## Planning Board Study


The Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board has completed a study of the land use on Sanibel and Captiva to serve as background material for the Comprehensive Plan being prepared by the County Commissioners.

There are now, on the islands, 860 dwellings (780 private homes and 80 motels) and 135 business (public and private) buildings on approximately 1,000 acres.

The average size lot is 1.2 acres for Captiva, 0.7 acre for the west end of Sanibel and 0.4 acre for the east end of the Island.

Approximately 520 acres are zoned RU-1 and RU-2 (single houses and duplexes), 210 acres are zoned RU-3 (apartment houses, condominiums and motels), 60 acres are zoned for business and public buildings, 30 acres for trailer parks and 150 acres for two golf courses.

These figures include the apartments of Sunset South, Captain's Walk and Sanibel Arms presently occupied but do not include planned additions to these three condominiums, several hundred dwellings being built by Sanibel Moorings and Sun Dial, or the hundreds of houses that will be built on lots being developed at Gulf



## Over 1/2 Of Goal Reached

Total of \$163,000 of the \$300,000 goal for acquisition of lands for the Sanibel fresh water wetlands project has been raised to March 13, approximate mid-point in the campaign of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, which runs to April 30. Results so far were announced last week by Mrs. George Winterbotham, chairman of the Foundation's board and Mrs. Leigh Bair, chairman of the membership fund raising committee.

The campaign is in three parts; major foundation grants, special gifts and new memberships. Of the major foundation goal of \$150,000, two grants totalling \$100,000 have been received, with several requests still pending. The goal for special gifts is \$125,000, and \$49,000 has been raised. This includes a \$10,000 challenge pledge which must be matched by \$20,000 of gifts or pledges in amounts of \$5,000 or more from private people.

Of the \$25,000 sought from new members, \$14,000 is in hand, representing 300 new memberships of the goal of 500.

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

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


#### FOR THE BIRD WATCHERS

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#### PETER KOSTER TO EXHIBIT

Peter Koster was born in the Netherlands May 31, 1891. At the age of 12, he served nine months as an apprentice to a painter, then had a four year course in a vocational school.

In 1910 he came to the United States and worked in Grand Rapids, Mich., until 1934 as a free lance decorator specializing in furniture period decorations. When the depression and resulting poor business came, he moved to New England and continued decorating for several factories in Cambridge, Mass.. Then he moved to Rockport, Mass., and opened a gallery there, selling his sea scapes in which he specialized; also Chinese lacquer decorated trays and furniture, and doing murals in homes and offices.

For twelve winters Mr. Koster taught practical arts in the Massachusetts adult education school system.

In 1956 he moved to Florida carrying on much the same schedule in Port Charlotte in the University PCU. He has travelled through much of this country and Canada and painted wherever he stopped.

He and his wife will leave Sanibel soon for a trip to Europe where they will visit all the famous places and visit with relatives in the Netherlands. Meanwhile, he will have his lovely Florida paintings on display at Legels and Sea to Sky on Sanibel Sunday, March 26, in a free public presentation.

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



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

He "found the quality of the art exceptional and sophisticated."

Elmer F. Heiser received the B.A.A. 1st prize award of \$75.00 for his watercolor titled "Yesterday." The judge felt that this was a very professional work.

Second prize of \$50.00 from The B.A.A. was awarded to Frank Swift for his mixed media work titled "Noren."

3rd prize \$25.00 award.

#### "VINTAGE '71" BIG SUCCESS








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Environmental legislation before the Florida legislature in its current session is "in trouble." Governor Reubin Askew, who has endorsed the legislation, has appealed to the citizens of the State for support. "These proposals, if enacted," he states, "will give the State the tools to do many of the things which you have known for years must be done. Many of these bills are being strongly and effectively opposed by special interest groups and their paid lobbyists. That is why it is so

important that you make your views on this legislation known to your legislators.'

The principal measures whose passage is sought by the Governor are (1) Environmental Land and Water Management Act, Senate Bill 629, House Bill 4248; (2) Comprehensive Planning Act, Senate Bill 778, House Bill 3801; (3) Environmental Reorganization Act, House Bill 3768. Senate bill now before Senate Natural Resources Committee, Senator Ray Knopke, chairman; and (4) Water Resource Act, House Bill 4060.

Legislative representatives for Lee County include in the House Representative Ted Randell and Representative James Lorenze Walker; and in the Senate, Senator Philip D. 

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

Ribbons awarded to other Island residents for their entries in the show are as follows: Artistic Division, Mrs. Arthur Burt, second place, for her entries of her miniature shell flower picture and her picture made from sea life; she also received third place ribbons for her miniature flower arrangements and her entry in the novelty division. The Black Pearl won a first place ribbon and Best of Show Rosette in the Commercial Artistic Division for their shell table. In the Scientific Division, Mrs. F. Miller and Mrs. R. Frieman took a first place ribbon for their sea life exhibit and Priscilla Murphy won a second place ribbon for her collection of miniatures. In the Commercial Scientific Division, Ethel Reynolds received a second place ribbon for her one species exhibit.

