SANIBEL SHELL FAIR ON MARCH 2, 3 & 4

The Sanibel Shell Fair is March 2, 3 and 4 this year, and it is called the Sanibel Shell Fair because it is held on Sanibel at the Community House, but it includes Captiva, too, as both islands have long been known as the greatest in shell collection areas. And all people involved with the Shell Fair, which is practically everyone around the islands, has been busy for months getting things ready for what promoses to be the biggest and best ever. Ladies and men have been meeting on Monday mornings to clean, polish and generally get driftwood ready for sale, and others have been readying their shell collections for display and sale, while others have been making plans for the refreshment booth and all the other displays.

The beautiful shell table has been on display for some time and tickets have been sold, and continue to be sold, as some lucky winner will be announced at the Fair. Collectors will be entering their collections to compete for cups and ribbons. They will be for island shells collected locally, the large Shell of the Show, Foreign Shells, Miniatures, Florida Shells and others.

Sanibel's Shell Fair is now world renowned, having humble beginnings in 1928 as a sort of country fair with many shells from local gatherers, and homemade gifts, pies and goodies being offered.

This year, the theme of the Fair will be to save our vanishing shells from extinction, by limiting the number of live shells taken to two only, since extensive shelling has depleted the source of shells, and conservation is the theme.

Those directly concerned with the Fair have been the Sanibel Community Association officers and include: President, Marshall Holtz, Jr., Vice President, C. D. White, Secretary, Arthur Arnold, and Treasurer, Paul H. Mamet.




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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

Volunteer workers are sought to assist in the programs of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. A "Workers Pool" of island residents who have expressed their willingness to assist is available to the Foundation, but the many and varied tasks to be done require its expansion.

Jobs done by volunteers in recent months include work on the Membership and Fund Raising Committee, hostessing at the ECOSWF conference, acting as interrogators for a survey of the uses of the three areas of the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge, telephoning islanders to urge their attendance at critical meets before County officials. Other jobs which arise from time to time include help for Caretta Research (mostly summertime), assisting in putting together and mailing membership reports, typing and secretarial, letter writing and telephone campaigns on critical legislation (this will be important during the next couple of months and volunteers are urgently needed), working with students in the Lee County Environmental Education program.

WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

It is now well established that man's poisons, insecticides, mercury and other pollutants, inhibit the proper hormonal development in birds.

This causes various abnormalities in breeding procedures, such as thinning egg shells, sterility and other aberrations. It all varies with different species, and even with different individuals within the same species.

The fish eating birds have been most noticeably effected, although surprisingly some groups, for example the herons and their relatives, so far do not seem to have suffered.

Most of the eagles in Florida, including the pair with a nest on Captiva, have been having sterile eggs. But the brown pelicans have been hardest hit. In the big rookeries in California and elsewhere eggs are being laid with shells so thin that they break when the birds attempt to incubate.

While pelicans in south Florida are still reproducing, the egg shells here are getting steadily thinner year by year. And now another apparent abberation has been detected.

Ralph Schreiber, a graduate student at the University of South Florida who is working on a doctor's thesis on brown pelians, discovered some of the birds laying eggs in Tampa Bay in January --- fully three months earlier than normal.


As it turned out, only a few birds did this and it is hoped the rest will nest as usual in April. Schreiber, however, wanted a check made to see if early nesting had also taken place elsewhere. So a trip was made to a nesting rookery on a mangrove island here in Pine Island Sound. We discovered no evidence of any pelicans nesting this early, but we did count, out of a hundred birds, four which were in full breeding plumage, with white heads, bright brown along the back of the neck, and pink on the bills.

Further checks will be needed to determine if these early pre-nuptial changes result in pre-season nest building and egg laying.

Incidentally we did find cormorants incubating eggs already in the Pine Island Sound rookery, but they usually nest well ahead of the pelicans.

Great blue herons, normal early nesters, also had eggs and we found again a breeding great white heron. But more on that in a later column.

MAKING TRACKS with Sandy

"Why leave heaven?" was the straightforward answer I received when I asked Dr. Ingalls Simmons if he and his wife Patsy ever left Sanibel for a vacation elsewhere. Feeling that I have my own little corner on heaven right here too, I wanted to find out what theirs looked like, so I called on the Simmonses and had to admit that what I saw was indeed charming.

I was soon to find out that, although they had lived all over the world, this was their first real home and their very first garden. They find the thrill of growing things is surpassed only by the thrill of looking out through the porch to the Gulf of Mexico.

