# Water Hike Not For Homes

A proposed surcharge increase on water from the Greater Pine Island Water Association would not apply to private homes, Henry E. Nowak, president, said Thursday.

The surcharge increase from 50 cents to \$1 per unit would apply to rental or leased units such as motels and trailer parks, Nowak said.

The Association office was plagued Thursday with telephone calls from confused water users, Nowak said. The surcharge increase is to go into effect only if a federal loan for building a desalination plant is approved.

The surcharge increase would affect a motel owner, for instance, by \$1 a month per room or a trailer park owner at \$1 a month per space, instead of the present 50 cents charge

A \$500,000 loan is being sought by the Association to finance the construction of a desalination plant for Pine Island to supplement a dwindling fresh water supply.

The Association voted to decrease the per-gallon rate base for all users from 7,000 to 5,000 minimum gallons per month while increasing the rate from \$6 to \$10. This rate change, like the surcharge increase, will occur only if the Association gets its loan.



# **SCPB** Completes 1st Year

At the 2nd annual membership meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Baords, Inc., held March 20, Mr. Vernon MacKenzie reviewed the activities of the past year, noting that memberships reached 420, including 13 organizations. Up for renewal April 1, so far 167 have been received for 1972-73. The Board is totally dependent on dues for its financial support.

Emphasizing that without the cooperation of the membership, the Board could not work effectively, Mr. MacKenzie reported interceding in 12 cases before the Lee County Commissioners, influencing 10 and losing 2. Other public hearings, on an average of one a week, have been attended by him to moniter county actions affecting the islands. Continued vigilance is needed, he said, to protect our height limitation ordinance and density moratorium, constantly under attack. The water situation continues to be critical and the Board is cooperating with the Water Association as well as state and county departments to prevent further deterioration of quality and supplies. After much hard work on the part of the Board of Directors, the Planning Board's part of the Comprehensive Plan has been completed and will be reviewed by the Lee County Commissioners April 10. Copies of this may be obtained through the corresponding secretary. Revealing that 5400 acres are still available for building on the islands, the question of incorporation was discussed and a committee appointed to investigate the ins and outs of such an action.


# E meritus Board Created


Dotti has a sale rack of hostess gowns for 1/3 off, and other dresses. Very interesting when thinking of Easter coming along.


JERRY LEWIS CINEMA OPENS


There is plenty of parking in the Center. The full wide-view screen with superb accoustics lends itself to other uses too. Little theatre could be produced on the stage area.

#### MILWAUKEE GROUP BUYS \$550,000 SANIBEL SITE

A tract of Sanibel Island property fronting on the Gulf of Mexico, recently rezoned from mobile home park use to apartment use, has been sold for \$550,000 to a limited partnership of Milwaukee businessmen who plan development of the complex in a few weeks.

The ownership transfer from John M. Hallward to Sanibel Associates Ltd. of the 10-acre tract was the leading realty transaction of the week in Lee County.

The tract was rezoned early this month by ....e Lee County Commission at Hallward's request because he doesn't feel mobile home parks should be developed on beachfront property.

When the rezoning was being discussed during a public hearing by the commissioners, Hallward's attorney said the property would be much more profitable if developed into a trailer park but an apartment complex would be more suitable for the island.

Hallward started buying the parcel about 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years ago and has spent several months getting title problems cleared away. The trailer park zoning was placed on the parcel several years before he began his purchase.

The attorney said the new owners are planning to build garden type apartment buildings in clusters near the beach and a recreational area. A tentative plans calls for 160 apartments in 12 buildings.




#### ECOSWF

More than 40 persons representing the 35 environmental groups which make up the Environmental Confederation of South West Florida (ECOSWF) met in Port Charlotte at the Ramada Inn March 20 and adopted a program of action for the coming year. Four committees were set up to implement a seven-point program that calls for monitoring current environmental legislation, and reviewing it to provide regional input in statewide land and water use plans and their administration. Objective is to contribute to such legislation as it will be introduced in the 1973 legislature.

Recommendations for formal organization of ECOSWF, and financing its operations, are to be prepared by another committee. A third will investige possibilities for a continuing program of publicity.

Perhaps the major committee will pursue the Environmental Inventory for the 5 Southwest counties included in ECOSWF that was introduced at the Environmental Planning Conference for South Florida, held at Edison Junior College in January. The first inventory is to be completed by June 1, with an annual follow up. A federal grant to finance the Environmental Inventory project is pending.

Local delegates who attended the meeting included Mr. William Hammond and Mr. Roy Bazire of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and Mr. Mario Hutton, president of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society.







