



SHALIMAR COTTAGES



LETTER RECEIVED ABOUT

SANIBEL PIER

All letters and telegrams of inquiry sent out by the Chamber of Commerce have been answered except one sent to Sen. Ed Gurney and Congressman James A. Haley.

Sen. Spessard L. Holland wrote that "due to conditions in the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and also the imminent closing of this session of Congress, I doubt that we are going to be able to obtain emergency funding for prompt repairs to the fishing pier."

W. L. Towns, Acting Regional Di-rector of the Dept. of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, wrote that "We are optimistic that funds will be made available in the near future for a thorough repair job." Sen. Lawton Chiles wrote that he would take the matter up on his assumption of a seat in the Senate in ashington, D.C. in January.



THE ISLAND GARDENER

This is the dormant season for most of our trees and shrubs according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Assn. (FNGA). Now is an excellent time to set a tree or a new shrub in the garden. Although azaleas are showing strong buds (some may be in bloom) they can be moved from one area to another. When azaleas begin to bloom this early you want to keep close tab on the petals. Petal blight, a fungus, will frequently attack the blossoms causing them to wilt over night. The FNGA suggests that you spray your azaleas once a week with zineb or maneb or Dithane M-45 for the control of petal blight.

Trees are valuable in Florida. Now is an excellent time to set an oak, a magnolia, a pine, or other shade trees. Your local nurseryman can advise you of the best trees for your area. In tropical Florida you will find shade trees entirely different than you will in northern Florida, so rely on your nurseryman.

Still time to set out some winter flowering annuals. Calendulas, petunias, snapdragons, and salvia all produce excellent winter color. Your local nurseryman will have a sufficient amount of plants available for your selection.

Those of you that were late in arriving for the winter months may want to start bie garden, Carrots, beet radishes, lettuce, onions, turnips, and mustard can all be planted. In fact, any vegetable that is grown in the spring months up north can be planted now in

Living in Florida almost demands that you have a citrus tree in your yard. Now is an excellent time to make your selection and get the tree in the ground. Although the top will not grow much, the root system will expand readily to make top growth in the spring.

Sweetpeas are magnificent when grown properly and at this time of year you should be picking dozens of blossoms. You need to remember, says the FNGA, to use a 4-8-8 to help produce good blossoms and keep them coming on the. plant. Leaf miner will be a problem but diazinon or malathion used weekly can prevent damage by this insect.

Don't forget your pansies. They are heavy feeders and must be fed every two or three weeks with a soluble fertilizer. This baby-faced flower can add beauty to your garden. If you have not planted them there is still sufficient time to enjoy a bed of pansies.

STUFFED CRAB SURPRISE

1 lb. ricotta

6 oz. bel paese cheese 1 beaten egg yolk

1/2 lb. crab meat 2 Tbsp, minced onion

3 Tbsp. mined green pepper

2 Tbsp, butter

Tbsp. flour 3/4 cup hot milk

Tbsp, minced parsley

2 Tbsp. dry white wine

Salt, pepper

1/4 cup prepared tomato sauce Parmesan cheese

Cut bel paese cheese into small diced pieces about 1/2 inch thick. Combine ricotta, bel paese, whole egg, and egg yolk, mixing well. Set aside.

Remove any pieces of shell or cartilege from crab meat. Saute onion and pepper in butter untion onion is yellow. Remove from flame and stir in flour. Slowly add hot milk. Return to low flame and simmer five minutes, stirring frequently. Combine crab meat and sauce. Add parsley, wine and salt and pepper to taste. Chill crab meat mixture in refrigerator.

Spread half ricotta mixture over a shallow 7-inch casserole. Spread crab meat over ricotta. Spread balance of ricotta over crabmeat. Pour tomato sauce on top. Sprinkle generously with parmesan cheese.

