1971 SANIBEL SHELL FAIR

The Sanibel Community House is the scene of much activity as the 1971 Sanibel Shell Fair shapes up for opening March 4 through March 6. The show will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. Special hours have been set up for both the press and amateur photographers. Press reporters and photographers will be welcomed from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m., Thursday, March 4, opening day. Friday, March 5, for amateur photographers whose cameras will serve as passes for early admittance, 9 a.m. to 10 a.m.

The permanent shell exhibits in the Community House have been refurbished by Eugenia Wright, Helene Eker and Harriet Howe with an assist in excellent carpentering by Paul Howe and John Kennedy, Florida's official state shell, the horse conch (Pleuroloca gigantea) will be used extensively in decorating for the 1971 show. Tom Nix, house chairman, has made markers for each category using mounted plywood cut-outs of horse conchs with the category number on as well as the name of each category.

Exhibit chairman, Mary Nix made an outline drawing of a horse conch and sent it along with the order for ribbon awards and this was reproduced in gold on all the ribbons.


AUDUBON BENEFIT


The Gala Benefit to be held tomorrow night, Friday, February 19, at Casa Ybel by the Audubon Society will feature an all new program of Mario Hutton's "photo-verse" compositions, under the general title "Islands Inimitable," Included in the first half will be eight features covering a wide range of subjects in the field of wildlife, the scenic beauty of our islands, and also a humorous look at some of their peculiarities. To be seen will be 'Another Day' and 'My Rhapsody in Blue,' both conveying timely conservation messages, 'Great Blue' and 'Snowy,' that can be defined portraits of two of Florida's favorite birds. Also, a visual idyl called 'Halo,' and 'The Nightingale,' a nostalgic nocturne. Shown will be a feature of special interest to fishermen, about which a reviewer recently wrote: 'Harbor Queen is a wonderfully drawn portrait almost in journalistic vein of the voyage of three men on a commercial fishing boat. This was an August trip on which our photographer-poet worked as both, but also as a crew member, There are fourteen minutes of exciting slides and commentary here, of boat, crew, fish and fishing know-how and equipment, of birds and sky, and the wild beauty of the Gulf of Mexico. Somthing for everyone is here, pictures and verse combined with the finesse of a natural story-teller. Don't miss it."

The second part of the show will constitute a definite departure from Mr. Hutton's usual subjects. It is titled 'Soul of Six Island Homes,' and this is what Julie Miller has written about it: "Five beautiful dwellings, as diverse as their owners may be, are shown in graphic detail, with sympathy and charm; and the program ends with superb shots of Ding Darling's Captiva 'Fish House,' and a truly lovely poem in dedication to the man whose name is enshrined in the hearts of us all. These homes are not presented, for example, as the House of the Month, or What the Well-Dressed House Will Wear, in some national magazines. Rather, Mr. Hutton affirms the physical personality, the special aura of the residence, inside and out. In each he expresses his own impression of its particular and unique individuality. To those of us who may never see these homes this series will be a peculiar treasure, one to anticipate eagerly."

Griffing Bancroft will preside over the proceedings, that will include announcement of the names of those purchasing a number of paintings and other works donated by distinguished artists, and the drawing of valuable door prizes offered by local merchants. In addition to the artists whose names were published last week, the following have donated beautiful works: Opal Combs, Willis Combs, and Sarita Van Vleck.

Reservations, consisting of a donation of at least \$3.00 per person, have been so numerous, that not many admissions may be available at this time. Any admissions not secured in advance will be offered tomorrow night at Casa Ybel Resort, where the benefit starts at 8 p.m. All contributions are tax deductible.



LEGEL GALLERY TO OPEN





Letter To The Editor

1971 SANIBEL SHELL FAIR CONTINUED FROM FRONT PAGE

To The Islander:

We came to Sanibel on Feb. 1 expecting to stay only two days to see the island and enjoy the beaches. We left on the third day to visit other places of interest but our short stay here had spoiled us, and we returned to Sanibel.

Our hosts at the West Wind Inn have been most hospitable and friendly, as have others with whom we have come in contact; but today something happened that disillusioned me, and I fear that this lovely isle is a "tourist-trap" after all.

