BRIDGE REPAIRS DELAYED

Traffic continued to be disrupted between midnight and six a.m. for several extra days on the Sanibel Bridge, when the span had to remain open for repairs directly under the bascules. Pilings had to be driven for repairs of the channel fenders, and bad weather forced postponement of the work for several days.

TIN CAN BRIGADE IS SUCCESS

The tin can clean-up campaign headed by members of the Community Association received cooperation and help from the Lions, the Boy Scouts, the American Legion and the Chamber of Commerce.

The County had cut the grass the day before the clean-up started, so that all the old beer cans and bottles lay exposed ready for the clean-up groups. Several huge bags were collected and the Hamiltons of the Sanibel Disposal carried the trash away for disposal, leaving the Island nice and clean and we hope it will stay this way, at least for a little while. Don't let YOU be called a litter bug!

SPECIAL ZONING FOR SANIBEL & CAPTIVA

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board recommended special zoning for these two unique islands which will include density control and height limitations, which the Lee County Commission received favorably Wednesday.

A letter from Mr. Malcolm Beattie, president of the island board, suggested a minimum of 7,500 square feet of land for a single family residence or first unit of housing and an additional 6,000 square feet for the second unit, with 2,500 square feet for the third and additional units. Others concurring in the report and aiding in the study were Dr. Ingalls H. Simmons, director of the Southwest Florida Medical Program, V.G. MacKenzie, retired U.S. Public Health Service assistant surgeon general, and Dr. Joseph W. Lawrence, County Health Officer.

AUTO BROKEN INTO

Mr. George Lindsay of Chicago parked his car north of the Sanibel Light to walk and shell on the beach, with his wife and daughter, and returned to find it broken into. Ed Jones, sheriff's deputy, investigated, reporting that Mr. Lindsay lost \$1,510 in cash, plus a wristwatch and his driver's license, which were left in the glove compartment of his car.

Mr. Lindsay, faculty member of the University of Illinois, came to Florida last week for his daughter's wedding in Hialeah, then came to see the famed Sanibel and Captiva beaches.

A vent in the car had been pried open and the glove compartment rifled. Several other similar robberies in the immediate area have occurred recently. Deputies are continuing to investigate.

NATURE PROGRAMS AT SANIBEL SCHOOL

For the second year children attending Sanibel Elementary School will be treated to a series of programs dealing with natural history, wildlife and conservation. The project got underway last week when Charles LeBuff, representing the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and Caretta Research, set up in one of the classrooms a tank where baby loggerhead turtles will be cared for by the pupils before being released next Spring. This week a film on turtle egg-laying along the islands' shoreline was shown.

The Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society will again sponsor a number of weekly shows during coming months. The first will be conducted by Mario Hutton on December 8, when he will present several of his new "photo-verse" creations having a special appeal for younger audiences. After the opening of the local Audubon winter season, many of the evening programs held at the Community House will be repeated the following day for the benefit and delight of children of all grades. These events will include talks, movies and slides presented by noted speakers, who have pledged their wholehearted cooperation.

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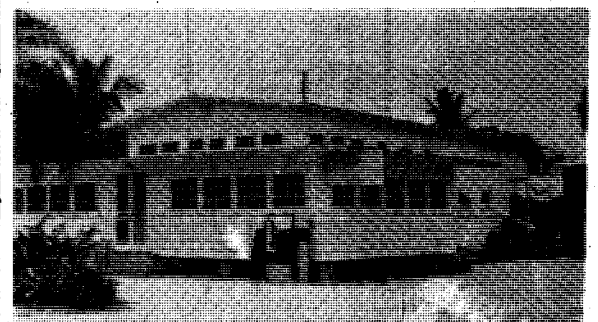

