"NO SIGNS" IS GOOD NEWS

The long debated sign ordinance regulating signs on the islands was passed by Lee County Commissioners on Wednesday. The ordinance outlaws all commercial signs erected off the premises of businesses on the islands.

However, directional signs to businesses not visible from main roads can be erect-

Reasons for the ordinance were to protect and preserve the character and appearance of Sanibel and Captiva by preventing excessive advertising. Michael Jackson, Fort Myers attorney drew up the ordinance and presented it to the Commission.

It was pointed out that road systems cannot support high commercialism, and excessive advertising could be detrimental to the entire character and appearance of the slands, which is residential in its natural wildlife setting.

The following kinds of signs are prohibited by the ordinance: banner signs, beacon or flashing light signs, sandwich and other portable signs, snipe (fast moving in a pattern) signs, billboards and other animated or neon signs. No room rates on signs outside motels, apartments, rooming houses, hotels or motor courts can be posted, but these may be legally posted inside the buildings. The posting of handbills, notices, advertisements is forbidden. Also, no one may write, mark or paint any signs or let-


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Tom Nix, Sanibel Community Association house chairman puts the finishing touches on category markers he has made for the 1971 Sanibel Shell Fair.

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
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
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
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CASA YBEL NEWS

- 4. Fairway homesites may be purchased through the Michigan Homes sales office.

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

Dick, 27 and Judy 22, are resting from their exciting marriage and honeymoon on Sanibel.

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
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

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Letter To The Editor

To The Islander:

In The Mailbag of the Fort Myers News-Press, your sister-paper, there appeared, on Feb. 11, a letter signed "M. C. Silva, LaBelle," captioned, "Can't have Everything."

Mr. Silva questioned the utility of the lovely yellow crosses which are painted on our roads, at intervals, both on the mainland and on Sanibel and Captiva. He stated, somewhat ironically I thought, that the time, effort and money could have been better devoted to repairing the

road shoulders. He apparently thinks that the crosses were there for aesthetic effect. He could not be more wrong.

For many years before my retirement, I was head of the Zoology Section of the New Jersey State Highway Dept., and, in that capacity, had charge of the production and placement of the signs which say, "Caution -- Deer Crossing," which one sees on roads up north.

This brings me to an explanation of why we find the crosses on our local roads.

They mark the places where it is safe for Camel Caravans to cross the roads, and they are sited to give maximum protection to both motorists and the Caravans, providing both observe simple and pertinent safety rules.

It has been determined, through scientific investigation that all camels are born with astigmatism, due to deficiencies of diet in their mothers during pregnancy, and, as a result, they are quite incapable of reading "Caution -- Camel Caravan Crossing" signs on the other side of the road. Ergo, they are

much more accident-prone than deer.

But it has also been established that, if they are fitted with bi-focal corrective lenses, they are then fully able to discern the painted yellow crosses on the roadbed, by merely looking through the lower part of the spectacles. And while it may be successfully argued by some that these spectacles do not improve their appearance, there is certainly no doubting of the fact that, since the installation of the crosses, there has been a dramatic reduction in the number of accidents involving motorists and Camel Caravans. They are practically non-existent, if I do say so myself.

Now isn't this worthwhile, Mr. Silva? And just as important as repairing road shoulders? I think so.



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
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
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200 ATTEND LEGEL'S OPEN HOUSE

Speaking on behalf of the Society's 19,000 members, Scott stated, "An entity existing under the authority of the State of Florida has seen fit, without direction of the Cabinet or the Department of Natural Resources, to enter suit against the U. S. Government. The costs of such litigation are to be borne out of state and local funds."

Scott suggested that the actions of the Canal Authority "are, or ought to be, a source of embarrassment to the State Cabinet," and added that "in order to avoid further ridicule" the Cabinet should bring the Canal Authority to heel without delay.

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

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


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REPORT ON AUDUBON BENEFIT

A recapitulation on the outcome of the February 19 benefit sponsored by our Audubon Chapter is in order. Let me say at once that in my checkered career rarely, if ever, have I compiled a report with such relish. In the first place, I cannot recall a single episode relating to the event, that was not happily heartwarming. Also, the opportunity to express in print my gratitude to those who made possible such gratifying results, spares me the risk of contracting abad case of writer's cramp, as might have occurred if I attempted to address individual thank you notes to all deserving recognition. Generosity was indeed the key word sparking their diversified contributions. Full

credit is due to the management of Casa Ybel Resort, who allowed the benefit to be encased in their attractive Lowdin Hall; to the publishers of the Islander, who frontpaged it with repeated zeal; to the Island merchants who, far beyond the call of business. offered six unusually valuable door prizes, everyone tasteful, two downright tasty; to the local Art League and the Legel Gallery for allowing two dozen works of art to be displayed in advance in most appropriate settings. And, if the program breezed along with smooth dispatch, Griffing Bancroft, efficiently presiding over the proceedings, well earned everyone's thankfulness. Two groups, however, contributed perhaps more than any others to the success of this collective effort. I refer, of course, to the talented, ever willing island artists, who donated a most harmonious collection of paintings and other creations, prompting an equally deserving group of purchasers to secure for their homes lasting mementos of a genial occasion. At this point, I am slightly at a loss on how to adequately convey the expression of my deepest indebtedness to the score of irresistible salesladies who put in orbit this lucky venture. Taking their cue from the superlative leadership of chairmen Jean Bair and Jane Bancroft, one and all charmingly cooperated in assuring that every available admission be eagerly disposed of in advance, often at a handsome premium over the suggested donation.




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
tering on a building, wall or fence without the consent of the property owner, and none of these signs or marks may go on trees, telephone poles or other utility poles. Banner, sandwich and "snipe" signs must be removed within six months, if they are already erected and in use.

The only exceptions to the ordinance are professional name plates, bulletin boards for churches, public or charitable institutions; signs denoting architect, builder or contract engineer and building permits on new construction; occupational signs and

memorial signs or names of buildings; plus temporary real estate signs only.

Violators of the sign ordinance will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each day of the continued violation will constitute a separate offense. The ordinance was unanimously adopted for the exclusive use on Sanibel and Captiva.