Several days ago I purchased a garment at the local store, which, according to the tag, was washable either by hand or by machine. The first time I washed it (by hand) the colors ran to the extent that the garment is unusable.

When I called it to the attention of the store personnel, I was informed that the proprietor does not stand behind what he sells, but if I wished, I could leave the garment there and talk to the sales representative next time he called there. Since I am a visiting tourist, this was a rather stupid and useless suggestion, and I am stuck with the inferior merchandise.

The monetary loss does not bother me as much as does the manner in which the incident was handled. I am quite sure that if I were a resident here I would not have been treated so shabbily.

If the proprietor believes that his merchandise is so inferior he cannot stand behind it, he should display a sign to that effect and let the buyer beware!

One day, not too long ago, as I drove out of my home, the Sanibel Rescue Squad was taking care of and evacuating a mother, a baby and three other children injured when their car overturned. Later that same day, I passed the Rescue Squad transporting an injured boy to the hospital.

These two cases, and I don't know how many more that day, utilized volunteers to save life and relieve suffering. These volunteers were men who must leave their income producing activities to be "Good Samaritans" and aid those in serious trouble.

Who are these volunteers? Six dedicated men, only one of whom is under 45 and some of whom have their own physical problems. Six men who work for a living to support families which means loss of income when on a call.

These men need your help. What happens to you and your family, if help is needed and this small group of devoted men are away or too sick to answer?

Should not you volunteer to help others so that others will help you when you need it?

It was just a perfect day for a Fashion Show. The sun was bright and warm, the sky blue, the birds were singing and the carillon was ringing out The Blue Danube Waltz. The tables were filling up fast with happy, interested guests who had purchased tickets for the annual style show given by the Episcopal Church on the church grounds called a "Strawberry Festival." The models representing each dress shop on Sanibel were, as always, charming and stunningly attired as they made their appearance through a giant Valentine heart and promenaded through the audience. But the models weren't the only ones who were well dressed at this gala affair; I noticed several others who should also be mentioned: Wilb Snyder, for instance, in a handsome beige cashmere sweater and matching pants, skillfully maneuvering a tray of coffee cups through the crowd at intermission; Bill Sur, in colorful cotton sport shirt and slacks, directing traffic; Father Madden and Father Hubbs in basic black; Bob Haynie conservatively attired in blue shirt and dark blue pants, adroitly directing traffic also. THE ISLAND GARDENER

Before you know it, you'll be using your power mower several times a week says the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA), and you should check now to be sure it is in good working condition and that the blade is sharp. If you aren't in the habit of raking your grass clippings or catching them in a grass catcher, you should make provisions now to do so. If clippings accumulate on the lawn you will get a thatch build-up and diseases and pests will be difficult to control.

Annual flowering plants should be almost full-grown and producing an abundance of flowers at this time of year. But annuals, like other plants, need fertilizer in order to produce a maximum amount of blossoms. It is now time to fertilize these annuals with either a dry or soluble fertilizer. Do not use an all-organic fert-

er for your annuals, as the soil is still told and the organic material will not be broken down to release fertilizer for these plants. You should also pay close attention for any disease or insects that are attacking your annuals. Sometimes an early outbreak of worms may give you holes in the leaves. These worms can be controlled with sevin.

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA PLANNING BOARD MEETING

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, Inc., will hold its first annual meeting, March 1, at 8 p.m., at the Sanibel Community House. A report will be made of last year's activities and the present situation regarding population density and other island problems and issues.

Also there will be an election of officers and a new board of directors. Members and prospective members are urged to attend.

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

The Board of Directors of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation thanks most warmly the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County for their approval on Wednesday, Feb. 10, of the Foundation's request that an application be filed for \$281,000 of land and water Conservation Funds, through the Florida Division of Recreation and Parks and the U. S. Dept. of the Interior's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. This is to match an equivalent amount which has been donated through National Audubon Society, the Nature Conservancy and the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation. All monies will be applied to land acquisition for the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands Recreational Refuge, to supplement and protect the J. H. ''Ding'' Darling National Wildlife Refuge.