"If someone tells me that a certain plant won't grow here, I immediately plant it, like that violet over there," he said, pointing to lovely purple blossoms blooming under a shady tree. In this same shady arbor are varieties of orchids and other exotic plants that reflect the doctor's thoughtful attention and care. Around the house and throughout the yard bloom 70 varieties of hibiscus to which I was proudly "introduced." I then learned that Dr. Simmons is vice president of the south eastern Hibiscus Club that meets once a month in Fort Myers. "I used to think that flower clubs were for little old ladies, never dreaming that one day I would be on the board of one," he said laughing, as he showed me a particularly lovely blossom of pale pink and yellow.

When you step into their home, you see evidences of their travels abroad, for they have collected objets d'art from France to the Orient. Now they are collecting from Sanibel.

Dr. Simmons was born in Worcester, Mass. As a young man he financed his Tufts medical studies by working as a carnival side show barker. "For learning about people, it was an experience that was better than any course I've ever had in psychology or psychiatry."

It was in one of the courses in psychiatry that he met a young psychiatric social worker, Patricia Robbins, whom he married. As Mrs. Simmons, she would share his long career in the military world.

His career started in the Army in World War II as commander of a hospital train transporting the wounded to specialty hospitals. He became interested in preventative medicine at Henry Barracks in Puerto Rico where he was post surgeon. From there the Army sent him to Harvard for a Master's Degree in public health. He was sent to Tokyo as the first prevetive medicine officer ever assigned to an Army medical general laboratory and later to Okinawa for environmental clean-up operations. In the field of preventive medicine he was to work with Dr. Jonas Salk (developer of the polio vaccine) in influenza research at Ft. Dix, N.J.; at Ft. Sam Houston as a full time member of the faculty; in Orleans, France, as Chief of Preventive Medicine; and as Deputy Surgeon for the Communications Zone in Europe. Many assignments for the U.S. Army followed until his retirement as Colonel in 1969.

"Sim" Simmons calls this his retirement home, although "retirement" (the rocking chair variety) is an ugly word to him. He now holds two part time positions; he is acting as a consultant for ARA Services (a food service management firm dealing with food for hospitals and colleges) and is a District Director of mid-Florida Area Regional Medical Program.

Having spent his life in public health, he is now working for the good of our own community by fighting to preserve the islands' natural beauty and ecology as vice chairman of the Sanibel Island Planning Board and as a member of the Board of the Sanibel Community Association.

As usual, the program is open to the public, and all are cordially invited.



We had the pleasure of meeting and talking with two lovely ladies, one of whom was one of the first children born on Sanibel, Mrs. William Muir, who was the former Genevieve Cooper, and daughter of Capt. George M. Cooper, and Miss Anne Geraty, Mrs. Muire's niece. Both ladies are guests of Mrs. Gerald T. Martin at the historic Grey Gables home on the Gulf, which once housed the girls' school operated in the 90's by the Misses Lettie, Cordie and Minnie Nutt.

Mrs. Muir was the daughter of a pioneer family on Sanibel. Her father homesteaded property on the island in the Tarpon Bay area, and claimed about 160 acres, all of which is included in the wetlands incorporated into U.S. Government property now. Capt. Cooper was instrumental in the building of Tarpon Bay Road and he was the first Justice of the Peace on Sanibel. Daughter Genevieve was born in a house near the Lighthouse site in 1891. Her father had a fleet of several schooners which operated out of Sanibel Wharf going to Key West and Tampa to the Honduras Islands even. He also brought the mail by boat from St. James City and distributed it from his home as the first Post Office on the islands, in the house next to the present Post Office building.

Genevieve grew up on the islands and attended schools here, and she has some particularly fond memories of Grey Gables, as she met the man she was later to marry, William Muir, at the beautiful old house. He was a Canadian soldier on leave and they were married in Tampa. Then she moved to Paris, Ont., Canada, with her new husband in 1921, but through the years she has returned to visit on the islands, always loving Sanibel as home. In her new role in Canada, she learned to be a librarian and for 22 years worked in the Public Library in Paris, Ontario, retiring

beautiful nature pictures on Sanibel and Captiva. Others in the book were taken in Africa and New Zealand, and they are all beautifully detailed in black and white. The book contains an introduction by Arthur Godfrey. On the cover of the book, it explains that Mr. Damroth has set up trust funds; one for conservation purposes and has made two donations of sizeable amounts to Island Conservation groups. He is also the author of the book "How to Win Success Before Forty" (we wish we had been able to read it years ago) and he is planning to retire to Captiva soon.


DONATIONS NEEDED

At the ugly bleakness below.







A volunteer workshop with weekly opportunities for volunteers is offered at the Center where the senior volunteers meet other seniors and have a choice of programs. Also there are employment referrals to supplement personal incomes. Adult education classes and seminars are available for the senior citizen to help broaden and enrich his skills, knowledge and leisure. Adult volunteers are needed to help

with home-making, emergency transportation, home visits to shut ins, etc.


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
