DRAMATIC RESCUE

Rescued from a sailboat excursion that ended when a sudden squall overturned their craft were Jeanne Kontinos and Jack Hassen. Jeanne, who has been visiting her sister Mary Aleck, is from Washington, D.C., and went out on the Sailfish catamaran sailboat rented from the Jolly Roger Motel on Sunday afternoon with Jack Hassen at the helm. The craft is known as one of the safer models, but in a sudden squall before a rain, gale winds overturned the boat about 3 miles south of Sanibel and about 6 p.m. Larry Bruno, owner of the Jolly Roger saw the mishap. He and Gene Saucier took out another craft in a rescue attempt but their boat also flipped in the rough seas. Herb Purdy of the Segunda Motel paddled out and in turn rescued Larry Bruno and Gene Saucier from the rough seas and high waves. By now, it had gotten dark, and the 12 foot sailboat with Jeanne and Jack over the side could not be located.

Coast Guard at Fort Myers Beach had been notified and they asked for help from mi and St. Petersburg, each sent a helicopter to help in the search. The dramatic search ended about 1:30 when Jeanne Kontinos and Jack Hassen were taken aboard the 40 foot Coast Guard boat and brought into the Fort Myers Beach station after about six hours in the water. Others reporting the sudden squall severity in the area were Betzi and John Abram of Fort Myers Beach, who put in at the Punta Rassa Marina to escape the high winds and waves about 6 p.m., Sunday.



DENSITY RULE AFFIRMED

LEBUFF RECEIVED AWARD

Charles LeBuff, biological technician at the J.N. "Ding" Dafling National Wildlife Refuge here, was the recipient of a special achievement award from the U.S. Department of the Interior. The award was presented to LeBuff for his outstanding performance of duties as interim manager of the Refuge by manager Robert L. Barbar. LeBuff, who has been with the department's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife for 13 years on Sanibel, previously received recognition as the highest rated biological technician in the southwest Florida region when he was given a Superior Performance award. Past President of the Sanibel - Captiva Audubon Society, LeBuff is presently a Director of the Sanibel - Captiva Conservation Foundation and Director

WATER STUDIES JEOPARDIZED

Water resource studies throughout the County, including Sanibel Island, were jeopardized by action of the County Commissioners, July 14. The Fort Myers office of the U.S. Geological Survey may be closed if adequate funding is not available.

of the Caretta Research project on sea turtle conservation.

During the past six years, the water resources available in the Caloosahatchee River, Sanibel Island and other areas of the County have been examined. Cut off of \$6,000 in state funds this year and refusal of the Board of County Commissioners to provide more than \$9,000 may end these studies. To provide adequate funding, estimated at approximately \$50,000 for the current fiscal year, Commissioner Walter Shirey proposed the County double its contribution. With \$2,550 from the City of Fort Myers and \$2,000 offered by the Sanibel - Captiva Conservation Foundation, this would mean a local funding of \$22,500. Dollar for dollar federal matching funds would provide a total budget of \$45,000 for the local Geological Survey office. It would permit extension of the Sanibel study, that has been sought by local conservation interests and is regarded as desirable by officials of the Geological survey. Sanibel - Captiva Planning Board President Vernon MacKenzie urged the Commissioners to provide the full amount requested.

Final budget hearings by the County Commisssioners have been set for July 28.

THE LOVABLE BROWN PELICAN

NOTICE TO ALL...., The Brown Pelican is now on the endangered list. Lee County, Florida, probably has more pelican rookeries than any other place in the United States and deserves some special attention. When you are out boating and come across an island or shore where birds are flocking in large groups, please stay away. Do not go up to the island——give them a chance to survive. These bird rookeries are protected by law. This is the only place they reproduce.

The rookeries are easily recognized when the birds are swarming around in the air. They will be coming and going, landing on the nests, feeding the young or settling on the nests to protect the eggs.

After many of the young birds have left the nest but before they can fly, they may be walking on the ground or swimming offshore. The adults will be there swimming

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
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

BIRDS IN OKEECHOBEE DEAD OF FOOD POISONING

Hundreds of birds in the Lake Okeechobie area have been dying from a rare food poison which paralyzes the respiratory system. The fatal organism has killed more than 400 mallards, ibis, coots and spoonbills, much as the "red tide" has killed many fish along the western Gulf Coast.

