THEY'RE OFF!

The Presidential race has begun, Folks! U. S. Senator, Henry Jackson, from the state of Washington, who will enter the Florida primaries on the Democratic ticket, is giving his friends, his supporters and his rivals a chance at a first hand look next week when he flies to Fort Myers at 11:30 a.m., November 29.

Senator Jackson is scheduled to appear first at Edison Junior College where he will make a short informal talk. At 12:45, interested voters, regardless of their politics, are invited to meet the Senator at the Hall of 50 States at the Fort Myers-Lee County hamber of Commerce where light refreshments will be served. Here he will also make a short talk. An hour later, an informal press conference will be held, after which he will continue his trip to Sarasota.

Local sponsors for Jackson's visit to Lee County are Dr. John A. Atkinson, president of the Beach Chamber of Commerce, and Attorney Patrick Geraghty.

Jackson started his Florida trip in Tallahassee last Friday and expects to visit quite a number of Florida cities while he is here.

Happy Thanksgiving

Two main items emerged from a busy agenda at the regular monthly business meeting of the Sanibel Community Association Board of Directors on November 16 at the Community House.

The first item was a report by Bob Vartdal, chairman of the Public Affairs Committee, on the status of the Permanent Flood Insurance Program now under study and consideration by the Board of County Commissioners. According to the report the outlook for a permanent program looks somewhat brighter after Mr. Vartdal's meeting with Commissioner Walter Shirey and that there was some movement off "dead center" on the matter. Mr. Vartdal indicated that Jim Robson, a Community Association member, has taken a keen and active interest in working with Mr. Vartdal's committee in furthering the cause of a permanent Flood Insurance Program. Mr. Robson has spent many hours of his own time in the County Courthouse seeking answers and consulting with pertinent officials on the problem. Mr. Robson reported to the chairman that Commissioner Shirey, Chairman Bruce Scott, Commissioner Julian Hudson, and Doug Taylor of the Building and Zoning Dept. would be flying up to Washington on Monday, Nov. 22 for two days of consultation with federal officials to pinpoint the nature of the problem of implementation of the program, as well as to dramatize Lee County's support of the program. Commissioner Shirey promised a full report on their deliberations upon his return from Washington. He set a tentative date of Nov. 24 for a Commission meeting to discuss the ramifications of their meeting with federal officials. A commission spokesman further stated that the temporary flood insurance program has been extended to March 3, 1972. The Board of Directors recommended that Jim Robson be appointed a member of the important Public Affairs Committee and that he and Bob Varidal report back on the Flood Insurance Program to the Association membership meeting set for December 7 at the Community House.

The second item was a report by Duane White and his Shell Fair committee. In line with the board's concept of innovation and constructive change in making the annual Shell Fair bigger and better, Duane announced, with the approval of the board, the establishment in this year's fair of a Sanibel trophy. The trophy would be in the form of a large mounted "Fighting Conch," The winner of the trophy would be selected by ballot with all persons attending the fair participating and voting on the entry which, in their opinion, is the most meritorious on display at the Fair. The winner's name will then be appropriately inscribed on a metal plate and affixed to the trophy which will remain on display in the Community House as the Sanibel Trophy. The award will be an annual Fair event and each succeeding winner will have his or her name inscribed with that of the first winner,

In other business of note the board voted to support the general concept of an Island Recreation Center as endorsed by the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce. However, in voting to support the general concept the board agreed unanimously to withhold its full support to the project until it receives more "in-depth" particulars of the nature and scope of such a project.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

Congratulations on the new series on local public affairs started in the Nov. 11 issue. I suppose that eventually we might find out why the Lee County Mosquito Control District should be independent of County control and operation. Also, why its budget has escalated from \$277,819 ten years ago to \$928,253 this year. This, despite the experience of the Fort Myers Beach Mosquito Control District, that peaked from \$41,021 in 1961 to \$67,591 in 1967 then dropped off each year since to \$41,455 in 1971. It seems to me that the latter's experience is the more normal one for an efficiently operated program of eradication.

Since your columns recently touched on the Sanibel Causeway, there must be many newcomers who are curious about the origins and nature of that operation. The Islander could help us understand that subject by presenting some basic facts. For instance, what is the relationship of the Causeway Commission to the County Government? Who are its officers

and how are they selected? Does it pay anything similar to taxes to the county? Who are the major bondholders? What percentage of the total number of outstanding bonds is required to vote a change in the Bond Indenture? What are the Call Provisions on the bonds? What interest rate does the bonds pay? What provision is made for a sinking fund? How does the Indenture dispose of any revenue above maintenance, operating, debt service, and reserve costs? Is there an openend feature in the Indenture to permit financing and operation of facilities other than those directly essential to the Causeway? What have been the annual revenues and expenses of the Causeway since its opening? And what were the major findings of the financial report on the feasibility of additional facilities that the County Commissioners requested of Arch W. Roberts & Co. last spring?

