

### Planning Board

At their last meeting, on March 28, the directors appointed a committee to investigate the possibility to incorporate, as well as the consequences incorporation would bring; higher taxes, responsibility to maintain streets and roads, police, etc. In the committee figure Mr. Mellody, Mills, McNurtry, Haynie and Scholefield. A director pointed out that hundreds of houses and dwellings will probably be built on Sanibel and Captiva within the next few years and suggested that some kind of noise limitation be adopted. In submitting his annual report, president Mario Hutton stated that 1971 was another year of achievement and continued progress for the local Audubon, with a further substantial increase in the number of members. Among accomplishments worth mentioning, he listed many interventions on the national, state and local levels in matters regarding conservation problems, and in particular the defense of our island's unique ecological treasures.

Mrs. Louise Goodwin, secretary-treasurer, submitted her report showing that the Chapter's financial situation has substantially improved in recent years, with funds now adequate to meet all foreseeable future needs.

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
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#### COAST GUARDS ASK **BOATERS TO PHONE**




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#### UN OFFICIAL VISITS SANIBEL FOR REST

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
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#### ART LEAGUE

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

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#### WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

There is some good news to report from the bird world, at least from this part of

it. Our brown pelicans, in such bad trouble almost everywhere else, seem headed for another successful nesting season in Pine Island Sound.

And members of the extensive heron family and our white ibis all seem to be nesting somewhat ahead of schedule this year.

First a report on the rookery right on our island, in the Bailey sanctuary:

The big American, or common egrets may be seen now incubating eggs. The smaller members of the family are courting and some of them may already be on nests, particularly the Louisiana herons and snowy egrets.

The little blue herons seem to be somewhat behind and the cattle egret usually nest later. But for them all, there is increasing activity in the Bailey sanctuary, courtship and nest relief displays, anhingas getting ready, and white ibis, usually a later nester have been observed carrying building material, either as a courtship gesture or actual nest building.

On the rookeries on the little islands out in the Sound, the little herons seem well ahead of those nesting on the island. We found many nests of snowies and

Louisianas already with full complements of eggs.

Great blue herons and cormorants, who usually nest earlier, had young in their nests, many of them half grown.


The findings on the pelicans were most heartening. Almost all the old birds were in full breeding plumage and most had full sets of three eggs, all of them, as far as could be told, with hard shells.

In almost every place outside of southern Florida, virtually all brown pelican eggs have become so thin shelled they break when the birds attempt to incubate.

One mangrove island in the sound in recent years has set two northern breeding records and the two birds involved are present this year and seem to be nesting there again.

They are the great white heron, found here mated with a great blue heron, and the reddish egret, several pairs of which have been nesting for the first time this century north of the Florida Keys.


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#### ISLAND GARDENER

Color in the garden during the summer can be emphasized by the use of summer annuals according to Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA). The winter flowering annuals are beginning to look rather seedy, losing their vigor and probably well riddled by bugs. These can be rogued out of beds and preparation made for the summer flowers.

Summer flowering annuals are almost in the minority when it comes to choice. Here are a few that will be available from your local nursery and garden supply store. Zinnias, many forms and types. Marigolds both dwarf and tall growing varieties. The Wishbone flower is ideally suited to shady locations. Gomphrena is another summer annual that looks much like Red Clover. It is everlasting and thrives on hot weather. Don't overlook Rose

Moss. If you have a hot, dry, sunny place this little plant can form a beautiful carpet all summer long. Another plant that has become popular with Floridians is the Fireball plant. It is related to the Cockscomb family. The plant produces a mass of foliage and as it matures the top becomes a flaming red. Give Fireball plenty of room and full sun. It grows to a height of 4 to 5

A few rain showers during this month may bring out an abundance of toadstools. Don't gamble on eating them unless you are a qualified botanist. There isn't too much you can do about toadstools. They are going to appear and reappear as the summer showers

Now is a good time to think about increasing your shrubs. You may want to put in a few air layers on your rubber trees or on crotons.

this time of year may become infested with thrips. Thrips cause a distorted tip growth only on the Cuban laurel. They can be controlled with systemic fungicides. Consult with your local Florida Nurserymen and Growers Association (FNGA) nurserymen to determine which one to use.

late to attempt control.


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
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#### SONG OF THE SEA

It didn't dare because another was doing a repeat performance, and it was sheer magic. A glowering sky held off and, at times, even smiled brightly; and so it did NOT rain on the Song of the Sea.

Brent Forrest, a handsome young magician from Fort My/ers, came back to the Old World Inn at the beck and call of Bernard and Billie Le Roux. They provided a grass stage at the edge of the pool, an audience of motel grasts young and slightly older, and refreshments which included Sangria and a mild punch for the small fry, thanks to Billie Le Roux and Pat Slater.

While in Holland Brent met and studied the performance of Sorkar, the "sorcerer" from India who bills himself as the world's greatest magician.



Yes they do. And when Brent Forrest performed at the Song of the Sea, he left everybody richer for the experience.



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
