AREA REZONED FOR RESIDENCES COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

Despite some protests by interested parties, an agricultural area was rezoned Tuesday to allow for a 50 acre residential development. The tract is owned by Robert M. Taylor and fronts on the Gulf with access from a right-of-way extending several hundred

feet beyond a cul de sac at the end of Gulf Drive. The right-of-way would pass through the property of Mr. & Mrs. Willis Combs, who have long kept their land as a conservation area for invtied visitors, with trees and plants labeled to maintain a typical island natural environment.

The plan approved by the zoning board will permit the moving of the right-of-way 300 feet to the west and on the land of Mrs. A. Cochran of Covington, Ky. Walter Shirey was delegated to work out the realignment program between the Combs and Mrs. Cochran, but Mr. Taylor said he wouldnot give up his easement rights until another adjustment plan is worked out.

The residential development planned by Mr. Taylor calls for 96 lots spaced around a circular drive with four lanes for about 96 houses. There will be walks, bike paths and a recreation area for residents of the development, and a sewage treatment plant is on the planning board. Each home will have a minimum of 1,200 sq. ft. of living space.

Dr. Vernon MacKenzie, spoke for the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board, of which he is president, voicing the approval by the Planning Board of the rezoning if the access road can be realigned so that it will not destroy the natural features of the Combs' property, which has been maintained as a semi-public garden.



Several important business items were reported on at the general monthly meeting of the Sanibel Community Association on October 5 at the Community House.

Willis Combs was presented to the membership and expressed his thanks and appreciation to the Association for its consistent help and interest in the successful culmination of his Woodmere Preserve petition to the Board of County Commissioners. The Commissioners reacted favorably to the some four hundred signatures to the petition to maintain the unique nature of the Woodmere Preserve and indicated their desire to see it continued.

President Holtz reported on the Teen Club and that after their first business meeting at the Community House plans are underway for regular social activities in the weeks ahead. The Chair asked for adult volunteers from the Association membership to act as counselors to the Teen Club and so assist them in realizing their programs. Nine members agreed to assist Youth Committee members Bob Vartdal and Bob Dormer.

Duane White reported on his Shell Fair committee and stated that if present plans are realized the 1972 Shell Fair should be one of the finest and hopefully most successful. However, Duane indicated there is still a need for member participation in the important beforehand "ground work" to the Shell Fair and asked the membership to assist.

Harley Brown reported on the very successful first meeting of the San Carlos Bay Power Squadron's Piloting Course on October 4 with some 69 persons enrolled and in attendance for the 12 week course. Squadron officials conducting the course were impressed by the excellent turnout and the fine physical facilities at the Community House.


Paul Mamet reported on his House Committee and the installation of a new coke machine at the Community House and that on October 6 a new public address system with ample speakers and added "jacks" for various audio activities would be installed. Paul also stated his feeling that the Teen Club was off to a good start and expressed confidence in the island yourg people in meeting their needs through use of the Community House.

The secretary reported on the status of the Flood Insurance Program and urged all members, islanders and interested persons to write our Lee County Commissioners to proceed with implementation of the permanent Flood Insurance Program before expiration of the temporary program on December 31, 1971. The commissioners have indicated in correspondence with the Association board of directors that only through the interest and efforts of the people in affected areas can a permanent flood insurance program ultimately evolve and be implemented. However, the position of the Sanibel Community Association and its board of directors is that the need for such a permanent program is real and urgent, not only for the Sanibel-Captiva areas, but throughout all coastal and flood plain areas of Lee County. In the event of a hurricane or major tropical storm all such areas would benefit by this needed protection. The burden and responsibility of implementing the permanent flood insurance program rests in the hands of the local county government and all problems or technical difficulties of revamping the county building codes are incidental and should not deter the county government from meeting this great need of its people. In this regard the Board of Directors of the Association is asking The Islander to publish all pertinent correspondence from the County Commissioners on the matter.

After the regular business meeting, John Shepherd's entertainment committee, assisted by Harry Borchers, presented one of its finest programs. In a symphony of color, sound and words, Anne Hatcher and the Photographic Society of America presented a program entitled "Around the World With P.S.A." The color slides graphically depicted the ususal and the unusual, the bright and the subdued, and age and time as they conducted the spellbound viewer on a colorful journey to the far corners of the world in



picture and sound.. All members came away from this unique program with a new sense of respect and admiration for all photographers and photography.


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


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SHELL HARBOR INN



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
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SANIBEL PTA


Other programs and entertainment are planned for these young people and all the young people on the Island will be invited to come to all of them.

That weekend will be "Gondolier Weekend" at St. Michael's, and we hope the Island will extend its best welcome.





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


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DON'T FEED THE ALLIGATORS !

You're not only writing out a possible death sentence for the alligator, but creating a very dangerous situation for children, who, seeing adults feeding them, may be tempted to feed the pet (???) gator too, only to become it's meal.

Nearly every month someone in our state gets badly bitten by these prehistoric reptiles; a direct result of being fed since a hatchling.

An alligator is normally a shy animal and would avoid civilization, but when fed, they become bold, and suddenly the motel owner gets worried when his "cute" little 6 foot gator runs up the bank after a \$200 dog, or someone's priceless child.

Then there's a choice of either capturing and transporting the "beast" to a different area, or shooting it. Since the gator has a rather strong homing instinct, and in a few days will be found back in the same pond if transported, they often end up shot,

REPORT ON DAMAGE TO MOLLUSKS

Some weeks ago request was made for anyone on the islands to report any damage they had noticed to the mollusks as a result of the red tide. The information which follows was obtained from one motel owner, four shelling guides, one marine biologist and a number of just plain interested shellers who were observant.

South side of Sanibel between the Blue Dolphin and Tradewinds: Polinices duplicatus (shark eye) in piles, by the thousands with mouth parts diseased, some shells eroded as was even the operculum in some cases. Oliva sayana (olive) again thousands washed up dead with the mouth parts diseased. Sinum perspectivum (lady's ear) about one hundred in similar condition. Donax Variabilis (coquina) beach littered with closed shells containing dead bodies which neither the birds nor ants would touch.


South side Sanibel area of steamboat (also lower part Bonita Beach): Anomia simplex (iingle shells) beaches littered with doubles again with dead animals. As any sheller knows any doubles except the very smallest are hard to find at any time and noone contacted remembers them coming in such quantities, at least during the last 20 years.

Bay side of Sanibel from the causeway to Woodring Point was very badly hit though the Pine Island side seemed to escape with little damage. Eel Grass and Turtle Grass all brown and covered with slime and no sign of any snails. Later report is that both the eel and turtle grasses were showing signs of green at their roots and those at York Island were free of slime and beginning to produce. Shrimp (bait size) coming back also a few small blue crab. Ostrea frons (coon oyster) gone from the mangroves. Crassostrea virginica gone. Mercenaria (hard shelled clam) seemed to be O.K. although it was the one that caused the first ban on taking shellfish.

Blind Pass area: At the beginning of the tide the flats were a mass of dead mollusks. Later there were masses of dead shells of the lightning whelk, angel wings, horse conchs and shark eyes piled under the mangroves. Melongena corona (King's Crown) not killed off so much. Two large ones found on piling at Tarpon Bay and the smaller ones seemed to have a lower death rate.

Upper Captiva: In areas on the east side where many species and fiddler crabs were abundant, there was not a sign of anything living. Captiva and Roosevelt Channel did not seem to suffer as much as more exposed areas.

This report is just the result of natural curiosity brought on by realizing it was the bottom feeding fish that were killed in such quantities and wondering how the mollusks, which are also bottom feeders, had fared.
