## FINE ARTS PROGRAM

Mario Hutton, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, has been invited to offer a "photo-verse" show at the Edison Junior College Community Fine Arts series, this Sunday, October 18 at 8 p.m. The program will be held in the college auditorium, Cypress Lake Road, and will be open to the general public at no charge.

The unusual presentation will include several of Mr. Hutton's latest features, some never shown before. Among these will be a documentary titled "Harbor Queen," depicting in detail the life and activities aboard a commercial fishing boat in the Gulf of Mexico. Also presented will be "My Rhapsody in Blue," "Another Day," and "Halo," all recently completed and covering subjects related to wildlife and conservation in Southwest Florida. The program will further include some of the most popular compositions that Mr. Hutton has shown during the past four years in many Florida cities, New York and the Bahamas.

## PLANNING BOARD, INC. CHARTERED

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Inc. began three years ago as the Sanibel Planning and Zoning Committee, but its activities have encompassed Captiva also, according to President Malcolm Beattie, president of the organization.

Secretary of State Tom Adams chartered the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Inc. of Bay Drive, Sanibel when the old organization was renamed recently. Subscribers to the newly chartered board are Beattie and Vice Presidents of the Board, Ingalls R. Simmons of Sanibel and Paul McCulloch of Captiva.

## GARBAGE RATE INCREASE

An increase in the rate from the County's \$2.50 per month for one can was approved for \$4.50 in the rear of a dwelling or \$3.50 at roadside on Sanibel and Captiva. County Commissioners approved the increase Wednesday, October 7 with no opposition, when Mrs. Ray Hamilton appeared for the firm operated by her family.

Sanibel Disposal Service must haul the garbage to the Harlem Heights Sanitary Land Fill crossing the toll bridge to do so. Tolls in the past eight months totalled \$1,698, and many houses are remotely located requiring more truck time and mileage.

The new prices become effective for the October 24 billing. Long term contract prices will increase as the contracts are renewed or when the customer originates the request. Civic groups support the increase, understanding that the business cannot continue on a "break-even" basis. During the eight month period ending August 31, the books show a net operating income of \$998 at the old rate. Including the cost of amortizing the franchise and interest on the purchase of the franchise, a net loss of \$1,737 is evident.


Under the new rates, for the same period, the net income will be around \$4,000 to \$6,000, depending on how many subscribe to the back door rate, adjusted to \$1,000 to \$3,000 if the franchise costs are included.

## SIGNS RESTRICTED

The Lee County Commission ordered Frank Pavese, Lee County Attorney, to prepare a sign ordinance limiting its application to Sanibel and Captiva as they are unique and scenic areas on Wednesday, October 7.

Commissioner Bruce Scott proposed this alternative plan after representatives from the billboard industries and anti-sign advocates met head-on in a long drawn out debate, with both sides proposing their own sign ordinances. Signmakers wearing identification tags, produced petitions against further restrictions of businessmen, and pointed out the usefulness and value of signs to tourists, and the dependence of businesses in advertising in out of the way locations. Millard Davidson, executive director of the Florida Sign Association in Tallahassee told the Commissioners the ordinance recommended by the Sanibel-Captiva group was too restrictive and would create a multiplicity of problems.


Anti-sign advocates showed a 15 minute film titled "Noisy Landscape," which indicated that sign restrictions would produce a landscape that could be enjoyed rather than obscured by signs. Signmakers objected because the proposed sign ordinance could be enforced in any area of the county if 50% of the residents petitioned for it, and a later public hearing approved it, but Scott's solution precluded this situation, as the ordinance under preparation will apply only to Sanibel and Captiva. Attorney Pavese said it might be called unconstitutional but a suit would have to be filed first for a judgement. Attorney Mike Jackson, representative of Sanibel and Captiva residents said he was satisfied with the plan offered by Commissioner Scott.

