

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CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation is providing \$4,000 for the expansion of the joint federal-county hydrological survey on Sanibel. The cost for the entire project has been estimated at \$20,000, and federal and county funds will pick up the additional \$16,000 needed to complete the survey, according to action by the Lee County Commission on Wednesday.

Directors of the Sanibel Community Association at the same meeting asked that the Lee County Commission continue the federal flood insurance program after the Dec. 31 deadline.




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
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WHO'S WHO AND WHY

his spare time.



THE ISLAND CHEF

Sherbet

For a delicious sherbet of the flavor you like best, mix in large bowl one can of sweetened consensed milk (not evaporated milk) and a 28 oz. bottle of soda (two 12 oz. cans soda). Then pur into ice cube tray and freeze to a slushy mix. Beat with egg beater until smooth, and return to freezer and freeze until firm. If you use a low calorie pop you will have a little less calories than by using the regular sweetened kind.

Another variation of this sherbet is to put an open can of evaporated milk in freezer until crystals form. Remove from can to bowl and beat until peaks form, then add a package of sweetened soft drink powder to the milk and mix and return to freezer tray to freeze till

FREEZE INFO ON FISH

The Cost of Living Council in Washington, D.C., has explained its policy on types of fish and seafood which are subject to price ceilings and those which are not:

A fish or other denizen of the seas, when once netted or impaled, is not subject to the freeze, until shelled, shucked, skinned or scaled.

This means that fish products are classified as raw agricultural products and thus are not subject to the price freeze until they undergo some processing.

Incidentally, in Lee County, shellfish are still not permitted to be eaten or sold. But shrimp are not subject to the price freeze, as they are immediately processed, by head removal and icing. Those subject to price freezes would be live (bait) shrimp, according to a local interpretation.

Even the wild creatures seem to feel the peace and serenity here. A white heron watches lazily as we pass him on the road, then resumes his search for lunch.



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
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
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BOAT SAFETY CHARTS AND BROADCASTS

The National Ocean Survey and the National Weather Service agencies of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration will expand their safety reports and services to boatmen this year. The National Ocean Survey Agency over the next three years will print 14 new charts of coastal areas from Maine to Alaska, with hydrographic surveys updating some 500 existing charts.

The National Weather Service will increase the number of VHF-FM transmitters in its nationwide broadcast network to 46, with the addition of 15 new stations broadcasting the weather for boatmen this year. The broadcasts are around the clock and are located at 162,55 MHZ or 162,40 on the dial.



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


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
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BROWSING AROUND by fran o'callaghan



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
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JAKE STOKES RECEIVES SPECIAL AWARD

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THE ISLAND GARDENER

Camellias are showing rather large buds at this time of year according to the Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). If your bush is normal it should have a dark green color with light, cocoa-brown branches. This indicates that the plant has produced a full flush of growth earlier in the year. Should your camellia bush appear to be covered on the underneath side of the leaves with a white, cottony growth then your cultural practices have been neglected. This growth is called tea scale. The white covering is actually a fine thread of wax produced by the scale. Tea scale is often mistaken by you as homeowners for fungus. A fungicide will in no way deter the growth of this insect. It is advisable to use either cygon or ethion or malathion and oil. When oil is used as a spray for the control of tea scale the plant should be thoroughly watered the night before. In spraying for tea scale the underneath side of the leaves must be thoroughly saturated with the spray. Penetration of this waxy covering is difficult so it is advisable to use a

spreader-sticker if oil is not used. This is about the last time to consider fertilization of your camellias.

Crepe myrtle is succumbing to powdery mildew with all the rain and high humidity. This grayish fungus, if permitted to go rampant, will prevent flowering of crepe myrtle. Use Karathane or Acti-Dion PM for good control.

Roses may have survived the summer with tall, leggy growth. If you are returning from the north or vacation, it would be advisable to cut back your rose bushes to at least 3 or 4 feet above the ground. Black spot will be occuring at this time on rose leaves. Why not try the new systemic fungicide Benlate. It's expensive, but two or three of your neighbors may want to share the material with you.

Don't forget that tall trees and newly set shrubs should be staked for protection from hurricanes says the FNGA. Strong winds may uproot trees and prevent them from becoming established before winter arrives.

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
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