The State and Fresh Water Fish Commission theorized that the dying waterfowl in the Lake Okeechobie area are more related to the drought induced low level of the lake than to another

The bateria discovered in Lake Okeechobie produce a form of internal poisoning which quickly paralyzes the bird's respiratory system and causes their death by smothering, officials say. The Game Commission has no other record of the disease ever having occured in wild birds in South Florida before. One cannot help but muse upon the resemblance to "red tide" and its similar effects on fish.

WHAT COULD HAPPEN TO SANIBEL-CAPTIVA

(Ed. Note: State representative Ted Randell showed us the following letter he claimed to have received from a northern friend - dated 1979)

I just wanted to let you and the family know why I won't be seeing you this winter. I can't tell you how glad I was for your people down in Southwest Florida when I read in the Times about the new improvements taking place down there, especially on Sanibel and Captiva Islands where we used to do a lot of fishing and vacationing. I guess that scenic eight-lane interstate-freeway they built along the beach and gulf islands connecting Naples to Tampa on the water was really quite an improvement and I know it did a lot for employment in the area because I read where they have more than 100 gas stations on Sanibel now, with the ones on the beach freeway staying open all night and hiring double crews.

The article was telling how difficult it is to find room for a new gas station because the high-rises were using most of the beachfront land. That success story on Joe Smith, when he bought that old lighthouse and turned it into a ferris wheel and parachute drop with a boardwalk and pinball machine stand attached, was really something. He is quite a businessman. I heard he was starting a plastic shell factory down there this year because the real ones are kinda running short in supply, now that they've bulkheaded 97% of the island. I saw a picture of some and they looked almost like the real ones down there.

But I guess the biggest improvement down there was when they built the super shopping and fun center on that vacant land that used to be called the Ding, or Darling something or other. You know what one I mean - that shopping center called the Hickel Plaza, the biggest store in the state. Course you'd need something big like

that to supply that population of 28,000 people just living in the Sanibel high-rises. Remember that time back in the 1960s when we spent our vacation down there? Boy that was fun. The kids and Mary talked about it all spring, and then summer. Doing my income tax, I ran across the figures on that long weekend, I remember figuring out how much tax money I paid to the State of Florida back then, and how I thought it was considerable. After bridge tolls, almost \$100 for three nights in the motel with the kids, the fare for four people eating three meals a day, the golf course rates including the cart fare for an out-of-shape weekender like me and the other stuff, like fishing trips and boat rentals, shelling trips and even some nice and relaxing nightlife. I figured I paid the State some \$50 in taxes. That was just

Well. I guess you guys are really rolling in the tax money down there now. I suppose those gas stations really pay the taxes. But then again, I guess it keeps your state representatives pretty busy, setting up that \$5 billion pollution control program I read about. I heard some of the people down there wanted a law limiting those hotel signs to less than 100 feet of neon per sign, with a limit of only threee neon signs per motel.

Then again, I guess the state spent some of the hig-rise tax money on paying for the highway running through there, and also they had to make up for the loss of tax money when the shrimping, fishing and shelling businesses collapsed down there. I know those training schools for unemployed fishermen cost the state a pretty penny. Hope some of those fellows can find work in Smith's plastic shell factory. But I know that is they can't be trained for that they can get jobs as lifeguards at the highrise's swimming pools. I know the local law requires them at all times just in case somebody falls over a bulkhead into the deep ocean.

Well, we won't be seeing you this winter, as we used to. Mary and I decided to change our plans and we're going to get a little apartment out near Coney Island this year. We figured for about the same price as going to Florida this year we could rent this apartment near the beach and live in it weekends. This way it would be all summer long, and we'd be near the farris wheel and the parachute machine, the shopping plaza and lots of tall buildings just like they have down there,

guess the only difference would be that Coney Island still hasn't been seawalled in but I guess that would be nit-picking. They really are trying to make progress up here too. And during the winter, with the money we'd save by vacationing on nearby Coney Island, we figured we'd go to Cuba for a warm rest. Ever since Castro died in that smashup when the hijacked TWA plane hit his welcoming delegation on the runway, the island has really opened up. They say the Isle of Pines has beaches all around it, with little cabins for visitors tucked away along the surf just like they used to have down on Captiva. Well, I suppose you can't expect them to progress as fast in Cuba. Being an island country, they don't even have any interstates. Have a good year, and I'll send you a Christmas card from the beaches.