#### TO THE ISLANDER:

With the typical bulldozing tactics of the true bureaucracy, the Board of County Commissioners in the person of Walter Shirey rapid-fired the sewer proposition at the people of the islands, with notable lack of facts and basic reasons why sewers are needed at all.

The pattern of politically motivated ideas such as this one is strangely similar whether for Sanibel or New Jersey, or Alaska. First, you wave the enticing odor of Federal Funding before the noses of the people. This is meant to lull the sense of smell and dull the intellect so that the people will believe that the cost of the project will not be extracted from their pockets.

Don't you believe it. You will pay, and pay, and pay --- for the initial costs, and for all the maintenance and repair taxes that will be levied year after year. Once you realize this fact of life, the enticing smell turns painfully fishy --and, oddly enough, the fishy smell emanates from a large pork barrel.

Fact: The need for sewers is directly tied to the intent on the part of the Board to allow high density building whever they can get away with it. If this is not so, then why the need?

Fact: The need becomes really questionable when you can point at community after community all over the country that have had no need for sewers even though they are more concentrated in population than we hope the islands will ever be. Case in point: For 25 years we have lived in a suburban community of over 300 large single-family homes built on quarter and half acre plots. This community started with individual septic facilities, turned down sewers when it was brought up, and is still doing perfectly well on the original facilities. Further, although we have lived here for 25 years the

#### TO THE ISLANDER:

As we island residents know, this past year has indeed been a most active one for our Island Water Association. Its board of directors has probed deeply and systematically into the many alternatives for providing a more adequate and dependable water source for our future. It faced up squarely to the unpleasant fact that the well fields of our present Pine Island supplier are rapidly being preempted and depleted by Pine Island'd own growth, as well as the similar demands of Cape Coral and North Fort Myers. I am sure that most Islanders share my admiration and appreciation for the iob our Association's Board is doing.

There is, however, one facet of its duties that seems to have been overlooked in the Board's proper preoccupation with the prime technical problem of seeking a new water source. The best interests of the Association's members need the protection of a total and immediate moratorium on the acceptance of new memberships. Especially intolerable would be the attempt to supply such large concentrations of new water users as the diversified and large Wulfert Road project and the 400 family Sundial Condominiums. The ban should last until the new and adequate water source is ready. The Association's Charter wisely foresaw this moratorium when it provided for it with the clause, "...if the capacity of its water system is exhausted by the needs of its existing members and such other persons to whom it has been supplying water."

Our very low water pressure and other rationing devices caused by the restricted supply from Pine Island during the current tourist season appears to be more than sufficient justification for invoking the mandated moratorium. Certainly we can expect an intensification of the shortage until a new and adequate water source is put into use. It also seems unconscionable for the Association to remain silent while fully aware that expectant water consumers are investing their money in buildings that cannot be supplied when completed and must lie idle subject.to the deteriorating effects of weather, and the ransacking of vandals.

I urge immediate and unequivocal action by the Association's Board to correct this serious oversight. At the same time, wish them the best of luck in the search for the water so desperately needed by us.

#### WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

It happens so metimes, but not often, that birds like people may have eyes too big for their stoma, chs.

Watchers on a bird tour recently spent an absorbing half hour looking at an American bittern eit ther trying to eat or to get untangled from a 20 inch snake.

The bittern is a bird of the heron family, but unlike most of the other members it keeps to itself and is extremely shy, spending most of its time hidden in cattail marshes.

It is about the s ize of the smaller herons but is much stockier, with speckled brown plumage. On the islands it is an uncommon and, due also to its secretive habits, a seldom seen winter resident. Unlike its smaller and even more secretive relative the least bittern, this larger bird does not nest here.

The American bits tern feeds by standing, frozen, in the cattails, waiting with infinite patience for son tething edible to come within striking distance.

It does eat snakes. In fact, it eats about any kind of animal matter that comes within reach. The latest: publications about this bittern lists its food as fishes, eels, frogs, salamanders, snak es, crayfish, mollusks, land and aquatic insects, spiders and small mammals.

Before we came alon g our bittern must have caught sight of the snake and struck with swift accuracy. For he was holding the repile firmly just behind the head.

The snake has responded to the attack by wrapping himself around the back part of the bird's bill and around a leg which he held pinned against a wing.

Neither of the grim contestants seemed able to break this impasse. The bittern could shake the snake, which he kept doing, and the snake could tighten his grip and flick out his forked tongue, which he kept doing.

A full hour later, we subsequently learned, the bird had finally killed the snake. Then, with great effort, he managed to untangle himself and, head first, swallow the now unresisting reptile.

After which, if we may be permitted a slight anthropomorphism, he sat looking like the man in the commercial who says, "I can't believe I ate the whole thing."






