
The business agenda of the general monthly meeting of the Sanibel Community Association on Tuesday, Sept. 7, at the Community House was brief and overshadowed by

the large attendance of concerned parents, young people and association members at the "Drug Problem on Sanibel" program following the regular business meeting. Presented by John Shepherd's entertainment committee, the evenings program began with President Holtz introducing Sgt. Harry M. Morse of the Criminal Investigation Unit of the Lee County Sheriff's Dept. In his brief remarks of introduction President Holtz spoke of the wide background and experience of Sgt. Morse in the criminal drug field, both in the New York City Police Dept. and since 1968 with the Lee County Sheriff's Dept.

Sgt. Morse presented a film depicting methods and attitudes of the drug and alcohol user and the potential results in young and old alike. The film vividly portrayed how the drug and alcohol user attempts to rationalize their habit when apprehended. The main thrust of the film was the tragic aftermath which can befall the hard drug user and the habitual drinker.

In a hard hitting talk after the film, Sgt. Morse ranged far afield in covering the modern day drug scene, exhibiting the various samples of drugs, and citing cases of drug use in which some such cases came close to home on the island. In the question and answer period which followed his talk, there were sharp and frequently heated exchanges between Sgt. Morse and the concerned gathering as to the function of parents, the community, the Community Association, the police, and the young people in dealing with the drug problem on Sanibel; indicating the very complexity and sensitivity of the problem. Sgt. Morse indicated that his position must necessarily stem from his role

as a law enforcement officer upholding and enforcing those laws so enacted by state and local governments. Though he is concerned and interested in drug prevention and education of the young as to the perils of hard drug use, and so indicated his deep concern by the hundreds of appearances he has made in the state and area speaking of the drug problem, his chief role was law enforcement and particularly the cutting off of the drug supply through the apprehension of the "drug peddler" and "drug pusher."

Spokesman for the young at the meeting indicated a concern of the inability of the island young people to find suitable facilities on the island for recreation where they might "rap" together, hold a dance or other peer activities. They asked the Community Association for assistance in their problem. Association board member, John Shepherd, asked that a delegation of young people attend the next association board of directors meeting on Sept. 21 in the Community House to air their grievances and assured them that any reasonable request for use of the Community House would be considered by the board.

President Holtz then introduced the second guest speaker of the evening, Dr. Mordecai Haber, prominent island physician. Dr. Haber gave a brief history of the origin and nature of the many common types of drugs through the ages and how the drug scene evolved to its present day vast proportions and became a national problem, "Drugs," said Dr. Haber, "are a vital and important tool in medicine today but only in the expert hand of the physician and at his direction." In frank and layman terms he discussed the effects of the various drugs on mind and body and the pertinent and recognizable symptoms of the drug user. He most emphatically stated that drugs per se were and are not all "the problem" in today's society. "More importantly," said Dr. Haber, "are the many and complex underlying emotional problems of certain individuals under the stresses and strains of a complex world." He went on to say that feelings of inadquacy, peer competition, insecurity, rejection of certain accepted values or fear of rejection are all emotional inadequacies that frequently cause the emotionally distrubed individual to "cop out" of a world he declar. If and dehumanized. In such individuals, and paricularly today's young, drugs become the euphoria, the escape, the crutch to so compensate for their inability to adequately deal with the hard realities of every day living.

The highlight of Dr. Haber's talk came when he spoke of the possible ultimate end of the hard drug user. Some have become hopelessly insane --- mere breathing vegetables with little hope of eventual recovery. Many such severe cases do not respond to any of today's conventional medical treatment. The suicide rate among hard drug users is alarmingly high. As to the long range affects of hard drugs on the user Dr. Haber pointed out that research and statistical evidence is not yet sufficient to make a prognosis. He did state that there is some medical evidence that chromasone damage or changes, which control heredity factors in the unborn, can imperil future generations of the water. This sobering thought was a fitting way to conclude his most informative and enlightening talk on "The Drug Problem on Sanibel."


BELAWFUL --- REMOVE ILL EGAL SIGNS



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
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WHO'S WHO AND WHY

Approximately one third of all the tourists coming to the Islands stop at the Cham-


ber of Commerce on their arrival for information.

DEVELOPER LEAVES TREES

For the internal ion of nature lovers here on Sanibel there is a tract of land being developed in such a manner that it leaves Sanibel in its natural environment, not a tree, shrub or bush has been removed from any of the lots except for the road right of ways. A number of the lots have beautiful trees such as one with black mangrove which has been preserved by the owner of the property so that when the subdivision is laid out this beautiful tree, which is approximately 50 feet in circumference will not have to

Most of the property is on a high ridge with lovely palmetto, cabbage palms and as many as 20 Gumbo Limbo trees on some lots. When the owner of the subdivision employed a heavy machine operator to do the work he walked before the machine so that no tree of value would be lost, and where necessary transplanted them to another area. The younger children of the family were employed in rescuing air plants, orchids and other tree plants which were removed to trees in higher areas so that they might continue to grow. Also a number of friends were called in to take rescue plants and place in their own gardens. We think you should know the name of this very fine family who have moved to Sanibel Island. It is Mr. & Mrs. Bill Bunting and their two children, Billy and Barbara. He thinks so much of the area that he is calling it Gumbo Limbo. The lots are very large and Bill is hoping that there will be enough room for the purchasers of lots to build their homes without destroying trees.

REFERENDUM NEEDED FOR SCHOOL AIR CONDITIONING!

Lee County School Superintendant Ray Williams answered a petition by Sanibel administration members for air con-

oning stating that a public referendum would have to be borne by the public, if they voted to do so in a referendum. But Sanibel has several hundred dollars, collected and contributed not only by the school children and parents who held a rummage sale last year to obtain money for this purpose, but also some money contributed by other organizations, such as the American Legion. This money is held in an escrow account by the PTA group, but it has not been used because there is not enough money in the account to take care of air conditioning the en-

tire school, that is all of the rooms.

The school needs air conditioning badly to combat the "no-see-ums" that can come through the fine mesh of wire screening in the windows. When a room is closed off for privacy, such as the

office, or when visual aids such as movies are used, the atmosphere is stifling. We visited the school frequently this summer when the summer program was in progress, and the mosquitoes, no-seeums and other pests made teaching and learning most difficult. Fans and other systems are not adequate to cope with the special problem Sanibel School has.

We hope that the school will be able to either obtain enough money to do the job itself, or that the referendum can be ing of the school, as we believe Sanibel has unusual difficulties not common to other schools in the county.

Meantime, good Islanders, please ask your guests (and yourselves) not to take any live shells should they find them. We know that literally thousands have become diseased and died from the tide and every live shell that is left to breed may help in bringing back the many we used to have. Many thanks for every little bit of help.

The goal of the day is to achieve for-giveness of sins through prayer, repentance and deeds of righteousness.

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