I am looking forward eagerly to your continuance of the series.

MORE WATER NEEDED

Within the past year, the Board of the Island Water Association authorized and received a comprehensive engineering study of the present and future water demand and supply for Sanibel and Captiva. Based upon this study, the Board has decided that additional water supply sources should be obtained by the Association at the earliest feasable date. To accomplish this, the Board, during the past several months, has been exploring the reliability and economics of two recommended sources: The Greater Pine Island Water Association, our present supplier; and a new deep well supply and water treatment plan constructed on Sanibel.

To obtain an adequate and reliable supply of water from either of these sources will require wells deep enough to tap the huge aquifers of brackish water which underly the portion of Florida. The brackish water contains only a fraction of the salt found in sea water and therefore can be de-salinated and softened at costs considered economically feasable. At the present time, the Board has under consideration a new contract for supplying water offered by the Greater Pine Island Water Association and also the three lowest of six bids received for construction of a deep well water supply and treatment plant on Sanibel. The Board has also instituted actions to secure favorable government financing to cover the construction costs of the water source selected.

With the rapid growth of the islands and the ever present possibility of breakdowns in mechanical equipment, it is projected that during the coming peak season some variations in water supply or pressure may be experienced temporarily. The Board, recognizing this, will utilize all precautions under their control to prevent or minimize such occurances.

SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR ENVIROMENTAL PLANNING CONFERENCE

Nathaniel P. Reed, Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Department of the Interior, Fish, Wildlife and Parks division, and Ian McHarg, noted planner and landscape architect on the faculty of the University of Pennsylvania, will speak at the environmental planning conference to be held in Fort Myers January 27 thru 29, announced Frank Blandford, interim director of ECOSWF (Environmental Confederation of South West Florida) and Roy Bazire, interim secretary of ECOSWF and executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

ECOSWF will sponsor the meeting and the island foundation will act as host group. Edison Junior College is the site for all meetings.

Objective of the conference is to promote the development of a meaningful land resource plan for all of South Florida, one with enforcement teeth, and combined with federal-state commitments for substantial new land acquisition in south Florida and on the coastal islands of Southwest Florida.

Leaders of local, state and national conseevation and environmental groups, of county, state and federal agencies, and of business and industry concerned with environmental problems in south Florida will participate.

The public is invited and urged to attend the evening sessions. Thursday, Jan. 27, Mr. Reed is scheduled to speak, and Friday, Jan. 28, Mr. McHarg. Both meetings are at 8 p.m in the new health and p.e. building on the Edison college campus.

MOSQUITO BITES #2

Florida is a wonderful place to live. Early writers were always enthusiastic when describing the natural beauty and abundant wildlife of our state, but one went on to say --- 'But unfortunately, in opposition to these numerous advantages, there are the greatest plagues that can afflict a new settlement; an unhealthy climate.


"Every year bilious fevers of a most dangerous nature spread consternation in the whole region. Then all the shops are closed, the tear of the epidemic and the stifling heat caused the planters of the neighborhood to leave the city, and all the inhabitants who can afford the expense of this kind go to the northern part of the United States to seek a more salubrious climate, and the merchants take advantage of this season to go to New York or Philadelphia to place their orders. Although the climate is dangerous for strangers at all times, the most insalubrious months are August, September, October and November; then no one can be sure of escaping the plague; neither the planter who has been settled in the country for years, nor the negro born in the midst of the miasma of Carolina, or under the burning sun of Georgia. The comparative extent of the huge cemeteries is a sad warning for the one who, charmed by the beauty of the sight, would want to establish himself in this region."

He was talking about malaria and yellow fever -- both conquered after mosquito control became a reality. Fifty years of study and work have made mosquito borne diseases pretty rare, but Florida still has a pest mosquito problem and Lee County is a record holder.

Mosquitoes are measured in devices called light traps, and just 20 years ago, the world's largest collection was taken in Lee County --- 365,000 salt marsh mosquitoes in one night.


The Lee County Mosquito Control District was created in 1958, and in 1971 the largest collection was 3,392. Quite a reduction --- over 99%. But everybody who tried to cook out this summer knows that the one percent left are far too many.

Why don't they just eradicate the pesky things and be done with it? We'll answer that in next week's article.

Earlier blossoms now ripen to fruit of many kinds,


The mango, the guava, the lime and the And on the rambling sea grape,







SUMMER FIRES BENEFIT WILDLIFE

Dr. Frank C. Craighead, Sr., a noted ecologist who is advisor to the Everglades National Park, National Geographic Magazine, the Sanibel Captiva Conservation Foundation and many other organizations, has been studying the Sanibel fresh water wetlands for several years. He has inspected the area swept by fire on both sides of the Sanibel River in the acreage east of Rabbit Road. Some 150 acres in this area are owned by the local Foundation as the site for a future nature center. Dr. Craighead's report, in part, follows:

"This burn covered a considerable area east of Rabbit Road and on both sides of the Sanibel River. It was quite a hot fire and most vegetation was killed on the ground surface. It is too early to determine the extent of the mortality in the established vegetation. Many plants were sprouting, indicating all roots were not killed. On the other hand, many clumps of vegetation appear to be destroyed. At least the mass of vegetation will be greatly thinned.