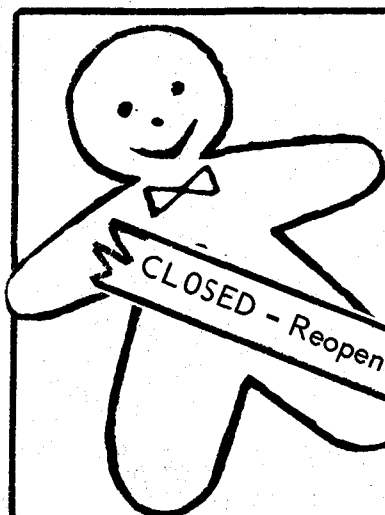

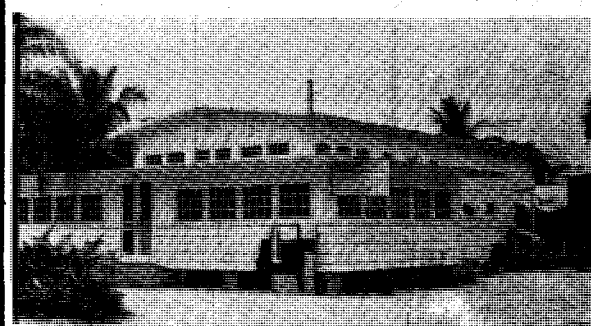

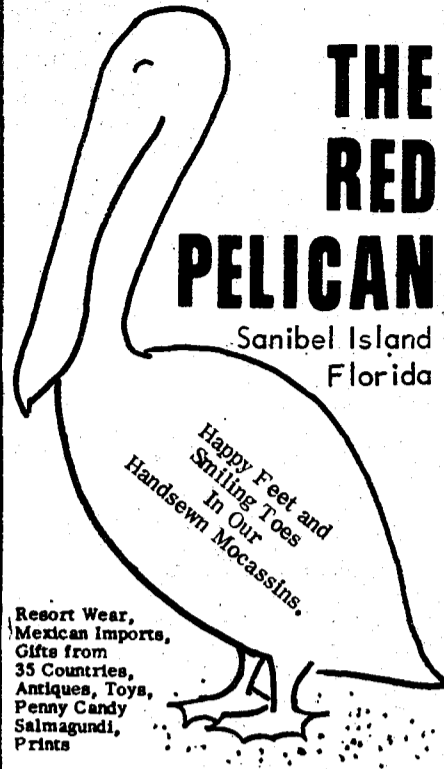

## THE ISLAND CHEF

### CRABMEAT SALAD CUPS

1 10-oz. package frozen patty shells (6 shells)  
 1 cup crabmeat, drained and flaked  
 2 cups bias-sliced celery  
 1 5-oz. can (1/2 cup) water chestnuts, drained and sliced  
 1/4 cup sliced pitted ripe olives  
 2 Tbsp. sliced green onion  
 1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing  
 1/2 cup dairy sour cream  
 1/4 cup dry white wine  
 1/4 tsp. slivered almonds, toasted

Bake patty shells according to package directions. In 1-1/2 quart casserole, combine crabmeat, celery, water chestnuts, olives and onion. Combine mayonnaise, sour cream, wine, and garlic salt; fold into crab mixture. Bake in 350 oven for 25 minutes or till bubbly. Spoon mixture into patty shells; sprinkle with almonds. Makes 6 servings.

### FOR THE WEIGHT WATCHERS

#### SHRIMP ARTICHOKE SALAD WITH LOW CALORIE FRENCH DRESSING

2 lbs. medium size shrimp, cooked, shelled and cleaned  
 2 10-oz. packages artichoke hearts, cooked and drained  
 2 8 oz. cans mandarin oranges, drained  
 1 head iceberg lettuce, cubed

Combine all ingredients. Place in a salad bowl. Chill well. Just before serving, toss with a low calorie French dressing. Serve with thin, crisp flat bread or melba toast.

#### LOW CALORIE FRENCH DRESSING

1 Tbsp. cornstarch  
 1/4 cup lemon juice  
 3/4 cup water  
 2 Tbsp. corn oil  
 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce  
 2 egg yolks

Mix cornstarch with the lemon juice. Gradually add water. Cook over a low flame, stirring constantly until smooth and slightly thickened. Gradually beat in oil and Worcestershire. Beat egg yolks. Gradually beat mixture into the egg yolks. Chill. Shake well before serving. Serve with salad.

