Park Expansion Approved

An expansion of the Periwinkle Trailer Park on Sanibel Island for 45 to 50 more mobile home spaces and 90 travel trailer spaces was approved last week by the County Commission despite opposition from Island residents.

The zoning was changed on approximately 10 acres immediately adjacent to the trailer park from general use to mobile home and travel trailer park use. The parcel is owned by Francis P. Bailey and his brothers but will be leased to Al and Jerry Muench, father and son owners and operators of the park.

The Periwinkle Trailer Park is located on Beach Road about 1,000 feet west of the Sanibel Causeway intersection. The park has been on the site for many years. Muench argued that it is better to allow the expansion of an exisiting park that is being properly operated than to have another park open up in some other part of the island.

Muench said there would be a buffer to keep the development some 160 feet from the Sanibel River and another to keep it some 175 feet away from a nearby wildlife refuge. He said the addition will be ready for use next fall to meet the demands of winter visitors.

Opposition to the expansion came from the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board,



from several residents and several business owners on the island.

Dr. Vernon McKinzie, president of the planning board association, said that the park at its present size accounts for about 14% of Sanibel's winter population concentration and the 10-acre expansion will account for about 20% of the concentration. He argued that the rezoning should be postponed until a study of land use on Sanibel Island is completed.

The residents argued that park residents use the beaches, cause crowded conditions and littering.

In other zoning matters considered during the day, the Commissioners approved changing a parcel fronting on the Gulf of Mexico from mobile home park use to multi-family apartment use, and granted rezoning a strip along Bailey Road from single family residential use to duplex residential use while allowing a deferral for rezoning a general use tract to single family use.

An 11-acre parcel located between Gulf Drive and the Gulf of Mexico owned by John M. and Clare Hallward that was zoned for mobile home park use was changed to multiple family apartment use for a development of two and three story buildings and a recreation complex adjacent to Gulf Drive.

An adjoining parcel that is also zoned for mobile home park use but has other owners has been approved by the County Zoning Board and will come before the commission next month. Approval of this change would remove all mobile home park zoning from beachfront property on Sanibel.

Attorney Charles Edwards, representing the Hallwards, said the request was unusual since a trailer park would be more profitable on the beachfront parcel than a condominium complex. The plan he showed calls for about 12 three story buildings with 160 units.

A dispute over the right-of-way for a new access road running along the beach side of the island delayed the hearing until late in the afternoon. Commissioner Walter Shirey said he has worked for several months to get the right-of-way and the way the road would run would take it across the Hallward property.

Edwards said his clients would be unable to develop the property with a major highway running through its middle but said a part of the recreation area would be donated. At the later afternoon hearing Edwards stated this position and the zoning was approved.

Duplex zoning on Bailey Road was granted to Sanibel Harbours Estates Inc. and the commissioners agreed to postpone a portion of the rezoning petition calling for changing a large general use parcel adjacent to the Ding Darling Sanctuary to single family residential use until next month. The petitioners said the postponement will give them time for more study on the ecology of the property.

Sewers Coming

County officials discussed plans for the \$4 million sewer system for Sanibel and Captiva Islands last Wednesday at the Sanibel Community Center.

County Commissioner Walter Shirey and William E. Thompson, County sewer consultant, presented payment alternatives for the system to residents of Sanibel and Captiva.

Thompson said there are federal funds available for construction of the project "And we explained it to the public out there and if they want it, they can petition the County Commission."

There will be a referendum vote later for the people of Sanibel and Captiva, on their wishes in the matter.



It is suggested that the artists bring their lunch with them. There will be a \$5.00 charge to cover the expenses of the day.



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
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




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

With his lifelong interest in the sea, Vallez naturally turns to this subject when painting. Whether it is the hull of a boat lodged in mangroves or a fisherman hauling in his nets, Vallez captures the serenity of spirit and the timelessness of his subject. Displaying a wide versatility, his mediums range from a rugged sea captain painted on planking to a delicate watercolor of a local air plant. In addition, he has a series of silk screen prints finished individually in watercolors.


In keeping with his love of the sea, Vallez and his wife Robah and daughter, Lisa live aboard a 1929 Elec, a classic among yachts, docked at Naples. Before coming to Naples he spent his summers aboard a 30-foot Chinese junk on Door Peninsula, Wis., and his winters in Highland Park, Ill. Vallez' paintings have won many awards and his work hangs in more than 100 private collections.

Ask Howard Ferguson what his main interest is, and he laughs and says, "Find a piece of good wood large enough to carve a bird in flight. I like to show a bird in action, rather than perched." Wood comes alive through the talent of Ferguson who has created carvings of egrets in their mating dance, an osprey with wings stretched upward, and of many other shore birds.

His father and grandfather were wood turners, and Ferguson grew up with a knowledge of woods, their names and usage. "There are many American woods, but so few of them are being used. Some trees that are not used for commercial lumber

are very fine for carving," Ferguson comments.

His latest piece, finished just in time for this show, is that of a roseate spoonbill, carved of red cedar. This is Ferguson's first Southwest Florida showing, and he plans to bring his hand tools to demonstrate his carving technique on a bird he has just started.

Just leave them at the Sanibel Public Library. Thank you.




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


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TODAY IS LAST CHANCE FOR "THE LATE LIZ"

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

Attendance records were broken at the Sanibel Shell Fair as more than 11,000 persons attended the 3-day event ending on Sunday.



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
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WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

Birds are subject to many vicissitudes and we have a harsh example of this in nearby Corkscrew Swamp.

This big Audubon sanctuary plays host to a nesting colony of wood ibis, or, more properly, wood storks. These great birds build their nests high in the cypress

trees and by mid-February of this year Corkscrew officials counted fourteen hundred nests, most of them with eggs.

Then, if you remember the weather, came a violent rain and wind storm. It was

Then, if you remember the weather, came a violent rain and wind storm. It was, in fact, so violent that for the first time in the sanctuary's existence the boardwalks were closed to the public for fear that people would be hurt by falling tree limbs or debris.

And now the full extent of the devastation to the birds has been reported by the veteran ornithologist, Alexander Sprunt, Jr. No less than twelve hundred nests were completely destroyed, blown or washed away.

In most of the two hundred nests remaining, Sprunt reports, there are now young storks and, unless some further disaster occurs, these probably will be raised. The birds usually average three eggs to a nest, but seldom is the full complement brought to maturity.

Often, when a nest is lost, birds will rebuild and lay again. But in this case, Sprunt is not hopeful. He has seen no sign of stick-carrying or other rebuilding activities since the storm. Very likely it is too late in the season for a second attempt.

Several people on bird tours on the Islands have seen marked ring-billed gulls, it is with a colored disc attached to the wing near the joint between the wing and

We now have word as to who is doing this. The ring-billed gulls, which winter here and nest in northern United States and Canada, were marked up there to study their migratory habits.

If such marked gulls are seen, a report including the date and place of the sighting, the color of the disc and whether it is attached to the right or left wing should be sent to: Dr. W. E. Southern, Dept. of Biological Science, University of Illinois, Dekalb, Ill., 60115.



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
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THE REEF

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
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HUMANITIES LECTURE

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
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


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
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SHELL TABLE FINDS HOME IN CATSKILL MOUNTAINS