The Commissioners' approval was given with enthusiasm and thanks to the Foundation for its efforty on behalf of the people of Lee County. Park Director Park Pigott

also gave hearty endorsement to the project.

Quick action by the Commissioners made it possible for the Foundation's Executive Director, Roy Bazire, to fly to Tallahassee on Thursday and present the application to officials of the Division of Recreation and Parks, Florida Department of Natural Resources. Opportunately, a meeting to review all applications and okay those to be included in this fiscal year, was scheduled for the following day. We have not yet had word from Tallahassee, but Roy says, "We appear to have as good friends in Mr. Landrum (Director of the Division) and Mr. Froemke (Administrator, Grants section), as we do in Atlanta and Washington, and approval of the Sanibel project is probable."

After about 30 days "in process" in Tallahassee, the application goes to Atlanta, and then to D.C. Final action should be known sometime in May. However, The Nature Conservancy has funds on hand to permit immediate firm negotiations for lands to be

icluded.

Sanibel businessmen for Conservation, a group which made possible the transfer to Florida from Kentucky, of a large houseboat donated to the Florida Institute of Oceanography through the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and one of its members, met Friday, Feb. 12, with Dr. Robert E. Smith, Director of the Institute. The luncheon meeting at the Golden Sands was to learn of progress made on converting the boat to a floating marine lab to undertake an estuarine research program for the entire west coast of Florida.

Dr. Smith has obtained support of a number of large Florida industries, the Florida Air & Water Pollution Control and other public and private organizations to operate the vessel at an approximate cost of \$40,000 a year for a minimum three year program, and to outfit the vessel with about \$50,000 of highly sophisticated equipment. The boat is now being readied for service and Dr. Smith hopes to have it in local waters this

spring or early summer for its trial run.

Seven Florida state universities are cooperating on the project, and will provide the faculty and students necessary to carry out the research program. This is one phase of a Gulf-wide research effort to build data banks that will help to maintain the quality of our water enivronment; estuarine, continental shelf, and deep Gulf.

The offer of the boat as a gift was made to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation last October. By Dec. 10, Dr. Smith had obtained tentative pledges which satisfied him that he could justify taking title to the boat for the Board of Regents. But, he lacked the \$2,400 hard cash to move the vessel from Kentucky to Florida. A last minute appeal brained the funds from a group of Sanibel businessmen.

SANIBEL BRIDGE FENDER SAFEGUARDS

The Lee County Board of Commissioners, in their regular Wednesday meeting, approved the expenditure of \$6,750.00 for repairs and revamping of the bridge, by putting in some concrete and rock seawall and breakwaters, as suggested by the County Engineer M. M. Cornwell, to prevent barges from bumping the fenders and causing extensive damage as was done several times last year.


River Construction Co. of Fort Myers was the apparent low bidder, and others submitting bids were Langford Inc. of West Palm Beach, \$9,250., Jones Contracting Co. of North Fort Myers, \$12,500., and Little River Marine Construction Co. of Miami, \$28,980. River Construction has had equipment in the area placing piling and repairing the fenders. It is hoped the new design will aid in guiding barges into the channel, and prevent tides and cross currents from interfering with their passage.

CONSERVATION FUNDS APPROVED


The County Commission, in Wednesday's action, approved the expenditure of \$281,000. of Conservation monies, acting as agent for the National Audubon Society and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, in matching funds with the U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. The cooperative venture will eventually lead to the creation of a fresh water wetland and recreation area along the Sanibel River of 1,200 to 1,500 acres of a preserve on the island.

Conservation groups have been providing the land, purchased from individual owners, or donated by them, as their share of the matching funds, and now have 150 acres owned by the National Audubon group. Lee County will receive title to the entire project on completion of paper work, and will lease it back to the federal recreation project at \$1.00 a year for 99 years.

Roy Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, and Erard Matthiesen, member of the board of directors of the National Audubon Foundation, appeared before the board of County Commissioners to explain the project, which will become a park and recreation area for use by all.






