BOAT ADRIFT

Three people adrift in a boat 8 miles off Sanibel all night Tuesday were located and brought in by the Coast Guard Wednesday evening. Mrs. Marge Rinehold of Waterway Estates reported to the Sheriff's Department that her husband Dick Rinehold, his brother-in-law and nephew were in the boat. The boat had no running lights and so could not be located in the dark, but Wednesday a Coast Guard plane and helicopter from Miami all joined the 44 ft. Coast Guard vessel for the search. The plane located the boat about 7:15 p.m. just before dark and brought back the three. Besides the Coast Guard, the Sheriff's Department had sent out a craft to help in the search and we are happy the venture ended with no casualties.

OPEN HOUSE HELD

Post offices at Sanibel and Captiva held open house on Thursday, July 1, inaugurating the new United Postal Service which took over operations officially then. Mail operations were taken over then, but the same official set-up will be in force and the same service is planned, according to postmaster Dodie Booth on Captiva and Alvin P. Mast, Clerk-in-Charge at Sanibel.

The clacking of the beak and gestures with the head are made each time the mama or papa returns to the nest. These sounds and movements are the key words before exchanging places. They greet one another each time as they enter the nest. It is something like, "it's me Sally, Joe, and look what I brought for the kids to feast upon. Why don't you go stretch your wings a bit while I look after the youngsters?" And she may say, "Oh Joseph, you are so strong and wonderful and such a good provider. I believe I will take a short trip out where the fishing was good yesterday. Look after the babies while I am gone."

The brown pelican starts building the nest in late April in the South Florida area. This continues until the middle of July when things are really going strong in the rookery. So is the odor! Every tree and bush is filled with nests which are built with rather large sticks about the size of a thumb. They are gathered from the ground and trees

wherever available.

The average nest has from two to four eggs which are chalky white with mottle brown spots. They are about the size of a goose egg. The parents incubate the eggs for the next four to five weeks. They alternate with one another until the eggs are hatched.

A baby pelican just out of the egg is blind, ugly, unattractive and reptile-like. Only skin covers them until they are a couple of weeks old when pure white down appears over the "goose bump-like" skin.

Nests are so close together that an older nestling may have his feet in his own nest and his head hanging over another nest while his tail is resting on smaller birds to the rear. But everyone gets along. There are a few clashes from adjacent tempers when one gets fed and others go hungry. The food is anything from the sea that is animal. It may be eels for breakfast and fish for lunch. Or crabs ala carte. And the younger the bird, the more digested the parent makes the meal which is regurgitated. As the hatchlings grow older the parents feed them whole fish. Some times the fish is almost as large as the young bird. They usually take them head first and with large fish, the tail some-


times sticks out the beak till the head digests gradually slipping into the vast gullet. The noise is terrific. Each nest makes its own sound. The adults go fishing one at a time to return with foodfor the nestlings. Then the other adult flies away for food. This


takes place many times each day as the appetites grow

They start pecking at the neck or pouch of the adult. After a while the adult opens its mouth and the baby birds reach their heads into the gullet for food. This feeding sequence takes several burps and grunts from the adult and lots of squacking from the babies.

The parents have strong inherent feelings for their young. It takes several months of feeding the babies to bring them to a size when they can leave the nest. Their wing feathers must develop. The youngsters try to fly away but usually end up in the water or on the ground. It takes a lot of strength and completed feather growth for them to fly. But once airborn, they are on their own to fish and scrounge for themselves.

The brown pelican is quite a bird. And an old one too. Its ancestors date clear back to the Lower Miocene deposits some 20 to 30 million years ago. They are so similar to the present day bird they are placed in the same genus, Pelicanus.





AMERICAN LEGION FISH FRY SUCCESS

The traditional Fourth of July Fish Fry was held at the Sanibel American Legion Post Home on Periwinkle Road on Sanibel from noon to 4 p.m. on Sunday. We say traditional, because folks come from far and near to partake of the homemade good food they serve each year. The fish, hush puppies, baked beans and cole slaw were served to a goodly group, and friendliness is the main ingredient of a successful venture such as this, which the Post is noted for.

NO JELLYFISH HERE

Hordes of jellyfish which have joined the intrusion of red tide and blue-green algae in Southwest Florida coastal waters, have not been observed in Sanibel and Captiva waters. Much of this is concentrated in the Caloosahatchee River, where jellyfish in various sizes have been drifiting up and down the river and also in the passes and canals, rising and falling with the tides.

Dr. Charles E. Lane, functional biologist at the University of Miami's School of Marine and Atmospheric Sciences said they are the common jellyfish and that as a rule, they do not sting people, but people with extremely sensitive skins should still avoid any contact with them. as they can be stung or develop an allergic rash.

Dr. Lane said, "The jellyfish in the Caloosahatchee River now were probably spawned last year; so watch out for next year's crop."

The Portuguese Man of War jellyfish is not found near these shores, but is plentiful on the east coast and also some are found in greater depths in the Gulf.

Some dead fish appeared in the Captiva area but there was no "red tide" in the area visible to interfere with swimming or fishing, but the ban on clam and shellfish eating is still on in the area, as a precautionary measure. No dead fish were reported on the Turner Beach area or the causeway area either.

The theory has been advanced by some old timers that the death of the gigantic sea turtles has lead to the appearance in number of jellyfish, as the turtles eat these.



They are comical to watch. What one
does they all do. They loaf, fly, prean
their feathers, fish while swimming or
diving and in general stay in groups.

While flying or soaring their wings seem to flap together and glide together. When diving they may be 50 feet in the air when they see their prey and down they go, Wings are folded and legs awkwardly askew until the last moment before entering the water. Head first they thrust their head and neck forward with legs straight to the rear. At this moment the fish usually winds up in the huge beak. The pelican sometimes switches the position of the fish while inside the pouch. Other times they will flip the fish in the air and grab it with its head toward the gullet instead of the tail.

Another thing is happening while all this is going on. The laughing gulls are following the pelican on his way down. When he emerges to the surface the gull sits on his head and grabs anything he can from the pouch. Sometimes even taking the fish right out of the pelican's mouth. There is never any display of temper. The fishing is usually good and

another fish is there for the taking. Those who have never seen a pelican dive into the water and come up with a fish too large for its pouch or the comical things they do in every day life have missed a beautiful sight. The brown pelican is fast losing out to the ravages of man. Their population is dwindling. Their reproduction is threatened. Next week ... Man, the Killer.
