### FUNDS AUTHORIZED FOR EROSION SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION

The United States Senate Public Works Committee approved an omnibus bill which authorized the U. S. Corps of Engineers to work on erosion control projects, including the Lee County Beach Erosion Control Bill established by Rep. James A. Haley, Democrat of Florida.

Haley brought the bill up and through the office of management and budget, the Corps of Engineers reported a need for \$3,250,000 for erosion control projects for Estero, Captiva and Gasparilla Islands. This included \$608,400 for Lee County Beach Erosion Control alone. Federal provisions are for matching funds for public beaches and for private beachfronts to which the public is given rights of usage.

federal monies actually appropriated yet, but the authorization does not expire, once passed by Congress.

# FOUNDATION MEETING

A major step forward in an estuarine research program for the entire West Coast of Florida will be announced by Dr. Robert E. Smith, Director of the Florida Institute of Oceanography, at the second annual meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Inc., Sanibel Community House, 8 p.m., Monday, December 7, 1970. The development, which assures the establishment of this program, was made possible by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and one of its donors.

are told that the benne seed was brought to the coastal areas of Georgia and South Carolina by the slaves, for whom it was a prized possession believed to be a source of health and good luck. Planted near the slave quarters of the early plantations, benne became a traditional feature of the Old South, Cooks in the "Big House" kitchens used the rich, spicy, honey-colored seed to make delicious and exotic confections, some of which are still made in the kitchens and bakeries of those areas, as former residents and visitors recall with nostalgia.





#### DAWN WAS ON HER HAIR

#### THE ISLAND GARDENER

If you happen to own several camellia bushes, no doubt you are enjoying the flowers. Camellias, however, are subject to several scales says the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). These scales can be controlled by repeated applications of ethion.

Most people are reluctant to cut the camellia blossoms because they fear it will injure the bush. Actually, camellias will produce more shoots and more flowers if part of the growth is removed. When you cut a flower it is suggested that you take at least a 4-6 inch piece of the stem. After the flower has wilted the stem can then be inserted into a mixture of half sand and half peat and a rooted cutting will result in about 6-8 weeks. After the cutting has developed a good root system, set it where you want it to grow. When spring arrives, fertilize this young cutting once a month. By this time next year you should have a plant feet tall with two or three flower buds.

The winter months bring on many red spider problems. Azaleas and citrus both are susceptible to this insect. If you notice excessive leaf drop on your azalea plants with yellow areas on the upper surface then it is just possible that you have red spider. Spider mites can be controlled with an application of Kelthane, Trithion or Ethion.

One of the most delicately flavored fruits grown in the tropics is the mango, at least according to some people. Mangos at this time of year show no indication of producing any blossoms, but in a few weeks there will be new growth and blossoms appearing. Before this happens, I would suggest that you apply a nutritional spray to the tree as well as a neutral copper or zineb spray. Either one of these fungicides will prevent scab, a disease that attacks the leaves and the fruit. This is not the only spray that you will need to apply, for repeated applications will be necessary to give you clean fruit next year.

Hello Folks:

Are there certain days in the past when you remember exactly where you were and what you were doing? For instance, I remember the day of the attack on Pearl Harbor. It was a Sunday. I had hooked up a radio in the bathroom and was enjoying a good, old-fashioned tub bath. The increditable news came over the radio. Another time I was taking a train back home out of Grand Central Station in New York, I picked up a World Telegram before boarding. The first thing that struck me as I opened the paper was a short two-column item on the front page announcing the first atom bomb attack in history. Even the item sounded as though it didn't believe itself. I think this was the dividing line between the past and the present. A new age dawned, spawned by war and hatred and we are still trying to adjust to it.

In a lighter vein, I worked for two summers for the American Express. This was back when I was attending N.Y.U. There were two big rival express companies at that time; the American Express and the Adams Express. Both companies did a tremendous business. At the end of my freshman year I got a job with the American Express. I was assigned to the On-Hand department on 44th Street in New York City. It was contained in a large four story warehouse. On-Hand items consisted of shipments refused by the consignee or items where the consignee could not be located for one reason or another. For example, a shipment would consist of six items but only five could be located at the time of delivery; the consignee would refuse to accept the five so they went to the On-Hand department.

At the warehouse, I worked on the fourth floor. This was where the goods packaged in cardboard cartons were stored. When a shipment came in we had to inventory it and store it away in bins. As the tangles were straightened out we would collect the item to be shipped out and take them down to the first floor in the freight elevator for the delivery trucks. I got a big kick out of operating the freight elevator. It had no controls except two cables running through the elevator. You pulled one way to get the elevator to go up and another to get it to go down. You had to let the cable slide through your hands so it was necessary to wear gloves. It had no safety devices on it whatsoever and so had an intriguing element of adventure about it.

The third floor contained baggage and foodstuffs and perishables. I had a couple of friends on the third floor and I often had lunch with them. We would bring our lunch and spread it out on top of a case and take our time to eat and relax. One time there was a large trunk on the third floor and we used it as a table for a couple of days. A few days after this trunk came in a terrific odor started spreading over the third floor. It was determined that it emanated from the trunk and the police were called.

Turned out that the trunk contained the corpse of a woman. It didn't take the police too long to solve the case. Seems a fellow, I forget his name, killed his wife, put the body in a trunk and shipped it to a phony address via American Express. The same modus operandi has been followed in subsequent cases but I believe this was the first time it was tried. Needless to say the restaurants in the vicinity did a much better lunch business after this.

### TWO FIRMS CITED FOR MUD IN SANIBEL RIVER

John Amis Engineers, Inc. and B. J. Dragline Operations of Fort Myers were cited Tuesday by the Florida Dept. of Air and Water Pollution Control for muddying to excess the Sanibel River last month.

John C. Barnett, regional engineer for the Pollution Department said the citation is a warning this time, but if the offense is repeated persons or businesses causing the pollution could be fined \$5,000 a day, as long as the pollution continues.

"We observed them digging in the Sanibel River," Barnett said, "Samples of the river were taken and an investigation started. We determined there was an excessive amount of turbidity in the water caused by the dragline's work." Barnett stated that turpidity is determined by comparing the muddled part of the river with the river's normal cloudiness. The law allows turbidity up to 50 measuring units above normal conditions. The citation was issued when analysis revealed the dragline operations had increased the river's cloudiness by 80 measuring units, about eight times the river's

rual condition. A lesser factor in the citation was the dragline's further fouling up the

r by tearing up water weeds, Barnett stated.