CARETTA REPORTS ON '71 PROGRAM

The summer's activity for Caretta workers and cooperators began May 14 when the first nesting loggerhead turtle was tagged for the season and the first clutch of loggerhead eggs were collected and transplanted. To June 21, 13 more turtles were tagged and 1,702 eggs have been placed in the hatchery (now up to about 3,000). It is interesting that returns of tagged loggerheads to island beaches have increased this year. Several turtles originally tagged in 1969 have been encountered again this year and most have shown remarkable nest site tenacity.

In early July several groups will visit various islands to the north and south of Sanibel-Captiva to begin a program of studies relative to nest destruction by various predators. Several new techniques that have been developed to prevent predator destruction will be evaluated and possibly approved through our field trails for use in the 1972 loggerhead nesting season. A number of years ago it was determined that raccoons and sand crabs were the greatest threat to developing turtle eggs on the islands and that up to nearly 38% of eggs were destroyed by these predators. In 1970, we discovered that on Morgan Beach, below Marco Island, raccoons dug and destroyed approximately 95% of all nests.

Several manuscripts dealing with the ecology of the loggerhead turtle are in eparation by Caretta workers. Basic data for each was made available through earmarked contributions to the Sanibel - Captiva Conservation Foundation.



THE ISLAND GARDENER

Palms are typical of Florida's semitropical climate according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Assn. (FNGA). Most nurserymen carry at least one to ten varieties of palms. This is the month that you should consider planting palm trees. Palm trees, unlike many of our shade trees, have a fibrous root system and are easily moved during the rainy season of the summer. Once you cut a palm tree root it does not grow further from that point. A new root must be initiated from the base of the palm. This is the reason why you see rather small balls on cabbage palms, queen palms, and others. Don't fret at your nurseryman if the ball seems a little small. Palms, like other plants, thrive better if they are cared for properly. At this time of year you should be giving your palms an application of a good mixed fertilizer such as a 6-6-6 at the rate of one pound for each inch of trunk diameter. It is not necessary to punch holes in the ground to feed palm trees. In addition to the fertilizer, manganese sulfate is required by most of our palms. On a large tree 20 feet tall you would apply approximately 6 lbs. On a small tree 3 to 5 feet you would apply approximately 2 lbs. Manganese sulfate applications should be made once a year to all palm trees, according to the FNGA.



CULINARY GLEANINGS BY POP

Sherbet

For a delicious sherbet of the flavor you like best, mix in large bowl one can of sweetened consensed milk (not evaporated milk) and a 28 oz. bottle of soda (two 12 oz. cans soda). Then pour into ice cube tray and freeze to a slushy mix. Beat with egg beater until smooth, and return to freezer and freeze until firm. If you use a low calorie pop you will have a little less calories than by using the regular sweetened kind.

Another variation of this sherbet is to put an open can of evaporated milk in freezer until crystals form. Remove from can to bowl and beat until peaks form, then add a package of sweetened soft drink powder to the milk and mix and return to freezer tray to freeze till firm,

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


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
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MITCHELL'S CASTAWAYS

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3 YEAR GRANT ANNOUNCED

Full funding of the \$325,000, three-year grant sought by the Lee County School system for its comprehensive environmental teaching plan from kindergarten through 12th grade has been announced by School Superintendent Ray Williams. This is a Title III project of the Office of Education, U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare. Science coordinator William Hammond is in charge of the program and has spearheaded the effort to obtain the grant.

The project puts particular emphasis upon field activities in natural resource areas of the County, particularly the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge,

the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands, and other areas on our islands.

Initial work on the project had started with a \$10,000 planning grant. A number of local conservationists serve on the Advisory Coucil and Advisory Panel to the educational pilot project, which may serve as a model for schools throughput the state and nation.





with them. The young one must be looked after until it can fly. All their food comes from the fishing parents who alternate with one another going forth to dive for what ever seems to be on the menu at the moment.

The Pacific Brown Pelican in California is about finished. They are almost stopped from reproduction by the breaking of the eggs in the nest, Louisiana, after losing all their brown pelicans, procured some from the State of Florida. They are trying to reproduce them in controlled areas of the "Pelican State."

As the state of affairs of the Brown Pelican comes into sharper focus it is easy

to see that any natural phenominum like a hurricane or heat wave could easily wipe out one whole year of nestlings.

Minor things in the life of one or two or a few pelicans are on the man made list. For instance, a few days old baby pelican was found at the entrance to the Sanibel causeway. It was almost dead. The bird was almost adult size but without fully developed wing and tail feathers. Its body still was covered with down, pure white and soft. The bird had evidently been taken from a rookery, and after the fun of seeing the bird wore off, the invaders abandoned the youngster to fend for itself. When the young bird was taken from home grounds and its parents to watch after it, starvation was the ultimate end.

