NIGHT WORK ON BRIDGE ENDS

John P. Langan, inspector and overseer for the Sanibel Bridge work being done by River Construction Company said piling beneath the bascule leaf on the west side had been completely placed, and the bascule will no longer have to remain open during early morning hours. The remaining piling will be placed to link the piles with the fender system.

"The rest of the work is daytime and should be completed in two weeks," said Langan, who was hired by the County Commission to oversee the work,

A study on the bridge and its approaches was completed, and revealed nothing basically wrong with the structure in any way. The bridge, which was opened in 1962 was intact the first six years after construction, but in the past year has been hit five times by barges. Total damage was \$60,000, most of which has been covered by insurance, but the last and latest damage has not been covered and the County may have to sue for this money. No further "beefing-up" of the repaired fenders is contemplated, but a flood gauge and two way radio will be installed on the bridge to inform ship captains of cross tides, winds and other variables at the bascule part of the bridge, and aid them in navigation so that the fenders will have further protection from collision.

FICTIONAL ACCOUNT OF SNOWY EGRET

by william weber johnson

Snowy, the Story of an Egret by Griffing Bancroft (McCall: \$4.95)

The Leucophyox thula or snowy egret is a long-legged, long-billed white heron who during his mating season wears magnificent lacy plumes. The popularity of these nuptial plumes in millinery circles was once so great that the bird was killed off almost to extinction. What the milliners and the professional plume hunters did not quite achieve may be accomplished with finality by pollution and ecological imbalance.


This, in brief, is the substance of what Griffing Bancroft, a tireless bird-watcher and passionate conservationist, has to say in "Snowy, the Story of an Egret."

The subject is one that lends itself to preachment, Bancroft, a one-time CBS commentator and grandson of Hubert Howe Bancroft, the California historian, avoids it. Instead he tells a factionalized account of the life of one of these egrets from in-fancy on a mangrove island of the west coast of Florida to its death in Venezuela, victim of a poacher's gun.

It is one of those rare stories that can be read on may levels. It is written with direct, poetic simplicity that a child can understand. The perils, hardships and joys of Snowy's life are the kind a child can grasp and share.

On a more sophisticated level it is a beautifully detailed essay in natural history, not only on the egret but on other herons, shorebirds and seabirds and the ways in which their hunting, flocking, breeding and nesting are intricately interbalanced. It is a balance which predators - hawks, eagles, owls, cats, alligators, snakes - sometimes disturb but never destroy. The role of destroyer is reserved for man.

The dumping of sewerage into Florida waterways including residential areas under development was banned Friday by the Southern and Central Florida Flood Control District.

A unanimous vote by the District's governing board affects 14 exisiting canals, five of which are under construction or proposed waterways and three proposed reservoirs. Robert Padrick of Fort Pierce and FCD Chairman said the pollution problem had to be solved somehow.

The Board voted unanimously not to issue any further permits for dumping waste into the waterways, which include several metropolitan streams in the Miami and Fort Lauderdale areas, unless it can be proved that the flow of water can handle such waste without pollution. This ban is considered an important movement and trend to be followed by other Flood Control Districts, as it sets a precedent.

HODGES ASKS 20 MILLION FOR CANAL

Natural Resources Director Randolph Hodges proposed an increase in federal funding of the Cross-Florida Barge Canal from \$7 million to \$20 million, Former U. S. Interior Secretary Steward L. Udall accused Hodges of being devoted to the extermination of natural resources, and not conversant with the facts.

Udall intimated that Sen. Spessard Holland became upset about the proposal and showed disapproval of it. The Canal has been the butt of much controversy as being unfeasible and detrimental to the State in many ways, mainly because of its maintenance expense. Progress of the Canal has been very disappointing due to many unforeseen factors, and none of it is up to useful quotas.



There were a number of character parts, all well and creditably achieved, and the production was enjoyed by a packed house all three nights.



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

THE ISLAND CHEF

CLAM-RICE-PEA CASSEROLE

- 16 oz. minced clams
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 1 can (10-1/2 oz.) condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 tsp. steak sauce
- 1/2 tsp. curry powder
- 1 small onion, minced
- 1 package (10 oz.) frozen peas 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- Paprika

Drain clams, reserving liquid. Use liquid to cook rice and set aside. Mix next 5 ingredients in saucepan and bring to boil, stirring. Pour half the mixture into shallow 1-1/2 quart baking dish. Then add layers of rice, clams and peas. Pour remaining sauce over top and bake in hot oven (400 F) about 30 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika, Makes 6 servings,

THE ISLAND GARDENER

Lawn grasses are going off color at this time of year because of the short days and the cooler nights says the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). It is a little late to fertilize your lawn but you can sow ryegrass or other winter annual grasses. There are many on the market. You may want to use a combination of fescue or bent or bluegrass, but the most study of all and the most rapid growing is the annual ryegrass. It can be seeded directly in your planted lawn at the rate of 10 pounds per thousand feet. Germination should occur in about two weeks if the area is kept moist. You need not add fertilizer at the time of planting, but after you mow the winter grass once it should have a complete fertilizer applied at the rate of 15-20 pounds per thousand square feet. Cool weather stimulates ryegrass and it will produce a thick, luxuriant mat if properly watered and fertilized. This grass will retain its color and beauty until March or April.

Ryegrass is sometimes susceptible to a disease called damping off. The symptoms are a soft, water-soaked area that leaves threadlike growth within the suspected spot. The correct name for the disease is called Pythium. If this condition develops in your newly planted ryegrass consult with your County Extension Office for the best control or patronize your local garden supply store or nurseryman. Different materials are available in different localities within the state.

Petunias are a winter annual and produce the majority of color around the home. Unlike the salvia they can survive freezing. Although the leaves may be frozen stiff the plant will survive and go ahead and blossom. Buds which produce flowers may be damaged but new ones will soon be initiated according to the FNGA. Petunias can also use bi-

weekly applications of soluble fertilizer.