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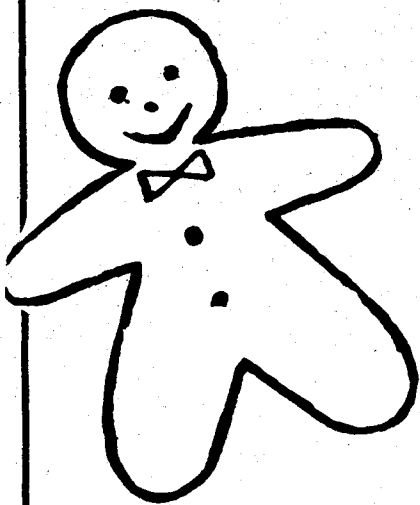
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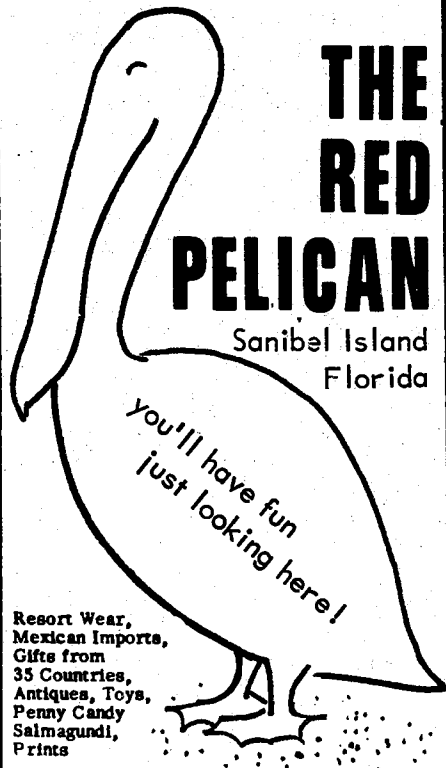
SHALIMAR SHELLERS BUSY

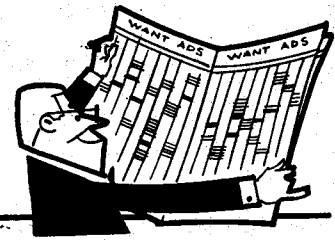

THE ISLAND CHEF

SAUTEED TROUT WITH MUSHROOMS

- 4 medium-size fresh trout, cleaned
- Salt
- Pepper
- Flour
- 4 Tbsp. butter
- 2 Tbsp. pure vegetable oil
- 8 slices bacon, cut in 1/2 inch pieces
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 large clove of garlic
- 1 can (about 1 pound) girolle mushrooms, drained, or 1 pound small mushrooms
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

Trim the fins and tails of the trout because they might burn during cooking. The easiest way is to clip them with a pair of scissors.

The trout is sprinkled with salt and pepper inside and out and is then rolled in flour to coat it. To shake off the excess flour, hold the fish by the tail so the coating is not disturbed.

To saute the fish, heat 2 tablespoons butter and the oil in a large skillet until it is very hot. Hold the trout by the tail and place it, head first, in the pan, letting the tail fall away from you so the fat won't spatter and burn your fingers.

Cook the trout 6 to 7 minutes on medium heat. Turn them carefully with one or two broad spatulas and cook the second side another 6 to 7 minutes.

While the fish cooks, cook the bacon in a second skillet over medium heat until it is almost crisp. Drain off and discard the fat. Add 2 tablespoons butter, the chopped onion and the garlic and cook 2 to 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the mushrooms, lemon juice, salt and pepper. For fresh mushrooms, cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Canned mushrooms need only to be heated. Arrange trout on a warm platter, garnish with mushrooms and lemon, if desired. Sprinkle with parsley. Makes 4 servings.

THE ISLAND GARDENER

Some people enjoy growing the Thanksgiving and Christmas cacti according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA.) These two plants add beauty during the holiday season to any home. Some people have excellent luck with these plants, but many people do not realize that extremely bright light will reduce the flowering of these two plants. Do not over water the holiday cacti. This causes a soft, slimy rot to develop at the soil level causing further reduction of flowers and loss of the plant. A soluble fertilizer applied once every three weeks will promote good growth and many flowers. Keep in a cool room where there is little light from early sunrise until sundown. The cacti for the holiday season are light responsive much like the poinsettias.

Many people ask the question about mums or potted chrysanthemums as to their ability to grow outside. Most nurserymen will tell you that these plants if properly cared for and given the right cultural practices can produce flowers next year. As a rule a pot of chrysanthemums will contain 6 to 8 plants. When the flowers have finished blooming clip off the stems to a height of 4 inches. Separate the individual plants and set them in a well prepared bed of half peat and half sand. Your individual plants will then begin to grow and produce new shoots for next year's flowers. Take advantage of someone's gift to you and have flowers blooming at the next holiday season.

