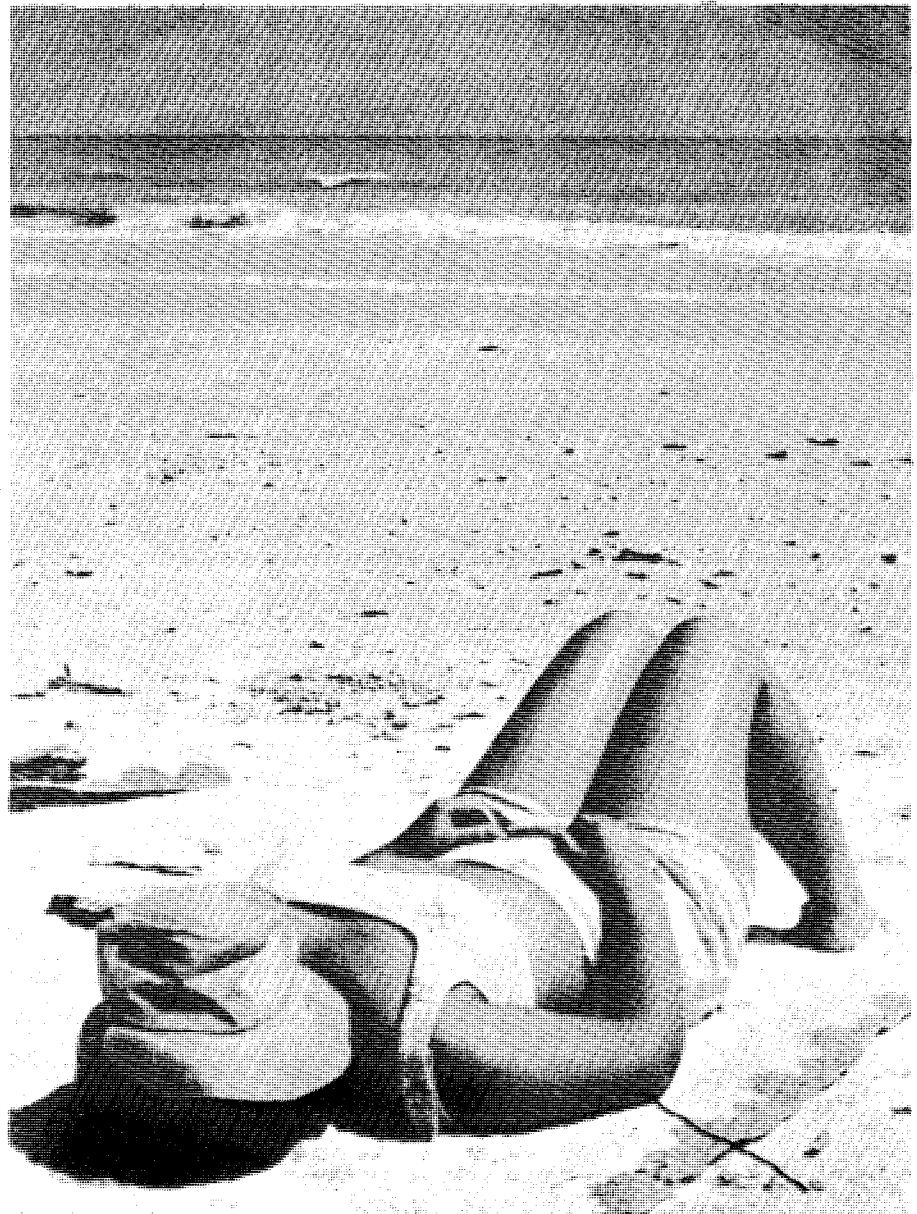


SHALIMAR COTTAGES

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

As land values rise and property taxes with them, the forgotten people are the old residents who don't want to sell their land, just live on it. In Florida, as in the Hawaiian Islands, the pioneer families often find they can no longer afford to remain on their property, that was their father's and grandfather's before them, simply because affluent people have moved into the neighborhood and built expensive homes beside theirs. This is not only unfair to those directly affected but it robs the community of its character, its roots and its living history. The attitude that the land is worth more and they can sell it is a completely materialistic approach which ignores the fact that not everyone is greedy and avaricious.