### THE ISLAND GARDENER

Grass mowing time is coming to an end. As the cooler weather and the shorter days approach your grass ceases to grow according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Assn. (FNGA). This does not mean that you need to reduce the care of your lawn. Root systems continue to develop in the winter months and the grass can only sustain itself by a good watering. An application of fertilizer at this time would be beneficial to your lawn.

Winter weeds that invade your fine lawn grasses in the winter are there only because the grass is weak. It is not unusual to find mole crickets in the lawn during this time of year, and if these are not controlled they will cause a decline of the grass. Lawns infested with mole crickets have the feeling of a soft carpet when you walk over the area. Two materials are acceptable for the control of mole crickets: chlordane and kepone. Both of these materials come in the form of a bait or in liquid form. The liquids are mixed with water and sprayed over the entire lawn area. If you are using baits the lawn should be wet before the bait is scattered over the lawn.

Mole crickets can fly. They migrate from one lawn to another, but if you have your lawn sprayed thoroughly the crickets will not last long when he burrows into the lawn.

Hello Folks:

I try to cover the holidays as I go along. When I was still a law student I met a lawyer who worked for the old Westchester Title Guarantee and Trust Co., at White Plains, N.Y. His name was Howard Rosenblum. He was a true gentleman in every sense of the word. Among other things he was a gifted concert pianist and very proficient in the three "Bs." He was married and he and his wife lived on the second floor of a two family house in Mount Vernon, N.Y. He had a beautiful grand piano in his living room and when I visited he would play for me by the hour. His Grieg renditions would transport me into another world.

He bought himself a radio -- one of the first operated on house current instead of batteries. It was made for D.C. and you had to use an adapter on it. The set almost took him away from the piano. The station that came in best was KDKA of Pittsburgh, and he never missed a program for quite some time.

It was Howard who first got me interested in the Jewish Holy Days, I learned about Rosh Hashannah (New Year's Day) which occurred this year on Oct. 1st, I learned about the fast of Gedulla, and of the Day of Attonment (Yom Kippur) occurring this year on October 10.

I learned that the Hebrews who were western Semites gave birth to Judaism, Christianity and Islam. I learned about the Talmud, the Gemara and Halakoth. I read Leviticus carefully for the first time. Read Leviticus XVI - 29 to 34 and you will understand Yom Kippur. If you do a little research you will find that the Old Testament and the Talmud are much more matter of fact and down to earth as compared with the ethereal quality of the New Testament. Once you really get started you'll read them both.

It's hard for many people to realize that Our Lord, Jesus Christ, celebrated and participated in the Holy Days of the Jews. This conclusion is inescapable, yet, hatred and bigotry still persist. In Ireland, Catholics and Protestants kill each other. In the East, Islam and Judaism are virtually at war. They all ignore and disregard the truth, in spite of the fact that they all preach monotheism. If the truth were to prevail war and hatred would give way to peace and love.

God has created man and endowed him with marvelous talents -- may man learn the value of these talents and their proper use. A happy New Year to many of my dear friends.

**QUAIL INTRODUCED ON SANIBEL**

Bennett and Marge Wright of Shalimar, always curious if quail would live on the island, had six pairs of the birds flown in from Eaton, Ohio, three weeks ago. The birds were set loose near Shalimar, and so far have survived well, as they return to the bird feeding station twice daily, and there are indications of nesting and settling in, if hawks, raccoons and vultures will allow them to propagate.

The Conservation Department is much interested in the experiment too. "There is no reason why quail cannot survive on the Islands as there is a great deal of seed grasses for them to feed on," said John Mark.

John and Mary Mark of Shalimar were unwitting hero and heroine of a little drama October 4. Two of the guests, Mr. & Mrs. C. M. The vessel was out on the horizon, 4-1/2 to 5 miles from shore when this happened. The Sanders notified the Marks who, in turn, got in touch with the Coast Guard at Fort Myers Beach. The watchers kept an eye on the capsized boat and the two occupants, now swimming in the water and trying to hold on to the overturned ship.

A small craft came into view, and the Marks waved this boat down by waving a towel. This boat proceeded out to the stricken couple in the water rescuing them and towing the rented catamaran to shore. Shortly thereafter, the Coast Guard cutter showed up. The whole operation took about 2-1/2 nerve wracking hours, due to choppy seas. None of the participants wished to be identified, but the sailors in the rented catamaran had been assured the boat could not capsize. They were from Fort Lauderdale, and their rescuers were from Fort Myers, and thanks was given all around, but we are sorry not to know the rescuers from Fort Myers who really saved these people's lives.

