PROPOSED TAX AMENDMENT

On Friday, October 29, 1971, there will be a talk on and open discussion of the proposed tax amendment which comes up for vote on November 2, 1971. The meeting will be held at the Sanibel Community Association Hall on Periwinkle Way, Sanibel. Arthur N. Hamel, well known for his continuing and sustained commitment to the welfare of Lee Countians, will speak on the "Fables and Facts About the Corporate Profits Tax." After his talk, an extended question and answer period will follow. Prof. Charles C. Fishburne, political scientist, will be the moderator. The seminar is under the auspices of the Citizens For Tax Reform. Since the issue is non-partisan, all citizens, regardless of party of non-party affiliation, are welcome. There will be no admission charge.

SCHOOL MILLAGE NEEDED

"The School Millage coming up for consideration and voting on in the November 2 referendum is not a new thing," said Mr. George Dissette, principal of Sanibel-Captiva School. A recent survey of schools in Lee County showed that an increase of 5,545 pupils will occur by 1973 and 1974. The millage proposal is NOT a new tax, it is merely







a continuation of the present school tax which has to be re-voted on every two years. "Some of the children that this millage will benefit will be moving into the county, but most of them are here now and will be coming of school age in the next few years, said Mr. Dissette.

"The children will be attending schools and kindergartens, and it would be retrogressive to state that what was good enough for grandfather is good enough for o u r children, for tests have shown that children who attend kindergarten are better prepared to enter the first grade. Working mothers are on the increase, and it is bett to have a child in kindergarten in a learning atmosphere rather than a play school.

Also, of vital concern to the Islands is the fact that some of this money is scheduled for use in air conditioning the school and for repairs and improvements. Have you ever tried to work in a room with 20 hot bug-swatting children?


Mr. John Rushworth reported on a proposed recreation area for the Islands' youth and plans to look into the availability of federal funds for such a project.



The Lee County Building Department is sued a \$65,000 permit to build a Jerry Lewis Cinema on Sanibel.

The Jerry Lewis Cinema is being built for John Kontinos by Hiers Construction Co. The cinema will be the third one in Lee County and will take about four months to complete. A similar theater is already open at Fort Myers Beach and one at Lehigh Acres is expected to open in early December.

The Sanibel Jerry Lewis Cinema will be located between the Coconut Grove Restaurant and Bailey's General Store in the shopping center on the Island. Kontinos is a. long-time resident of Sanibel and was one of the leaders in getting a community water system built on the Island.

WILDLIFE REFUGE NEWS

Robert L. Barber, manager of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge on Sanibel Island, today presented a \$9,713.61 check to Commissioner Walter Shirey. The money represents the annual payment from the U. S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, to Lee County under the Refuge Revenue Sharing

Public Law 88-523 provides for payments to counties in which National Wildlife Refuges are located. The funds are computed on the basis of 3/4 of 1% of the adjusted cost of all lands which have been purchased in the county for the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge. The county is to use the money for schools and roads.


