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

SANIBEL PUBLIC LIBRARY

Another milestone has been passed in the ever developing progress of the Sanibel Public Library. Over one half acre of business property has been donated as a building site for a new and enlarged Library building.


This business lot on Pine Ridge Drive was given to the Library on March 31, 1971 by Mr. & Mrs. Gerald T. Martin. A building committee has been active with plans for an enlarged library. Now with this generous gift of a centrally located lot, more definite and detailed plans should be forthcoming. (A recent report to the contrary was in error.) It is anticipated that the new facility will be approximately four times the present

area and will include reading rooms, a conference room and ample space for exhibits. This large lot will enable a much greater parking area. At the deed presentation, which took place on the property, many of the volunteer workers of the Sanibel Public Library were present.

PROJECT LOGGERHEAD

Very shortly, with the arrival of the 1971 sea turtle nesting season in Southwest Florida, which generally begins in mid-May, the Caretta Research workers will begin the third year of "Project Loggerhead." The overall project is aimed at studying the ecology of the population of loggerhead turtles (Caretta caretta caretta) that make nesting visits to Sanibel-Captiva and other locations in Southwest Florida, to foster education of young people in local schools on our endangered environment and wildlife; collection and transplantation of loggerhead turtle eggs in areas where certain predators cause great losses in turtle colonies; and the releasing of young turtles produced in hatcheries at strategic locations once they have been brought through incubation; and limited captive rearing in tanks, on Sanibel and in several classrooms of the Lee County schools of young turtles for release at approximately 10 months of

Plans for 1971 include the establishment of two additional hatcheries on the west

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
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



As a property owner on Captiva Island I write to express my opposition to two proposals recently recommended to the Board of County Commissioners:

1. The petition of Trost International for multi-family and business zoning east of Tarpon Bay Road on Sanibel Island.

2. A building density ordinance submitted by Jamestown-Beachview and the developers of Captain's Walk Condominiums.

I am opposed to the above two proposals simply because such a concentration of people would render our current water and sewage facilities inad-equate. The eventual addition of 35,000 to 40,000 people, should the proposals be approved by the Commissioners, would be nothing short of a disaster for Sanibel-Captiva.

our turtle workers. The project has gained considerable new information on loggerheads and some of this data will be in print later in 1971. In 1970 an aerial survey was initiated which covered the Florida coastline from Egmont Key (in Tampa Bay) south to Cape Romano Shoals to determine just where nesting was taking place and in what concentrations, and to correlate nesting of the species in the entire area included in the nesting season. It is planned to continue this valuable work in 1971,

For the 1971 turtle season the group has prepared a budget of approximately \$2,500. This amount will cover work scheduled but will not meet plans for an accelerated public education program which would include distribution of copies of the film "Project Loggerhead," and publication of a small, informative pamphlet on the marine turtles of the Gulf of Mexico.

Cash is not in hand. The project will require contributions from individuals as in the past. Contributions should be made payable to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation -- be sure to mark your check "For Caretta Research."

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

Each rose grower has his own method and materials for the control of fungus on rose bushes, but a consultation with your nurseryman may be beneficial.

William G. Schaff Jr., 58, of Elizabethton, Tenn., died last Sunday at Sanibel Island.



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
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
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BROWSING AROUND

10 Small fresh Florida clams 1 Tbsp. olive oil 1/4 clove garlic 1/2 anchovy fillet, chopped 2 tsp. chopped parsley Pinch powdered oregano 1/2 cup red wine 1 tsp. tomato paste

1/8 tsp. freshly ground black pepper Scrub the clams thoroughly. Place the oil in a heavy, medium saucepan; add the garlic and brown. Remove the garlic. Add the anchovy, parsley, oregano and wine to the oil and cook five minutes.

Add the tomato paste and pepper and cook 5 minutes. Add the clams; cover the pan and cook until all the shells have been open for 5 minutes.