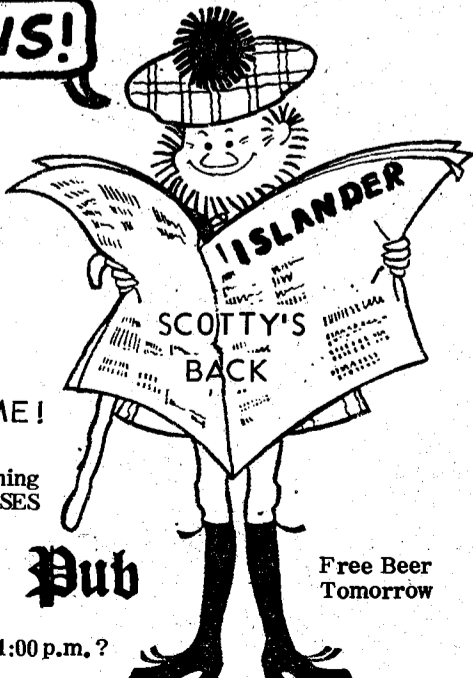

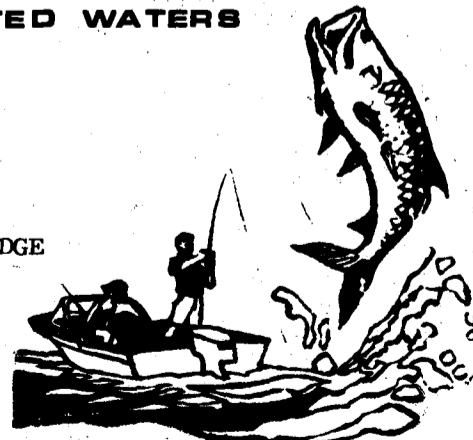

**GAC PROPOSES FAHKAHATCHEE SWAP**

GAC has agreed to turn over to the State of Florida the Fahkahatchee Strand area in Collier County as penalty for overdredging of lands at Cape Coral. The proposal calls for only a nominal cash settlement, but the lands are worth \$731,500 in watershed property, and state cabinet officials will consider the swap on Tuesday.

"We are excited about increasing our land inventory, and putting more land back into the public domain," said Fred Vidzes, State Division and Land Management Director.

The proposed settlement was worked out between GAC officials, Vidzes and James Apthorp with other state agency officials. State engineers said that 5,069,918 cubic yards of river bottom were removed from the Caloosahatchee without benefit of permits from the state during 1959 and 1965 by Gulf American Co., previous owners of the property before GAC. The overfill covers 172 acres, and Apthorp recently told Cabinet officials that his staff approved a total settlement of \$765,000.

The proposal before the Cabinet includes a recommendation that GAC pay \$38,000 to the state to cover the cost of surveys of the Cape Coral area.

Initially, Tom Adams, Secretary of State, said he would ask GAC to pay the state \$2 million compensation for the overdredging, and so there is some question as to his reaction to the pro-

posal on Tuesday.

The main part of the settlement provides that GAC convey to the state the Fahkahatchee Strand in Collier County, a natural watershed area between Naples and Dade County composed of several thousand acres, which is a watershed supplying water to the Everglades National Park. The land must be appraised before the state will know just how many acres are involved in the swap. Vidzes said the attempt would be made to recover the Strand, as that is what the money would be used for anyhow. This has been an issue of much interest to persons interested in preserving the Everglades and its valuable, irreplaceable wildlife and marine life.