Since this is the time approaching holiday seasons many of you will think about using decorations. There are many native materials that can be used to add brightness to your home. Buds from magnolias, milkweeds, punk trees, hickory nut, oaks, and others work well in a flower arrangement or as a combination wreath for Christmas. All of these materials will readily accept spray paint or spray shellac. Utilize some of nature's materials for an unusual decoration.

Roses are in full growth now. The cool weather brings on larger sized flowers and less problems with insects according to the FNGA. Your local County Extension Office now has a new publication on insect pests of roses. At the present time this is available to you for the asking. Check with your local nurseryman or garden supply dealer for the best chemicals to use in controlling winter pests and diseases on roses.

MATT TANZA'S MEMORIES

Hello Folks:

Celebrated my birth anniversary. For me it is a day of memories filled with joy and sorrow. My mother always went all out on my birthday. She prepared a feast - she adorned the dining room with flowers - and had the whole family together for a holiday dinner. This rite, she continued until the year of her death.

The day always brings me thoughts of death. My father died on my birthday in his fifty-fourth year. It was my first intimate contact with death. My father, too, always remembered my birthday. Even on the day he died he left his usual gift for me with my mother - a fifty cent piece and a box of candy.

Since then death has become a companion and a way of life. As one grows older you find this to be more and more true. I went out with my Chief of Police on Memorial Day a few years ago to decorate the graves of the deceased members of the force. There were over thirty of them, all of whom I knew and many of whom had been very close to me. Years ago my gang had a lunch club - we met every day, when possible, for lunch. There were ten of us. There are none of the others left today. Even the owner of the restaurant is dead. Almost all my old close friends and associates are in the cemetery. For me this day is a sort of Memorial Day. I remember all these things. I remember the death of my mother, the death of my first wife, the death of my grand-daughter. I think the death that hit me the hardest was the death of my first wife. It took me a long time to find peace after that.

In my mind I stand at a grave side. It is a newly opened grave. It is a morning in February - little patches of snow are here and there - but it is a warm, bright, sunny morning - almost a morning of Spring. A casket containing the body of my wife is placed in the outer protective covering and a grass mat spread on top. The minister reads the last of the service. My brother grasps me by the arm. We walk away. My children follow and we return to our home. After the mourners have eaten and refreshed themselves they depart. My daughter returns to her husband and her family. I am alone with my sons. I retire for a few minutes to compose my thoughts. My thoughts are of the eternal fires of hell and of eternal damnation - I am immersed in the bleakness and despair of death. I discover that the curse of righteousness is an appalling sense of guilt.

The peace of kismet soon returns. Two things about time you can swy with certainty - "I am" and "I was". "I will be" is just a hope. The true answer I believe is that set forth in Ezekiel - Chapter 18, Verse 32 - "For I have no pleasure in the death of him that dieth, saith the Lord God: Wherefore turn yourselves, and live ye."

Yes, live - and as Oliver Wendell Holmes has so beautifully said it
 "Yes, pray for whom thou lovest; if uncounted wealth were thine -
 The treasures of the boundless deep, the riches of the mine -
 Thou couldst not to thy cherished friends a gift so dear impart,
 As the earnest benediction of a deeply loving heart."

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SECRET SURVEY SAYS OKEECHOBEE DYING

A confidential federal survey indicates that Lake Okeechobee, water supply for millions on the East Coast will die from over-enrichment within two years according to a Tampa paper. Others guess the time will be in 15 years.

Edward Dail, executive director of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District, disagreed with the report, saying, "This is no lake Erie, and it is not likely to become one."

In an article by outdoor writer Herb Allen, the Tampa Tribune quoted from a report by the U.S. Geological Survey of the Lake "as shown by the characteristics of its phytoplankton (algae), can doubtlessly be classified as an eutrophic (dying) lake.

The report also said the increased growth of algae in the lake could kill its recreational value in as little as two years, or it might take 10 to 15 years to kill it", according to the newspaper report.

