CHAMBER HEARS ATKINSON


Yesterday at 8 a.m. the Beach Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors meeting t the Beach Holiday Inn heard of Dr. John Atkinson's proposals which could aid in olving some of the Beach traffic problems; one would be installation of lights at center street and Estero; another would make Center a two way traffic street which rould prevent the traffic block at the County Park Corner. He also discussed limiting bridge openings to the hour and half hour, as well as a better parking lot with neters for the County Park visitors, and also left hand holding lanes on Estero.

The Board voted to send a letter to Commissioner James Sweeney endorsing the

present septic tank moratorium.

Norm Patters also announced the fund raising project going well; the Chamber is ouying a boat to aid the Lee County Department of Health and Sanitation in combating pollution. There will be another pollution count coming up in February.

A proposed map listing island business was passed around; it will soon be available. Plans for having an open meeting to inform all about the excellent projects now being undertaken by the Chamber was also discussed but no specific date was set.

\$500 REWARD OFFERED

A five hundred dollar reward has been offered for accurate information leading to the recovery of the big 24 ft. stainless hardtop boat and its trailer which were stolen from San Carlos Marina between midnight last Saturday and 6:45 a.m. Sunday morning, said the owner of the boat, Green Keltner.

The boat had a 215 h.p. OMC engine and was worth approximately \$11,000 with the trailer. The Sheriff's department is working on the theft and has been fortunate in discovering what looks like promising leads.

B.I.A. BOARD MEETS

The Board of Directors of the Beach Improvement Association met Tuesday night in the Will Hayes office to discuss programs for the coming year. The regular meeting next Tuesday will feature Supt. Ray Williams who will speak on "Our Schools, their opportunities and problems."

Commissioner James Sweeney will also give a report about today's happenings in the Commission.

The Board welcomed its president back, Victor Boden, who stayed in Cotuit, Connecticut for the wedding of his son, Fred, to Miss Paula Hinkley. He was especially warmly greeted by Col. Bob Lipton, Vice President who has been acting president. It was brought out that the cost of Estero Island Sewer System has already doubled in cost from its former figures, which were defeated last year.

Letter To The Editor

To The Bulletin:

You are to be congratulated for your excellent editorial in your last issue dealing with the deplorable and completely stupid traffic condition caused by the antique and unconscionable swing bridge regulations that obstruct the passage of up to hundred of automobile passengers every time some small boat with less than a half dozen occupants sees fit to toot its horn three times. And, of course, inconvenience to hundreds is a small concern when weighed against loss of life and loss by fire that could be caused by the inability of emergency vehicles to get through.

But your editorials and those in the News-Press, as well as dozens of protests by readers of both publications, have done nothing in the years we have been coming to the Beach to stir even the slightest hint of action by responsible authorities.

It is well remembered that when the state proposed parking restrictions last winter to help control traffic on San Carlos Blvd., the agonized wail that went up from the local county commissioner and other beach merchants was so loud that it was heard in Tallahassee -- and the restrictions were hurriedly removed. We have been treated with consider-

ation by local merchants and certainly have no complaints on that score. But the Chamber of Commerce and the local commissioner, who can look out of his store window every day and see the traffic pile up every few minutes, really ought to do something besides shrug their col-

Surely somebody, somewhere in government can issue a sensible schedule for bridge operation, such as opening up for boats on the hour or half hour only during the daytime. What if a few boat owners should have to wait a few minutes? They would soon learn to adjust their schedules -- and where are they going anyway that makes it imperative

CIOPPINO

1 lb. deluxe crab lump

2 lbs. jumbo shrimps, 12-18 to pound dozen hard clams (littleneck size) 2 lbs. sea bass, cleaned, split, backbone removed

lb. sea bass steak, bone removed Salt, pepper

28-oz. can pear tomatoes 6-oz. can tomato paste 2 cups court bouillon 3/4 cup olive oil

1 cup finely minced onions 1/4 lb. finely minced fresh mushrooms

2 tsp. very finely minced garlic

1/2 cup finely minced celery

1 cup finely minced sweet red or green pepper

2 tsp. basil

1/2 tsp, leaf thyme

1/2 tsp. rosemary

2 Tbsp. very finely minced fresh parsley

2 cups dry red wine

Peel and devein shrimps. Add shells to pot when making court bouillon. Wash and scrub clams with brush to remove sand. Place clams in pot with 1 cup water. Cover with tight-fitting lid and cook about 5 minutes or until shells are open. Remove top shells, leaving clams on the half shell. Set clams aside. Strain broth through cheesecloth, if necessary, to remove sand. Cut sea bass into 1-in. chunks and sprinkle generously with salt and pepper. Place tomatoes with juice in blender and blend until smooth. Mix tomatoes, tomato paste, clam broth and court bouillon. In large kettle, heat oil over low flame. Add onions, mushrooms, garlic, celery, sweet pepper, basil, thyme, rosemary and parsley. Saute until onions are deep yellow. Add wine and cook until wine is reduced to approximately 1 cup. Add crab lump, shrimps, fish and tomato mixture. Boil 10 minutes. Place clams in kettle and reheat, covered, a few minutes, until heated through. Arrange clams around sides of large serving platter or shallow serving casserole. Use slotted spoon to lift fish, shrimps and crab onto platter, and pour on enough gravy to moisten. Serve balance of gravy in separate dishes with fried or oventoasted croutons or with freshly sliced sourdough bread.