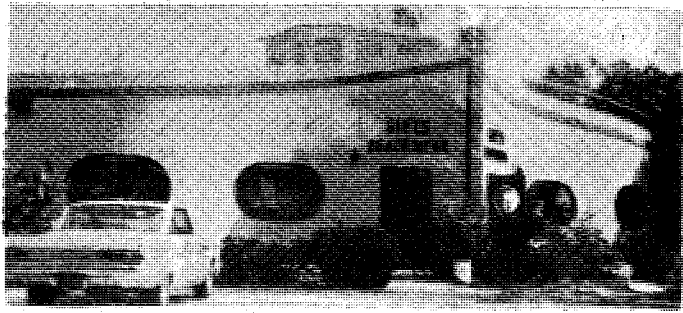

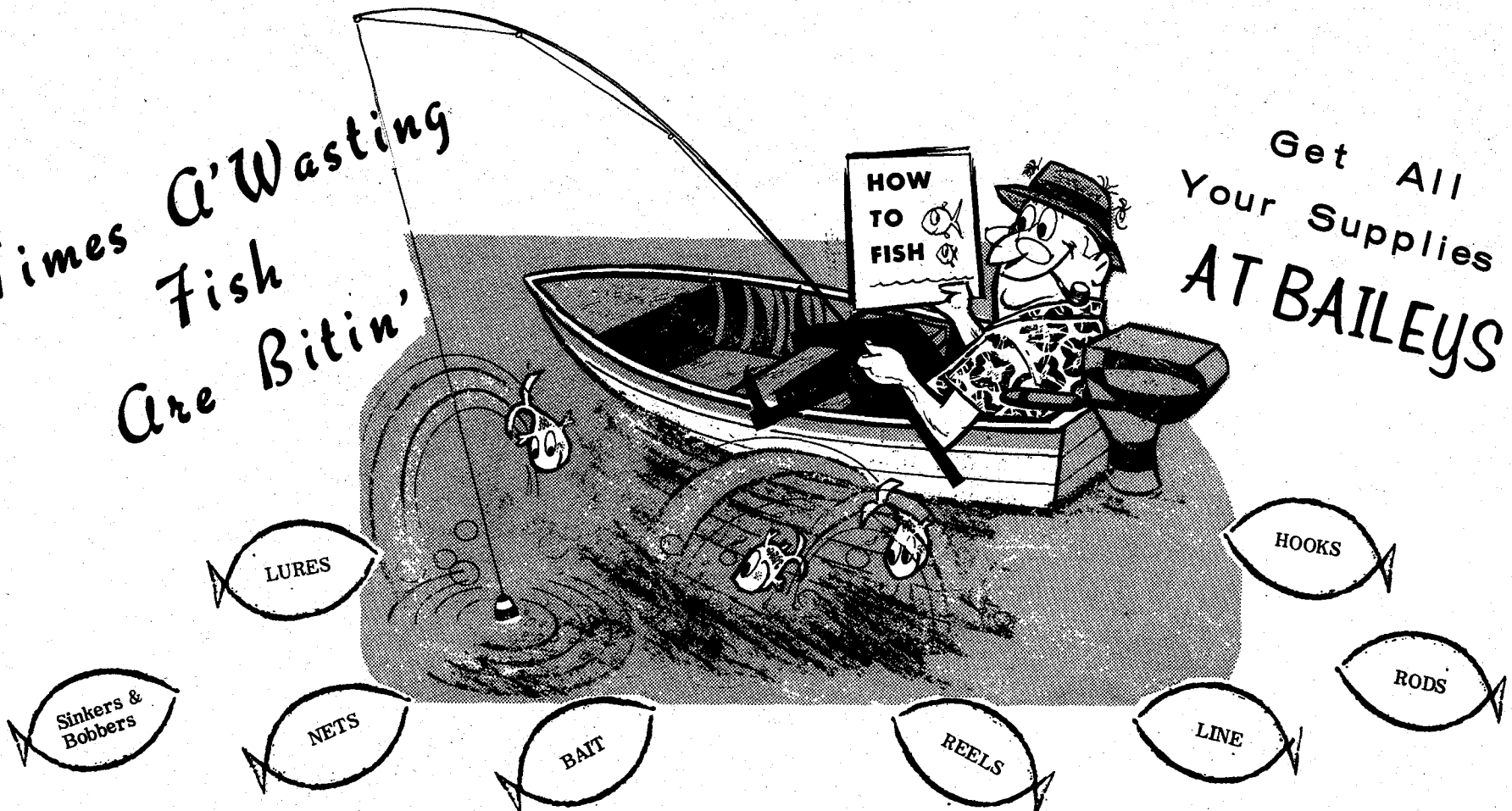