The Tribune said the report contradicted a Flood Control District Survey of June 30 that reported: "There is no danger in Lake Okeechobee of massive eutrophication (over-enrichment) and increased algae growth.

A copy of the federal survey was sent to Boyd F. Joyner of the State Water Resources Division in Ocala. When asked for comment, Joyner would not say if he had seen the Survey.

The Tribune story quoted Dail as stating he had not amended the state report after the federal survey was released because "We did not think of it."

The newspaper story quoted Dail as saying the report might have been a little premature. Dail reported from his Palm Beach home that the federal survey was inadequate because it did not reflect a true condition of the state of the Lake.

Chairman of South Florida's Flood Control District, Robert Padrick, said that government agencies are not going to hold a funeral for Lake Okeechobee. "We are on top of the problems daily, and we see a long healthy life for Lake Okeechobee."

"Our agency is the first to undertake a complete study. We have three biologists studying not only Lake Okeechobee but all the area Watersheds."

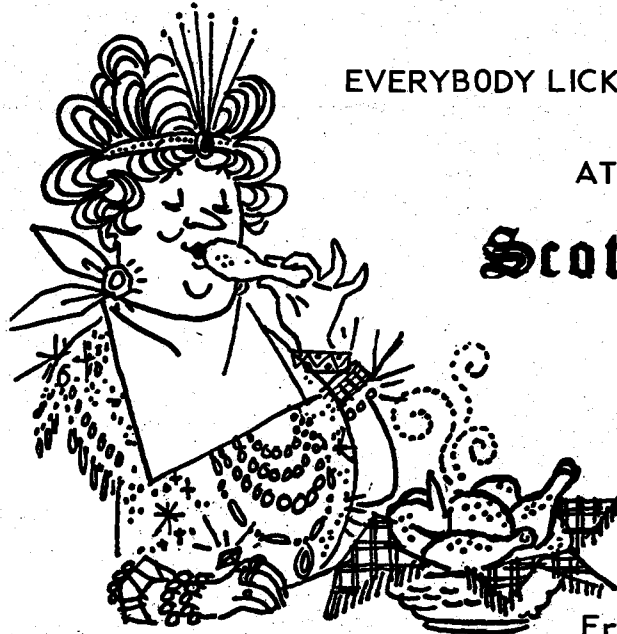
"Stop logs have been used to retard the downstream flow and distribute the flow more evenly", said Padrick. "We have denied permits that might dump garbage into the Kissimmee River."

Padrick said a crash survey had been ordered for all Florida Waterways that might possibly be reaching the pollution danger point.

"We are taking all precautions to protect all of our lakes. We recognize that the balance of nature is a delicate thing, and we have to study the situation daily," he said. The United States Geological Survey is working with the Central and Southern Flood Control District in studying the problems of Lake Okeechobee and all other waterways. He added that the USGA states that "it is not at the explosive state yet."

AMERICAN LEGION LICENSE IN JEOPARDY

The license of the American Legion Club of Sanibel was placed in jeopardy, with a possible fine of \$250.00 and 60 day suspension of operation until Paul Stahlin, officer of the Post was fingerprinted. DeWitt Coburn, district supervisor for the State Beverage Division of the State Department of Business Regulation made the charge against the club, and removed any penalty after the fingerprinting was taken care of.