COURT BOUILLON

7 cups water 1 cup dry white wine

1 large leek, sliced 1 large carrot, sliced 1 large onion, sliced

1 large piece celery, sliced 12 sprigs parsley 1-1/2 tsp. salt 1 bay leaf Fish trimmings, such as head, backbone,

tail, etc.

Put all ingredients into pot. Bring to a boil; skim; simmer 30 minutes. Strain. The liquor of shellfish such as clams or mussels, steamed open in another pot, is usually added to court bouillon for fish stew. Bottled clam juice may be added to this recipe, if additional liquid is needed. (Makes about 6 cups.)

THE ISLAND GARDENER

The cold winter winds are detrimental to all plants in Florida according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Assn. (FNGA). Some will suffer more than others when the winds deplete the leaves of water. You need to supply plenty of moisture to the root system of your plants during the winter months. Most folks think that plants do not use water during cold weather but this is false thinking. Camellias and azaleas, when in bloom, require much more water than normal. A good rule of thumb is to soak the root system of your plant at least once a week.

Camellias are in full bloom and they will supply blossoms until late spring if the plants are healthy. Tea scale will be rampant this month. You can notice it by turning over the leaf and observing the white growth on the underneath side. One of the best controls for tea scale on camellias is cygon. It is suggested that you use this material when the temperature is above 45 degrees and below 85

Mites are a real problem on azaleas in the winter months. Camellias are also susceptible to mites. A spray of kelthane or other miticide every two or three weeks will keep the leaves in excellent condition and void of red spider mites.

If you have been cutting roses frequently from your bushes and have neglected to fertilize them over the holidays, now is the time to do it. Use a complete rose fertilizer and apply every two weeks. Organic fertilizer will not be broken down to feed your roses properly. Roses should also be sprayed weekly. Black spot is always present. Dithane M-45 is very suitable for the control of black spot. Watch for powdery mildew. This is a whitish-gray growth on the leaves and the buds. Karathane or Acti-Dione PM will usually control this fungus.

Your lawn may not look too bright at this time of year. The cold weather and the frost has slowed the grass to a standstill unless you have planted rye grass. Rye grass will be a bright green color and needs mowing once a week. Rye grass also will need fertilizer between now and spring. Use the same type that you use on your permanent lawn. If you use 6-6-6 or 8-8-8, apply it at the rate of 25 to 30 pounds per thousand square feet.

If your poinsettia plants have frozen, now is a good time to cut them back. You can remove as much of the plant as you wish, but leave at least two feet of stem to promote new branching for next year's

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

When you read the report given the B.I.A. by the County Commission on what a sewage system will cost today, you will see what a big mistake was made a year ago.

The three Beach men that fought the proposed sewage system at that time were successful, but did themselves, nor anyone else, no favor, for when the system is finally built (as it will be) it will cost all of us at least twice as much as proposed a year ago. Not only those who voted against it but also those of us who were in favor of it will be penalized heavily for their short-sightedness.

Two of the BIA officers attended the County Commissioners' meeting December 28 to listen to the presentation of "The Feasibility Report on Sewage Collection, Treatment and Disposal for Lee County, Florida," It is to be recalled that BIA worked hard in favor of a sewage system in 1969 culminating in a referendum vote almost a year ago which killed the project. The Fort Myers Beach section of the December 28 report is essentially the same as last year's proposal but with differences in cost of construction, interest cost for borrowed money, more stringent regulations for pollution control of tidal waters requiring more complicated equipment and alternative disposal of purified waste water and other cost inflation factors.

The following overly-simplified comparison gleaned from this presentation is, on the one hand, a "shocker" and, on the other hand, a warning that time is running out for us





from Bath, Maine.


TRAVELING EXHIBIT STRESSES NEED FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION

Clear skies were reported for 23 days, partly cloudy, 7 days and cloudy one day during December. The average temperature for December was 66.6 degrees, which is 1.06 degrees above the normal. The month's highest reading was an 83 degrees mark on December 21 and on the 23rd. The lowest was 30 degrees on December 27.

Page Field also reported one thunder storm, 12 inches of fog, and one gust of wind 32 miles per hour on December 31.




