Islanders went to the polls on Tuesday on Sanibel and Captiva to cast the majority of votes for the Charter. Less than 1/2 the registered number of voters participated in the polling, but the ballots cast by them showed a definite interest in better representation and more to their interests in maintaining a uniqueness of needs and government of our unique islands. One hundred and thirty-three voted for the Charter at precinct 16 on Sanibel and 121 opposed it. Twenty-six on Captiva, at precinct 17, voted for the Charter and 23 voted to retain the County Commission form of government.

Many indicated their wish to maintain the status quo by their supportive votes for the present system. Others indicated their wish for improvement by a government more responsive to the people and their wishes, and even some of those who voted for the present system expressed the wish for some improvements in the county government. There is the hope the County Commissioners will study this vote and plan to improve the present structure of government and make it "Work" as promised before the elect-

The voters have indicated they want better government and better use of the tax collar. An anonymous voter said, "We pay some of the highest taxes in Lee County, as much of our property is waterfront and premium tax land. We should have special considerations because of the uniqueness of our islands. We bring untold numbers of visitors into the County, who in turn spend a lot of money not only on our islands, but in Fort Myers, and it is our hope that we will have a better voice in what happens to us. We trust that the Board of County Commissioners will modernize not only the government, but also their way of thinking. County government is no longer a hit and miss thing. It is big business."

CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

Possibilities of expanding research on Sanibel's fresh water system and methods of achieving controls to assure its protection and preservation were explored in a meeting at St. Michael's, Sanibel, May 19. The conference was sponsored by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, which made arrangements for bringing together professional advisors to the Foundation, and representatives of government agencies which have been cooperating in the local effort, to review the fresh water study underway by Mr. Durward Bogess, U.S. Geologist, under contract with the Lee County Commissioners.

At a similar meeting on Sanibel last January, advisors to the Foundation had raised some questions about this study, and the recent session was organized by the Foundation to explore their recommendations for changes. After a presentation of the study plan by Mr. Bogess and progress to date, it was agreed that an expansion of the study may be desirable. The original study proposed had been cut down due to a reduction in funds asked from the County Commissioners. Representatives of the local Foundation suggested that private contributions might be found to expand the study. Several possibilities are to be recommended by the U. S. Geological Survey and, if approved by the Board of Directors of the Foundation and its advisors, would then be presented to the County Commissioners for their consideration.

The urgent need for standards and guidelines to control development practices on the interior lands that contribute to deterioration of the quality of the Sanibel River and surrounding wetlands was discussed. Methods of assuring protection of the Sanibel wetlands by various public agencies were reviewed, and consideration was given to the possibility of special legislation and private legal action. The information and proposals gathered at the meeting will be used by the Board of Directors of the Conservation Foundation to decide on further steps to protect the Sanibel fresh water resource. A recent study made for the Foundation shows serious new salt water intrusion in sev-

eral areas.

The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board and the Island Water Assn. were represented at the meeting.



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REVEREND H. OTHEMAN SMITH DIES

Rev. H. Otheman Smith, late minister for the Community Church on Captiva, Chapel by the Sea, died suddenly at his home in Morristown, New Jersey on May 5, 1971.

Dr. Smith was a graduate of Davison University in Ohio. He received his B. D. degree from the Andover Newton Theological Seminary and his D. D. from Yorktown College in South Dakota. He served as minister in churches in Warren, R.I., Yonkers, N.Y., Montclair, N.J. He founded and built the Community Congregational Church in Short Hills, N.J. He served as minister to our church, Chapel by the Sea, on Captiva for the past three years. He also was a guest minister in Great Britain and Paris, France.

Memorial services were held in the Community Congregational Church in Short Hills, N.J. on May 16. A memorial service is planned in the Chapel by the Sea during the fall season. The date will be announced later.

Dr. Smith's wish was that friends would be glad that he had lived. Mrs. Smith asked that any remembrances for Dr. Smith should be given to the "Tribute Fund," Chapel by the Sea, Captiva, Fla. Dr. Smith is survived by his wife, Margaret E. Smith, two sisters, Mrs. David Fares and Miss Ruth I. Smith of Ohio, and three nephews also from Ohio.

