25 years there has been a steady reduction in the areas of the seagrass beds in Tampa Bay as a result of pollution and dredging. The algae that we harvested during the war start out as young plants attached to seagrass leaves. The ultimate abundance each season appears to be directly proportional to the area of the seagrass beds.


This is an example, based upon my own experience in my field of research, marine algae. I feel sure that other species of marine organisms are also less abundant, locally at least, than they once were.

Here at Sanibel and Captiva there is a wonderful opportunity to show to the rest of the world what can be done through organization and community cooperation. With an organization like the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and the kind of interest and spirit that is so clearly demonstrated by the attendance at this meeting, there are so many things that can be done. We can monitor and manage both the land and marine

environments here for the general good. We can eliminate at least some of the damage that has been done in the past. We can restore some environments to their former natural condition and productivity. We must work together. We must study the ecology of this unique island area. We must undertake more projects like the remarkable loggerhead turtle research and management program that you now have under way here.

Those of us involved in ecological and related research at the oceanographic organizations of our universities know what we want to do. In order to do these things we need modest amounts of financial support for our graduate students who are interested in undertaking field work that is critical to the preservation and utilization of our valuable marine environment.





In consequence, the Lee County Health Department is moving to take corrective steps to eliminate existing pollution and establish controls for the future. As the first step in public education on the problem, the County Health Department made a presentation to the island communities at a meeting on Sanibel May 18. Joint sponsorship of the event was obtained from nine major civic organizations on the islands, led by the event was obtained from nine major civic organizations on the islands, led by the Foundation. The Foundation has assisted the County in its work by paying for the con-sulting services of a major engineering firm, Black, Crow & Eldsness, as well as through the faculty of the Department of Biological Sciences of Florida Atlantic. The work of the Foundation received national recognition when the American Her-itage Society last winter selected it as one of only 12 local conservation groups through-out the country (and the only one in the Southeast) to receive a special award. Achievements to date have resulted from a unique partnership of effort and purpose by generating the southeast of the provents and major support

by government -- Federal, State and County; private endeavor; and major support from leading conservation organizations -- again national, state and local.

The Foundation, in a two year membership and fund raising effort, has won the support of approximately 750 individual members, with almost \$150,000 raised to finance its programs.


