#### **DENSITY CONTROLS**

Some confusion has resulted as a result of the article in the Fort Myers News-Press regarding the action of the Board of County Commissioners on Feb. 17 regarding density control on the islands of Sanibel and Captiva.

A subcommittee of the Board, consisting of Mr. Kenneth Daniels and Mr. Walter Shirey has held two meetings with interested parties on this subject. The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board had submitted facts and figures on controls, and on densities now in use in the islands and elsewhere. Mr. Arthur Knudsen, representing the owners of the Captains Walk Condominiums, had submitted a request for control figures substantially higher than those recommended by the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board.

At the February 17 meeting, the subcommittee of Messrs. Daniels and Shirey, recommended to the full Board the acceptance of the figures proposed by Mr. Knudsen.

The Board of Commissioners then instructed the County Attorney to prepare an

The Board of Commissioners then instructed the County Attorney to prepare an ordinance containing those figures for consideration by the full Board at a date yet to be announced. This consideration will be in the form of a preliminary hearing on the

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
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
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#### WHO'S WHO AND WHY



#### **TOUR TO SOUTHERN SPAIN**

Area residents and visitors whose travels have included Portugal and Spain in 1967, Greece, Rome, London in 1968, Yugoslavia, 1969 and Germany and Austria in 1970, will again visit Spain this Fall.

#### THE ISLAND GARDENER

When azaleas begin to bloom, be on the lookout for one of the most devastating pathogens around that infects the flowers. For if not controlled, your beautiful azalea blossoms will be one slick, slimey mess according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). The problem is known as petal blight, Little seeds or spores fall on the petals of your azaleas and begin to produce a wet, water soaked azalea. You can prevent this blight by spraying with zineb once a week during the blooming season. Keep the blossoms thoroughly covered to prevent infection.

With spring approaching, plans begin to break dormancy and push out new growth to aphids. Aphids are small insects that can be easily transported by wind, ants, and other insects. They have a sucking mouth part which is inserted into the young, tender leaves. As the aphid feeds, the new growth is distorted, curled, and usually unsightly. The aphid can cause extensive damage to plants because of its feeding and creating a leaf that does not produce food for the plant. Aphids multiply rapidly but can be controlled by repeated applications of malathion at weekly intervals.



#### SEAFOOD STEW

Pinch red pepper 1/2 onion, chopped 2 Tbsp. olive oil 1 cup water 1/8 squid, skinned, cleaned and cut in small pieces (optional) 1/4 cup dry white wine 1 tsp. tomato paste

1/2 clove garlic, chopped

1/4 tsp. salt 1/8 lb. (2 oz.) shelled, deveined raw shrimp, chopped

1/4 lb. redfish 1/8 lb. (2 oz.) scallops, cut in small

pieces 1/8 lb. (2 oz.) grouper, cut in small pieces

In medium saucepan, saute the garlic, red pepper and onions in olive oil until the onions are delicately colored. Add water and bring to a boil. Add the squid. cover, and cook over a low flame for 30 minutes (or until the squid is tender.) Add the wine and bring to boil. Boil for 15 minutes. Add the tomato paste and salt and cook for 5 minutes. Add the shrimp, the redfish, the scallops and the grouper; cook 15 minutes longer.

#### SANIBEL PROJECT ZONING APPROVED

Zoning for development of more than 100 acres into homesites, apartment buildings, motels and businesses which would support a community of 5,000 persons on Sanibel Island was approved by the County Zoning Board Monday.

The plan, which drew Islanders' protests, passed on a 3 to 2 vote. It still has to be approved before the County Commission which will consider zoning March 6.

The petition was presented for Enrich Trost by George O. Kluttz, a Fort Myers attorney. It would cover land extending from the Gulf to the property line behind Bailey's General Store and east of Tarpon Bay Road to the Casa Ybel Airfield.

Board members Don Thyer and Henry Gladden voting aginst the zoning and Mrs.

Laura Hall, A. T. Kidd and Larry Webb voting for it.

William R. Vines, a Naples consultant hired by Trost to plan the development, said the northern portion of the proposed development would be subdivided into single family homesites and sold to prospective residents. The northern portion lies on the north shore of the Sanibel Slough and would contain about 65 lots arranged along courts with an access Road to Tarpon Bay Road.

The slough is a natural watershed area that extends for several miles across the center portion of the island providing a natural fresh water storage basin.