MRS. HOWARD WOOD

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Letter To The Editor

TO THE ISLANDER:

A copy of the following letter was sent to The Islander for publication: The American Nature Study Society To Whom it may concern:

For many years we have been enjoying the natural aspects of Sanibel-Captiva Islands. Bird watching, botanizing, the fresh air, sunshine, shelling, walking and swimming. The weeks spent in this environment have been looked forward to

Mrs. Rulison, as a naturalist, has been involved for over 40 years in lecturing, teaching and writing on subjects of Natural History. She founded and directed Trailside Nature Museums at the Palisades Interstate Park and for the Union County (N.J.) Park Commission. She has been involved in similar activities with the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, Ill., the Morton Arboretum and the schools of Lake Forest, Ill. My interest has been similar and stimulating as an avocation and recreation from my position as sales manager.

As a professional naturalist and an enthusiastic observer of nature my wife and I are much disturbed about the desecration of Sanibel and to a lesser degree, Captiva by the bulldozer and steam shovel. We are not optimistic enough to hope for a discontinuation of this performance in "the interest of progress" which today is interpreted as the minority exploiting the majority for the essential dollar.

There is a small private sanctuary at the end of Gulf Drive on Sanibel owned by Mr. & Mrs. Combs. Willis Combs and his wife Opal have, at no profit to themselves, established Woodmere Preserve. Preserving over 80 plants, many are rare to the area which, due to its natural climatic environment, produces growth limited to Sanibel. The Combs are most gracious in sharing this private sanctuary with interested naturalists and in teaching the botany of Sanibel-Captiva on their acreage.

We know of efforts to bulldoze this area out of existence due to the alleged need of the continuation of Guif Drive to create access for a new 60 home development west of the Combs property. Access is much more logical and easier from the main Sanibel-Captiva road.

This plea for the preservation of some of the natural charm of Sanibel-Captiva

may be too late but we hope it will create some influence in saving "Woodmere Preserve,"

Subject: Woodmere Preserve Sanibel Island

The greatest assets of southeast Florida and the Keys were and of southwest Florida still are NATURAL --- climate, scenery, beaches, clear waters, fishing, shells, boating and Nature in all its phases --- and PEACE. Neglected assets are the taxpaying homeowners. Irreparable attractions are despoiled by the quick-buck entrepreneur, who takes his cut and leaves. Stable citizens and tourists who keep Florida green go elsewhere. Asphalt, concrete and pollution do not attract.

Now, Woodmere Preserve is threatened. It is a botanists' paradise for ecological studies. It includes a delicate sequence of unique growths. Sea-oats and sea cedar grow only near the beach and will not grow across Gulf Drive on neighboring properties. The Florida hammock is lush, but elsewhere with so-called "Progress" native growth is rapidly becoming extinct. Loggerhead turtles lay their eggs on the beach and gopher tortoises share the Wildlife Sanctuary. Professional and amateur scientists come to study the balanced interdependence of all living things in Woodmere Preserve.

For thirty years, the undersigned writer has been active in the Fairchild Tropical Garden (Miami). One of the director's projects, sponsored by a national foundation, is the identification and collection of living specimens of all plant life native to the Bahama Islands. Many species have already been destroyed by developers. A program to preserve and to propagate the Bahaman growth in Fairchild Tropical Garden is reasonably successful. But how absurd, when, as in the case of Woodmere Preserve, all we need to do is to leave it alone.

Sympathetic understanding by all concerned is prayed for.

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


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
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CHAMBER REPORTS

SANIBEL RIVER REPORT CAUSES REVERBERATIONS

A report on salt water intrusion in the Sanibel River by U. S. Dept. of the Interior hydrologist, Durward Bogess at St. Michael's Churchon May 19 caused a flurry among newspaper reporters, who had come to the meeting under the impression it was an open meeting, and then were barred from it by Roy Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. The information Bogess reported on was a study of the Sanibel River and salinity intrusion requested by the Lee County Commissioners to whom it will be presented shortly.

Bazire criticized Bogess for releasing advance information on the meeting, saying that the meeting was not open to the public, and the discussions were not open to news men, who were not invited to the meeting.

Mr. Bogess reported to the conservation group about a clay zone having been dised beneath the Sanibel area, and he gave evidence of groundwater conditions and salt water aquifer between 25 and 30 feet below the surface on the island.

The study has been in progress since last October and it covered a number of problems concerning water pollution, with some involvement by the Ding Darling Sanctuary.

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



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TURNER BEACH IN SAD SHAPE