Bake in preheated oven at 370 degrees until cheese browns; about 20 to

SEAFOOD POLENTA PIE

POLENTA:

2-1/2 cups water 1/2 cup enriched yellow corn meal 1/2 tsp. salt SEAF OOD:

6 large fresh mushrooms, sliced

2 Tbsp. butter 1-1/4 lb. cooked peeled and deveined

shrimp, fresh or thawed frozen

1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce with tomato bits

1 can (7-1/2 or 8 oz.) minced clams

drained

tsp. brown sugar firmly packed Melted butter

Grated Parmesan cheese

In heavy saucepan, bring 2 cups of water to a boil. Mix corn meal with 1/2 cup of water and salt; gradually stir into boiling water in saucepan. Cook over high heat and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour into lightly buttered 8-inch pie pan. Set aside till

Meanwhile, in medium saucepan, cook mushrooms in butter for 2 or 3 minutes; add shrimp, tomato sauce, clams and brown sugar. Heat through and pour into shallow 9-inch baking dish. Cut polenta into pie-shaped wedges and arrange on top. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 425 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes or till polenta is hot and cheese is golden brown. Makes 5 to 6 servings.

LOBSTER-SHRIMP NEWBURG

6 fresh Florida lobster tails 2 lbs, fresh shrimp

3 Tbsp. butter 2 cups half and half cream and milk

Salt and pepper to taste

4 egg yolks 2 Tbsp. Otard brandy 3 Tbsp. Taylor's sweet sherry

Cayenne pepper

Boil lobster for 10 or 15 minutes (depending upon size) in lightly salted water. Remove from shell and cut in

chunk size pieces. Boil shrimp in lightly salted water for 3 minutes, grain immediately, cool with cold water and peel. Do not over-

Melt butter, add flour and cream, salt and pepper. Cook and stir until thick. Add cooked shrimp and lobster and simmer, stirring gently for 10 minutes. Turn off heat and add egg yolks, liquors and cayenne pepper.

Let stand on warm burner for at least 20 minutes. Serve on toast or patty shells. Serves 8.

The Florida Highway Patrol today predicted 29 traffic deaths for the New Year's holiday period unless motorists and pedestrians top their New Year's resolution list with traffic safety.

"Start the first holiday of the New Year with a resolution to put safety first when behind the wheel or on foot. It takes only a little effort," said Colonel Reid Clifton, director of the Patrol.

The 78-hour holiday period begin 6 p.m. Thursday, December 31 and ends midnight, Sunday, January 3. During the 102-hour period in 1969, 37 fatalities were recorded in Florida.

The Patrol plans to make use of all available manpower including auxiliarymen. Airplanes piloted by FHP Troopers will be in the air spotting traffic violators and trouble spots.

"A long list of traffic safety resolutions could be made, but the most important one for motorists to make would be to resolve to improve their knowledge of road rules and practice them every day of the coming New Year," concluded Colonel Clifton.

goers and hosts alike to reflect on alcohol's role in traffic deaths. "I never drink on New Year's Eve because that's when all the amateurs are out," a comedian once said.

"Everybody's an amateur when it comes to driving under the influence of alcohol," Ellwood Smith, chairman of the Florida Conference of AAA Motor Clubs, said. "And our studies of New Year's traffic fatalities indicate that they are deadly amateurs."

Smith said the hours from 7 p.m. last New Year's Eve to 2 a.m. New Year's Day saw an average of one Floridian per hour killed in a traffic accident. "If this rate had continued throughout the holiday weekend, over 100 Floridians would have died," Smith said, "Fortunately, it didn't, but Florida still lost 37 persons during the weekend."

Alcohol and darkness were the most common factors in the fatal holiday accidents. Smith said investigating officers detected alcohol involvement in 25% of the accidents. "Because of the difficulty in establishing alcohol involvement, especially where the driver is killed, we estimate that alcohol figured in at least 50% of the accidents," Smith said.

Sixty per cent of the accidents happened during hours of darkness.

"Alcohol's bad effects on driving are enhanced at night by reduced visibility and fatigue," Smith said, "Since most holiday parties are given at night, we are asking holiday hosts to assume the responsibility for seeing that their guests leave the party in a condition to drive home safely."

Smith said AAA is not asking hosts to refrain from serving alcoholic beverages to their guests, "Such an approach flies in the face of New Year's tradition and is doomed to failure," he said.

Instead, the holiday host can use a simple "Soft sell" approach that will encourage moderate drinking among his guests and still not label him a kill-joy on his own home

Here are six basic guidelines recommended by AAA:

!. Prove your lavishness as a host with a tempting display of food -- not with liquor. Dishes, preferably rich and starchy, should be available throughout the evening.

2. Don't serve drinks yourself. Have a self-service bar where guests can mix their

own. If they do, they're likely to make them less potent and less often.