Mr. Jerome Bijur of Naples, Fla., received the DuPont Trophy for his display of miniature Florida shells. The DuPont Trophy is awarded by the Delaware Museum of Natural History for the exhibit which in the opinion of the judges contributes most to the success of the show and is instructive and inspiring to visitors because of its attractiveness, educational value and scientific accuracy.

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#### WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

Some of us avian fanciers were startled the other evening to see two pinkish-red birds towering over and, we must admit, out-shining our roseate spoonvills. They were flamingos.

Just once before, to our knowledge, has a flamingo been seen in the wild on the islands. That was several years ago when one showed up in the Darling Sanctuary and staved around for a week.

Everyone happily recorded a flamingo on their life list, but in the end some spoil-sport in Cape Coral announced that one of his captive birds had escaped and it was assumed that must have been our visitor.

In fact, it is now assumed by almost every authority that any flamingo seen in Florida in the wild is almost certainly an escapee. It was not always so.

Back a centry and a half ago Audubon reported flamingos as being abundant visitors into Florida from their native haunts in the south. As late as 1902 flocks up to a thousand birds elicited poetic accounts from observers who gasped at their flaming colors on the sky.

Then fell upon them the heavy hand of man. Flamingos, like ducks and a few other birds, drop so many wing feathers at one time when they molt that they go through a flightless period each year.

In this helpless condition hundreds were netted for zoos while others were killed by the plume hunters. Soon the birds apparently stopped altogether their visits to

Meanwhile many people started obtaining captive flamingos, the most famous group in Florida being the flock that graces the infield of the Hialeah race track near Miami. And there the birds have been successfully bred in captivity, the first such

success having occurred in 1937. According to the "Handbook of North American Birds" edited by Ralph S. Palmer there were once 700 flamingos in the flock at Hialeah but the number was cut

down to 280 by 1959. Many of these birds, says this report, are not wing clipped and so, if they wished, could fly away. Furthermore, flamingos travel at night and so if any left they might

not be missed. So, can we list our two visitors as legitimate wild birds seen in the wild? We can only add, against all the above, that most captive birds lack the real brilliance of color attained by their wild brethern.

The two flamingos seen in the Darling Sanctuary this time seemed to us more brilliant than any we have ever seen.

They say one thing leads to another; and isn't it the truth?

Like for instance: You sit down to write a simple, human story about Sanibel and the Song of the Sea, and you wind up with references to Cairo, the Suez Canal, Napoleon III, his empress Eugenie, and the opera Aida. How come? Well, you see, you have to start out with a violin player. That will do it every time. Yes sir, start out with a violin player and the next thing you know you're on a world tour, listening to the world's finest orchestras, being caught up in the excitement of opera at its best, enjoying it in the world's great opera houses. But you'll soon come back to Sanibel. We did.

Actually, we never left the island. The tour was all in the mind and it was sparked by a man by the name of Gene Gory. That's right. He's the violinist.

Mr. Gory played a return engagement at the Song of the Sea where owners Bernard and Billie Le Roux are continuing their policy of treating guests to frequent poolside entertainment. Mr. Gory's first appearance at the Old World Inn was at Christmas time.

He has an extensive repertoire and was rarely stumped when motel guests asked him to play favorites. He delighted Mrs. J. Novak of Newburgh, N.Y., when he played "Cavalleria Rusticana" especially for her. Mrs. Novak a former school teacher, is 75 years old and she taught tots right up until she was 70!

Song of the Sea guests come in all ages, including bright three year old boys. Mr. Gory teaches children to play the violin so he had no trouble persuading one tiny lad to scrape a bow across the strings of a miniature violin; nor did he have any difficulty persuading the older guests to join in the fun at the poolside party.

Gene Gory, a Frenchman, it should be noted, learned his skill on the violin at the conservatories of Paris and Berlin. He has played with orchestras all over Europe, even in exotic places like Leningrad and Moscow and Cairo. Yes, Cairo. Mr. Gory is proud of the fact that he once played in the famous opera house which was built to mark the opening in November of 1869 of the Suez Canal. Napoleon III and Eugenie were guests of honor at the opening and they heard the very first performance of Verdi's opera Aida. An interesting fact is that Aida was written for that special occasion.

It's a long way from Cairo to Sanibel but the trip is well worth it. Mr. Gory chose this area of Florida for his retirement, and the Song of the Sea chose wisely when he was engaged to entertain motel guests.