Our homesteaders did not settle on our islands and in our state to make a bundle but to have their own place where they could live and raise their children with dignity and pride. They worked hard and put up with often incredible hardships in order to own the land many of their descendants live on today. Like thoughtful people of our own time, most of what they did was for their children and grandchildren and those to come after them.

We have in our zoning laws a "Grandfather's Clause" which permits a business established long ago to continue even if the area around it changes. This sort of consideration should also apply to families who have had continuous ownership of their land over a long period. They should get a tax break as long as the property remains within that family although it need not, and probably should not, be passed on if the land is sold to an outsider. So few people would be affected that this would have little effect on the total tax picture but the psychological gains would be enormous. It would show that we on Sanibel and Captiva and in all of Florida care what happens to the real islanders and the real Floridians, who made us great and still have much to contribute.

Our state senator is Jerry Thomas. We should let him know that we need these people and what they stand for, in this great big materialistic world of ours.

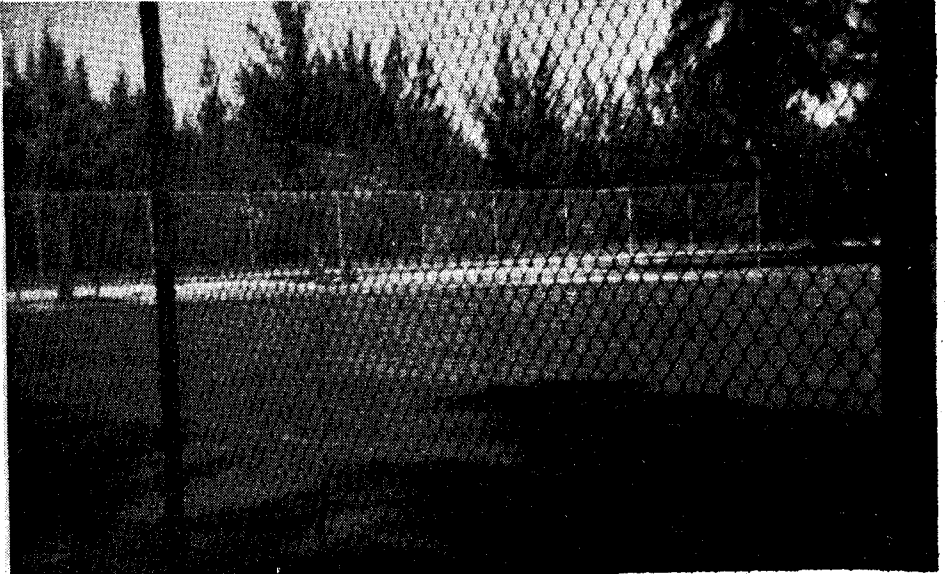
TEACHERS HAVE DUTY DAY

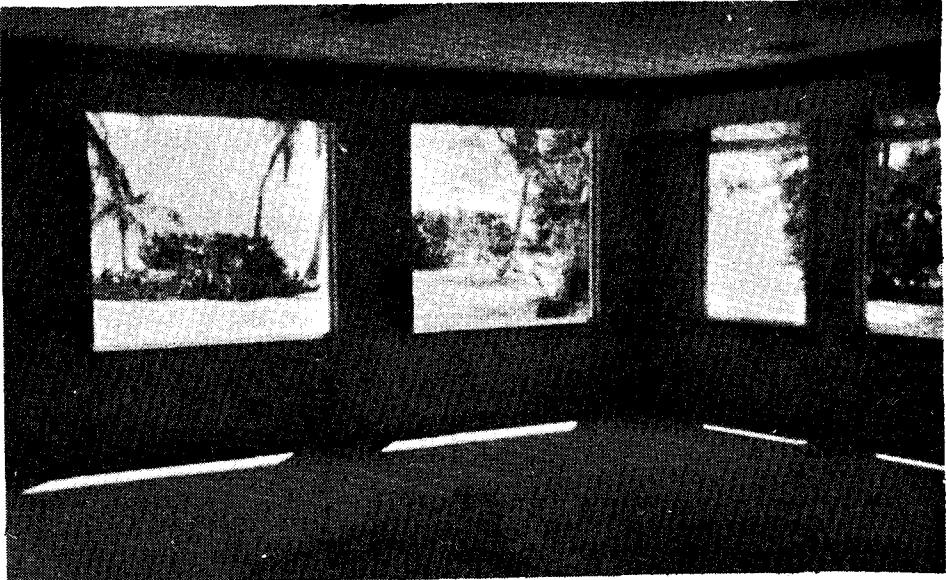

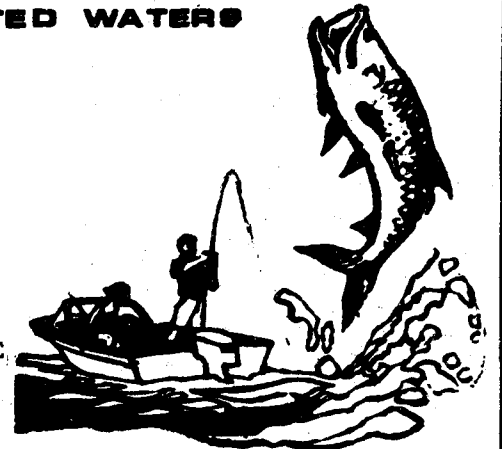



SAILING CLASS TO START FOR SANIBEL TEENAGERS

Mr. Duane White, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club has announced a new youth oriented program sponsored by Sanibel-Captiva Lions Club for island young men and women.

A free course in sailing will start with registration at 8 p.m. Friday, Oct. 29. Lessons will be given on Saturday, Oct. 30 at a time and place to be announced at registration. The course is open to Sanibel-Captiva boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 16 who have little or no sailing experience.

Mr. White says that two Sunfish Class sailboats have been made available for the project and that every precaution will be taken for the safety of the students.


Mr. Howard Hoffman of Sanibel is chairman of the Lions project committee responsible for the program and has appointed Mr. Clark Newcombe as supervisor of the class. Mr. Newcombe, a member of the United States Power Squadron and past commander of the Housatonic River Squadron in Connecticut has had many years of experience in cruising sail and power boats.