3. Include a variety of soft drinks and mild alcoholic beverages along with the

"ha**rdstuff."**

4. Plan an organized game that will draw everyone's attention toward the action and away from the bar.

5. Substitute coffee for liquor about an hour before the party ends, Coffee has no sobering effect, but a guest drinking coffee isn't taking on more alcohol.

6. If a guest over-imbibes, ask someone else to take him home, call a taxi, or arrange for him to stay the night.

TELEPHONE SURVEY REPORT

The Sanibel-Captiva Islands Chamber of Commerce, Inc. has received a letter from the president of the United Telephone Company, Mr. H. R. Bollinger stating that the company is interested in providing the expanded services requested, and that the company will be in touch with the Chamber in about 30 days, after they have had time to study the problem. This letter was dated November 12, 1970.

Cards were sent out to telephone users in the area in August. Out of the 651 answers received from the cards, 353 answered they wished toll free service to Fort Myers and adjacent areas. 82 did not wish the service; 14 wanted the service with reservations, and 198 did not answer the questionnaire. Some cards were returned because of insufficient address.

Mrs. Mary L. Funk, Board secretary, wrote the letters and will keep members posted on further progress.

BOATING SAFETY ACT IN SENATES HANDS

Boatmen will have a Federal Boating Safety Act in 1970, maybe. The Act has been passed by the House of Representatives, but has not been cleared out of its Senate Commerce Committee headed by Sen. Warren Magnuson (D. Wash). Congress is in its lame duck session until Jan. 3. When the 92nd Congress convenes in January the Federal Boating Safety Act of 1971 will probably be reintroduced in the House for approval. Then it is due to be heard in the Senate by the Subcommittee on Merchant Marine.

Principal measures call for Federal financial aid to state boating safety programs, and authority for the Coast Guard to establish standards for boat construction. One section of the act permits the states to require safety certificates for boat operators. This section was taken from the Federal Boating Safety Act of 1958 and has been law for 12 years. However, Florida requires no licensing and neither does the Coast Guard.



BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS REPORT

The County is due to rent an earth scraper for use for Captiva road erosion work. The scraper can carry more than 21 cubic yards of earth per trip and costs \$35 per hours. It will be used for two weeks in digging planned ponds within the J. N. "Ding" Darling U. S. Wildlife Refuge, and the sand and shell mix from Sanibel will be used on the Captiva road mainly, but it will be stockpiled for other uses too.

CORKSCREW READY FOR BABY STORKS

Eleven ponds covering 63 acres in the Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary have been constructed for the feeding of the young wood storks due to hatch out in late January, said Jim Spieth of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Fort Myers.

Supply more stork food in the way of small fish in the ponds should increase the stork population at the Audubon Sanctuary in Collier County, said Frank Ligas, Audubon research biologist at Corkscrew, who has been working with Spieth. The Soil Conservation Service drew up the plans for the ponds and assisted the Audubon Society in constructing them, Spieth stated. The ponds are located away from the usual paths of observers, but there are roads over pond dikes for future bird watchers.

The national directors of the Audubon Society will be here late in January, when the food for storks program gets underway. Spieth said his estimate of a cost of \$80,000 for the ponds construction was considered too low.

Bahia grass and other vegetation will be planted to control erosion and beautify the feeding areas.



REP. WALKER PROTESTS

TORTUGAS FISHING BY CUBA

State Rep. James Lorenzo Walker portested against the federal government allowing Cuban boats to fish in the Dry Tortugas area. "I think it is pathetically ridiculous to allow the federal government to prohibit Florida from protecting the shrimp beds at Dry Tortugas from the downright rape of its harvests by Cuban shrimp trawlers," he said.

"Many Florida fishermen derive their livelihood by this method and for the federal government to file an injunction in the courts prohibiting Randolph Hodges and the Department of Natural Resources from restraining foreign vessels in what has been alleged to be Florida territorial waters is unjust," Walker stated.

"For many years in the Florida Legislature I have actively participated in conservation programs to protect these beds, and to allow foreign vessels to reap their harvest is absurd.

"At one time the U. S. Government and the State of Florida maintained a treaty with Cuba that prohibited this activity in the Dry Tortugas beds but this has long been dissolved by the Castro government," he said. Walker said that in the past arrest and jailing of Americans and confiscation of their gear for fishing in the area had occurred, and now the federal government says it can't do anything about this.