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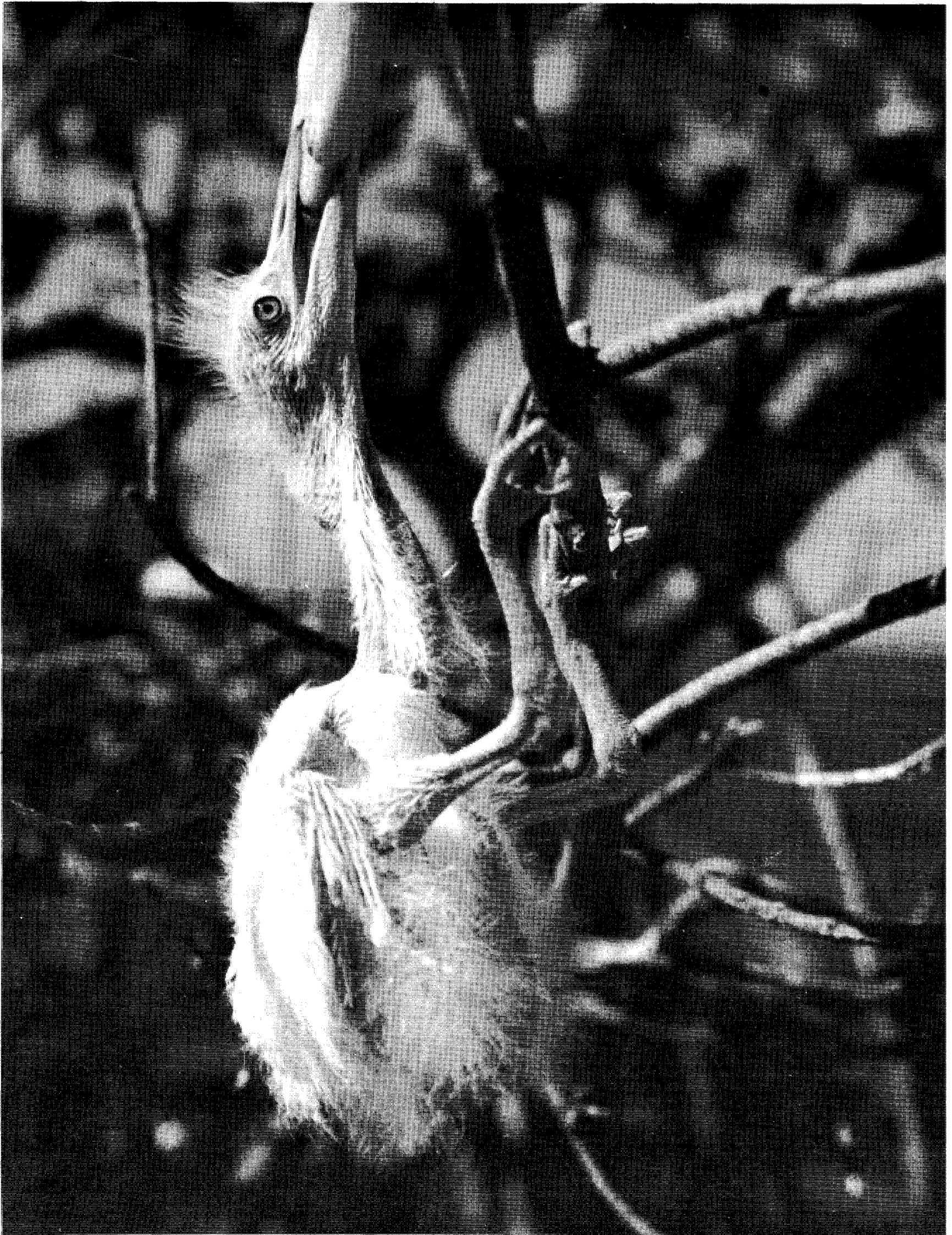

CHRISTMAS SEAL CAMPAIGN

The 1970 Christmas Seal Campaign opens officially on Tuesday, November 10. The Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association of Southwest Florida has already mailed 100,000 letters containing Christmas Seals to homes in the five-county area and will send out an additional 50,000 within the next two weeks, according to Leo F. Thomas, Chairman of the Association's Board of Trustees. The Association, with headquarters in Fort Myers and a branch office in Sarasota, serves Lee, Charlotte, Collier, Manatee and Sarasota.

National Honorary Chairman this year is Gail Patrick Jackson, movie actress of the 30's and 40's and veteran of 61 films. Now retired from films, she is presently executive producer of the "Perry Mason" TV series. Some of her close friends have succumbed to emphysema and she is eager to help in the campaign.

Those receiving Christmas Seals this year will find them most interesting in that each seal on the sheet of 100 is different. Together, they form a picture of an old-fashioned town. Among the 100 seals, one can discover every imaginable holiday activity -- Santa, reindeer, a parade, carolers, trees and gaily decorated houses, building and towers. It is anticipated that they will become a collectors' item. Theme this year is "Let's Stick Together."

Funds received by the local area association will be used to finance school health programs, patient services, medical education, research and public health education concerning TB, emphysema, other respiratory diseases and the associated problems of air pollution and smoking.