Four island men will act as instructors, all of whom are qualified boatmen. Mr. William Compton has had experience as sailing instructor in northern yacht clubs. Mr. J. Howard Woods, Mr. James Robson and Mr. Myton Ireland have had long years of experience in the sport of sailing.

Mr. White urges all young people between 12 and 16 to register on the 29th and learn to participate in the sport of sailing. He points out that as time is limited to Saturdays for instruction, enrollees will be taken on a 'first come' basis. Parental approval is required.



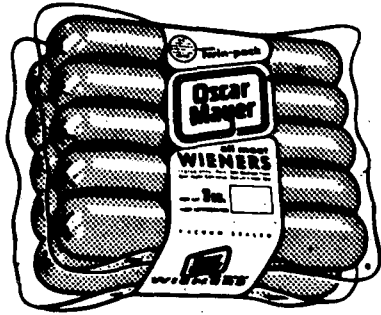

RECENT LEE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS ACTIONS

Wulfert Road now runs through property that the owners wish to develop. They would give the county a 60-foot substitute right-of-way and construct a paved road from the Sanibel-Captiva Road (SR 867) to the present intersection of Wulfert and the road to the wildlife refuge. A public hearing on this proposal is set for November 3 at 10 a.m. in the County Commission Room.

The county sewer project engineer, William E. Thompson, has stated that county sewer districts for Sanibel Island and Captiva Island should be eligible to receive federal construction grants. Thompson has asked the Chief of the federal grants branch of the Environmental Protection Agency in Atlanta to review the action of the County Commission in creating such districts to insure the creation meets federal legal requirements for obtaining funds.

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION NEWS

Mr. Joel Kuperberg, executive director of the Florida Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund, will speak at the annual meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Dec. 8, 1971, Sanibel Community House. The Board of Directors of the Foundation invites the public to attend.

Mr. Kuperberg, one of Florida's outstanding environmentalists, will speak on progress in developing environmental controls, particularly for South Florida. Prior to his appointment to his present position by Governor Askew last spring, Mr. Kuperberg was Executive Director of the Collier County Conservancy and was responsible for the creation of the Rookery Bay Sanctuary. He has worked closely with the local Foundation on the establishment of its program and is a member of its Advisory Board.

