### FINE ARTS PROGRAM

Mario Hutton, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, has been invited to offer a "photo-verse" show at the Edison Junior College Community Fine Arts series, this Sunday, October 18 at 8 p.m. The program will be held in the college auditorium, Cypress Lake Road, and will be open to the general public at no charge.

The unusual presentation will include several of Mr. Hutton's latest features, some never shown before. Among these will be a documentary titled "Harbor Queen," depicting in detail the life and activities aboard a commercial fishing boat in the Gulf of Mexico. Also presented will be "My Rhapsody in Blue," "Another Day," and "Halo," all recently completed and covering subjects related to wildlife and conservation in Southwest Florida. The program will further include some of the most popular compositions that Mr. Hutton has shown during the past four years in many Florida cities, New York and the Bahamas.



# PLANNING BOARD, INC. CHARTERED

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Inc. began three years ago as the Sanibel Planning and Zoning Committee, but its activities have encompassed Captiva also, according to President Malcolm Beattie, president of the organization. ## GARBAGE RATE INCREASE

An increase in the rate from the County's \$2.50 per month for one can was approved for \$4.50 in the rear of a dwelling or \$3.50 at roadside on Sanibel and Captiva. County Commissioners approved the increase Wednesday, October 7 with no opposition, when Mrs. Ray Hamilton appeared for the firm operated by her family.

Sanibel Disposal Service must haul the garbage to the Harlem Heights Sanitary Land Fill crossing the toll bridge to do so. Tolls in the past eight months totalled \$1,698, and many houses are remotely located requiring more truck time and mileage.

The new prices become effective for the October 24 billing. Long term contract prices will increase as the contracts are renewed or when the customer originates the request. Civic groups support the increase, understanding that the business cannot continue on a "break-even" basis. During the eight month period ending August 31, the books show a net operating income of \$998 at the old rate. Including the cost of amortizing the franchise and interest on the purchase of the franchise, a net loss of \$1,737 is evident.


Under the new rates, for the same period, the net income will be around \$4,000 to \$6,000, depending on how many subscribe to the back door rate, adjusted to \$1,000 to \$3,000 if the franchise costs are included.

## SIGNS RESTRICTED

The Lee County Commission ordered Frank Pavese, Lee County Attorney, to prepare a sign ordinance limiting its application to Sanibel and Captiva as they are unique and scenic areas on Wednesday, October 7. Commissioner Bruce Scott proposed this alternative plan after representatives from

Commissioner Bruce Scott proposed this alternative plan after representatives from the billboard industries and anti-sign advocates met head-on in a long drawn out debate, with both sides proposing their own sign ordinances. Signmakers wearing identification tags, produced petitions against further restrictions of businessmen, and pointed out the usefulness and value of signs to tourists, and the dependence of businesses in advertising in out of the way locations. Millard Davidson, executive director of the Florida Sign Association in Tallahasseee told the Commissioners the ordinance recommended by the Sanibel-Captiva group was too restrictive and would create a multiplicity of problems.

Anti-sign advocates showed a 15 minute film titled "Noisy Landscape," which indicated that sign restrictions would produce a landscape that could be enjoyed rather than obscured by signs. Signmakers objected because the proposed sign ordinance could be enforced in any area of the county if 50% of the residents petitioned for it, and a later public hearing approved it, but Scott's solution precluded this situation, as the ordinance under preparation will apply only to Sanibel and Captiva. Attorney Pavese said it might be called unconstitutional but a suit would have to be filed first for a judge-



ment. Attorney Mike Jackson, representative of Sanibel and Captiva residents said ne was satisfied with the plan offered by Commissioner Scott.

#### CRABMEAT SALAD CUPS

1 10-oz. package frozen patty shells (6 shells)

1 cup crabmeat, drained and flaked 2 cups bias-sliced celery

- 1 5-oz. can (1/2 cup) water chestnuts, drained and sliced
- 1/4 cup sliced pitted ripe olives

2 Tbsp. sliced green onion

1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/2 cup dairy sour cream

1/4 cup dry white wine

1/4 tsp. slivered almonds, toasted Bake patty shells according to package directions. In 1-1/2 quart casserole, combine crabmeat, celery, water chestnuts, olives and onion. Combine mayonnaise, sour cream, wine, and garlic salt; fold into crab mixture. Bake in 350 oven for 25 minutes or till bubbly, Spoon mixture into patty shells; sprinkle with almonds. Makes 6 servings.

FOR THE WEIGHT WATCHERS SHRIMP ARTICHOKE SALAD WITH LOW CALORIE FRENCH DRESSING

2 lbs. medium size shrimp, cooked, shelled and cleaned

10-oz, packages artichoke hearts. cooked and drained

2 8 oz. cans mandarin oranges, drained 1 head iceberg lettuce, cubed

Combine all ingredients. Place in a salad bowl. Chill well. Just before serving, toss with a low calorie French dressing. Serve with thin, crisp flat bread or melba toast.

#### DRESSING

- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 3/4 cup water

2 Tbsp. corn oil

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce 2 egg yolks

Mix cornstarch with the lemon juice. Gradually add water. Cook over a low flame, stirring constantly until smooth and slightly thickened. Gradually beat in oil and Worcestershire. Beat egg yolks. Gradually beat mixture into the egg yolks. Chill. Shake well before serving. Serve with salad.







#### SANIBEL SHOPPING CENTER TO BE ENLARGED



#### **BEACHVIEW COUNTRY CLUB**










A small craft came into view, and the Marks waved this boat down by waving a towel. This boat proceeded out to the stricken couple in the water rescuing them and towing the rented catamaran to shore. Shortly thereafter, the Coast Guard cutter showed up. The whole operation took about 2-1/2 nerve wracking hours, due to choppy seas. None of the participants wished to be identified, but the sailors in the rented catamaran had been assured the boat could not capsize. They were from Fort Lauderdale, and their rescuers were from Fort Myers, and thanks was given all around, but we are sorry not to know the rescuers from Fort Myers who really saved these people's lives.

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
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#### THE HOUNDS OF HOLDENVILLE

The courteous thing, of course, is to take it easy and "watch your wash" as you go past other boats, especially fishing craft that might be anchored just off your course.

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

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
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