Vine's plan calls for a pedestrian bridge to a small island in the center of the slough which would remain in its natural state, and on to the southern shore of the slough where the apartment complexes would be built.

Vine's said the number of people in the complex would be determined by the amount of land available for building after dredging work was completed to provide a water storage area in the slough that would keep the water table at 30 inches above mean high

Malcolm Beattie of the Sanibel-Captiva Tanning Commission, said he learned from a recent discussion with Trost that the development could have as many as 5,000 resi-

"This is a beautiful plan and layout and would be fine for some other area," Beattle said indicating a large site plan Vines was showing. "But it would be a terrible thing for Sanibel Island."

Beattie showed charts he had prepared showing the amount of auto traffic Sanibel roads can now adequately handle and the impact on the highway network if all the island's multiple family areas were developed. He suggested Trost's petition for additional RU-3 zoning be denied and the development be put in one of the other areas on the island already zoned for such development.

There are about 450 acres zoned for apartments on the island that have not been

Besides inadequate roads, Beattle said the island's water system and sewage disposal system was not adequate to handle such a large development.

"Are you aware that 5,000 people could actually drink the water system dry," he asked. He said Sanibel's present population of permanent residents is now about 1,100 with about 3,500 winter residents.

As an alternate development plan, Beattie showed a development of strictly single family homesites.



The Florida Public Service Commission approved a \$14,248 water bill which Pine Island Water Association said was owed it by the Island Water Association for water furnished from 1965 through 1969, to Sanibel and Captiva, Island Water Association attorney, Emmet Anderson, has filed objection to the service Commission decision, but the Pine Island Water Association voted Tuesday to accept the commission examiner's recommendation for payment of the debt in full.

Newton Herrington, Pine Island water board chairman, said he learned only Wednesday that Sanibel and Captiva planned to pay the money only if it would be deposited in an escrow account to update the Pine Island water equipment for improvement of the service to the islands.

Herrington said, "If they repay every penny due on back bills, we will be glad to talk about putting additional money in escrow." Pine Island Association Vice President Frank Clay said, "We lose money on every gallon of water supplied Sanibel and Captiva. At 40 cents per 1,000 gallons, they are not beginning to help pay for depreciation on our system." The Pine Island water system valued at more than \$1 million is amortized over a 40 year period. Loan payments are approximately \$55,000 per year. Pine Island water officials admit that they did not study the Sanibel water contract too carefully when it was drawn up in 1965, and that they under-estimated the share Sanibel and Captiva should be paying to make it an equitable agreement.

Now Clay claims that Sanibel and Captiva want to reduce future rates in addition to holding up payment on back bills.

The Island Water Association says it is losing money on the water service. Islanders are charged \$11 for the first 7,000 gallons which Pine Island sells them for \$6.

The Public Service Commission report recommends an investigation into the water rates charged by both associations to determine how much would be equitable to both

#### CAPTIVA MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Beginning Tuesday, March 2, the Captiva Memorial Library will present another exhibit which it feels will be of special interest to the Island visitors. This will be a group of drawings and watercolors of birds seen on Captiva and Sanibel by Sarita Van

Miss Van Vleck developed a keen interest in wildlife while engaged in archaelogical field work on the Mississippi flood plain in southern Illinois.

Shortly after graduating from Vassar she joined the staff of the American Museum of Natural History in New York City, where for three years, she coordinated efforts between the Department of Exhibition and Graphic Arts and the Bird Department. During this time she participated in all phases of the work; research, design, art and label-

Miss Van Vleck was herpetologist to the 1958 Yale Expedition when it went on a three-month collecting expedition to Haiti. Convinced that killing was not for her she turned instead to the Arts and upon returning to this country she wrote "Growing Wings," a layman's guide to the annual cycle of bird life. Illustrated by her delightful drawings, the book is based on her research and her own personal observations. She says that the drawings on exhibition were done from life while the book was in progress, each taking about ten seconds to complete.

Misx Van Vleck has a great interest in and concern about our country's ecology. After publishing "Growing Wings," she was engaged as ecology consultant to a city planner and is currently very active in the work of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

She is a resident of Captiva and now seeks to combine her writing, drawing, painting and photography in man's endless study of his basic nature.

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
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#### AUDUBON PROGRAM COME BE CAPTIVATED BY CAPTIVA