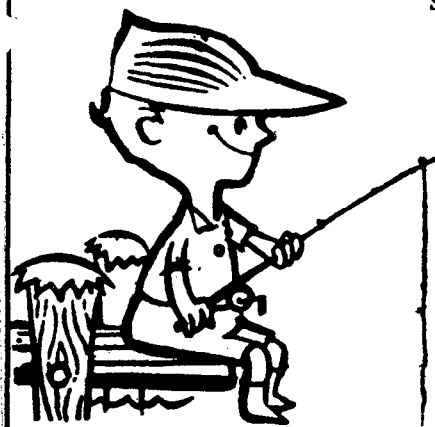

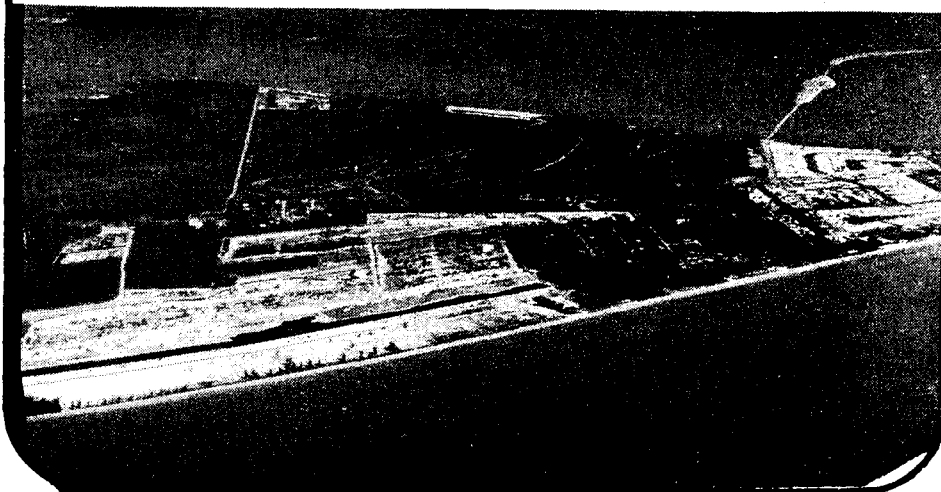

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA ART LEAGUE

Mrs. Pevear studied and worked for more than five years with the internationally known decoupage artists, Maybelle and Hiram Manning in Boston. Until she came to these tropical islands she did what she calls the "real" decoupage, the one dimensional kind. She now uses the intriguing and somewhat complicated three dimensional form as what she considers a short cut to the difficult and time consuming drying process of the original method which requires 25 to 30 separate coats of varnish. Her charming pictures have been shown in exhibitions both here and in New England, and are highly prized by those fortunate enough to own one.

JURIED ART SHOW PLANNED AT MALL

The second annual Edison Mall juried art show, sponsored jointly by the Art Council of Southwest Florida and the Edison Mall merchants, will be staged November 15 - 20.

A \$100 Best of Show and two \$50 prizes for a realistic and an abstract painting will be awarded along with first, second and third prize ribbons in oil, watercolor, acrylic and "other media" categories. An entry fee of \$2 per painting will be charged with no more than four works being accepted by an individual artist.

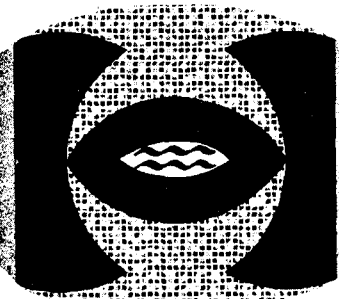

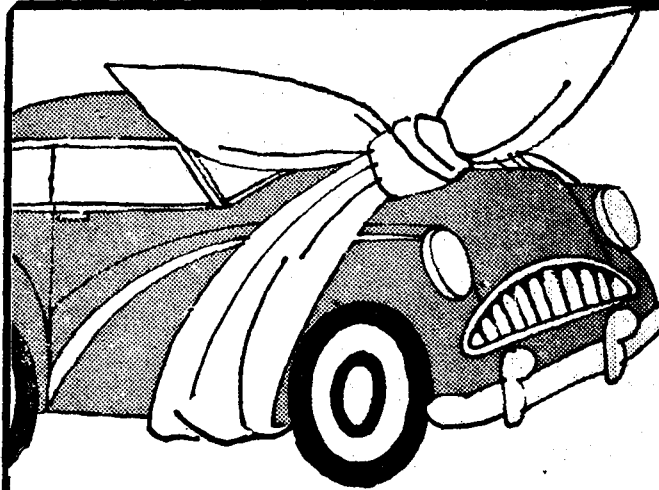