This baby, so weak it could not hold up its head until some mullet was stuffed down the gullet, was a lucky one. After a pound and a half of fish it revived somewhat. Now the bird is on the way to total recovery. When it is old enough to fly, it will be turned loose to go on its own.

The pelican is now being cared for by Shirley Walter of Sanibel who is licensed by the State of Florida and U.S. Government.

While at a rookerie on Sunday, July 18, several eggs were noticed which had been broken in the nest. One hundred birds were banded by Charles LeBuff and helpers. The operation went smoothly. There are still some 150 babies to band when they get a little older.

A broken arrow with the feathers still intact was found on the ground. It is not a pleasant thought to think that someone would shoot pelicans, but the evidence is certainly suggestive.


Another way man comes into the life cycle of this ancient bird is through fishermen who permit a pelican to dive into the water after a lure or bait on the end of a fishing pole. This is not necessary. Any fisherman who is alert to catching a fish can easily pull the lure away from a diving bird.


The bird has become grear sport with some who even let it fly into the air only to be jerked to the ground or water. They become tangled with the monofilament line and are horribaly snarled with the fishing equipment.

I took apicture on a rookery of the remnants of a pelican which had become tangled with monofilament line. The leg bone of the bird was still fastened to the branch with a fishing lure alongside. The rest of the bird was on the ground below. These sight are heart touching and so unnecessary. Please pass the word along to at least two people. Tell them about nature. Ask them to walk outside and look around. Listen for the sound of nature. Tell them to see as well as look. It may take a little education but you can do it. Tell them about the birds and the bees.

DEEP SEA FISHING BULLETIN

Recently, the luck of Mario Hutton and Uncle Clarence seems to have been rubbing off on their friends. During the past three months no less than five of the fishermen they brought from Sanibel aboard the Blue Heron have won the jackpot on as many days. On the other hand, it cannot be said that at least Mario's luck is running out, because during the last few weeks he has taken the jackpot himself no less than four times, boating on each occasion the largest fish caught.



TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

One of the secrets in your old age is to keep interested and occupied. I retired a few years ago, except for writing this column once a week for the Florida News Service.

For years I had been paying a professional gardener from \$5 to \$8 a week to mow the lawn, tend the flowers and trim the shrubbery. With time on my hands I decided to do my own gardening and I can recommend it if you fear boredom on retirement.

Since Mama loves roses I decided to develop a rose garden. The bugs, fungus and other underworld characters laughed their heads off. They knew that nobody below the rank of a four star general could grow roses successfully and believe me brother they were right.

A rose bush I have learned is more demanding than a selfish woman and they can drive you to distraction if you take them seriously. I invested about \$50 in Nelson's Florida stock. They were beautiful bushes in full bloom but when I transplanted them they became just bushes. They developed black spots, die back, shrivel and what have you and the more I sprayed, fertilized and cultivated the worse they got.

I wrote the State Department of Agriculture and read just about every book in the library on the subject of rose culture, All I learned that they required a lot of attention and were hard to grow.

But I was persistant, I was determined that no lousy rose could set me back on my ear. I fertilized, cultivated, sprayed and prayed and finally my roses let themselves go and began to bloom like mad.

Last week I was able to present Mama with a fresh new rose every half hour from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m., and I still have a half dozen more in bloom ready to pluck.

My experience has taught me a lot about human nature as well as old Mama Nature herself. If you want to succeed you gotta keep trying and if you work long enough and hard enough you will be rewarded beyond your fondest expectations.

Along with the roses I went in for annuals, snapdragons, merigolds, zinnias, petunias and all the rest. Some I grew from seed, others from plants but they all did their stuff when I assured them they were respected and loved and would be well cared for.

I made the bugs miserable for I sprayed like mad and cultivated like crazy and watered until my bill darn near broke me but boy have I got flowers. You really ought to see them and I can tell you I go to bed with a smile on my face because I know that in the morning I can look out of my bedroom window and see a grand and glorious burst of color within my view. But you have got to know and understand them, love them and care for them and if you do they will respond and give you more than you ever expected.

There is a lot to be learned from a garden and it is unfortunate so few of us have sought its secrets.

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
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NEWS FROM THE ISLAND BEACH CLUB BY bruce bryant

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
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