"More study will be necessary to determine if the firm soil, a mixture of sand and peat, is the original swamp bed or a hard crust built up in recent years of fire protection

"My present reaction to this fire is that it was highly beneficial and the burned area will be much more attractive to wildlife this winter." (based upon inspection in August; periodic inspections will be made by Dr. Craighead.)





MAKING TRACKS WITH SANDY

One would never suspect, on meeting Jane Bancroft for the first time, that she had been a newspaper reporter all of her life. This glamorous, attractive, soft spoken woman, with the bluest eyes I've ever seen, looks less like a reporter and more like a woman who has lived the leisurely life. It is certainly true that looks CAN be deceiving for here is her story!

Back in Quincy, Ill., as Jane Eads, she began her fascinating career by reading copy for a small newspaper. Like most humble beginnings, this launched her on her way as a reporter for the old Chicago Herald and Examiner and later as a correspondent for the Hearst Wire Service in New York, Rome, Paris and finally Washington, D.C. During this exciting and busy life she met and married Griffing Bancroft (former CBS radio commentator, newspaper man, historian, ornithologist and most recently author of the popular book, "Snowy.") Her life in Washington would make a good book,

for she was there during the Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower administrations, "I was a member of Mrs. Roosevelt's press conference group and we met once a week," she told me, "and I covered the Democratic convention when President Roosevelt ran for a third term."

Her interviews with members of Congress and their wives, celebrities and artists made her many new friends. Among these were authors Fletcher Knebel and the late Rachel Carson. It was actually Mr. Knebel who was responsible for the Bancrofts coming to Captiva, for he, as well as Miss Carson, had vacationed here.

Jane and Griffing Bancroft moved to Captiva in 1958 where she was able to pursue her first love, painting. At this endeavor she has been successful also, for it has blossomed into something more than just a hobby.

I couldn't help asking, comparing her mode of living now to her adventures as a

member of the press, if she was sorry she had given it all up.
"Not at all," said this extraordinary woman. "I am living a relaxed life in a place I love the most --- our home on the bay."

WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

A great white heron, a bird seldom seen north of the Florida Keys, has again been observed on the Islands. One was seen a few days ago near the bridge at Blind Pass and later on Upper Captiva across Redrish Pass.

Without special markings, of course, it cannot be said with certainty that this was the same bird, or was the one seen here in past years. But a lone great white heron has been sighted in this area off and on for a number of years. It probably is the same

In 1968 this writer, in company with others, found a great white nesting in a heron rookery in Pine Island Sound. This was a northern breeding record for the great white and was written up in "The Auk," the publication of the American Ornithologists' Union.

In this case the great white heron was mated with a great blue heron but this was not unusual. In the Keys where the great whites are more plentiful, great blues and great whites interbreed very freely.

The two birds are recognized in the current official AOU list as separate species, but their offspring, which are fertile, seem to be either all white or all blue all their lives. In other words, hybrids are not produced as was one time believed. In fact, a name was once given to this supposed hybrid, Wurdemann's Heron.

Now most ornithologists seem to believe that the birds are, in fact, the same species in different color phases.

There already is recognition of this so-called "dichromatism" in the big her on

family, in the white and dark phases of the Reddish Egret. The white phase here was once listed as a separate species, called Peale's Heron.

The much more plentiful American, or Common Egret, which is abundant on the

Islands, is often mistaken for agreat white heron. They, too, are all white and at times look just about as large as their bigger cousin, which is 38 inches in length compared to 32 as an average for the American egret.

The best and surest field identification here is in the legs. Those of the great white heron are yellowish, while the leggs of the American egret are black.

SEBRING NEWS

Officials of the Automobile Racing Club of Florida (A.R.C.F. Inc.) promoters of the world famous Sebring endurance classic confirmed today that the 1972 race will again be of 12 hours duration. The event is scheduled for March 25 of next year, on the traditional 5.2 mile road circuit.

This announcement clarifies persistent rumors that recently have indicated the possibility that the race would be shortened to six hours or 1200 kilo-

A spokesman for the A.R.C.F. said, "Sebring has the 12 hour tradition and would not be easily changed in the light of 22 years of history. The race will remain a 12 hour endurance test for the foreseeable future."

The 1972 race will be the final event on the 5.2 mile track, as plans are progressing for construction of a modern, permanent facility to house the event in 1973 and subsequent years. The new circuit, to be built on property owned by the A.R.C.F. is located six miles southwest of Sebring, approximately 10 miles west of the existing track.
