One of the highlights of the day was the announcement by President Mario Hutton that the Chapter's board has unanimously decided that the local chapter, already a life member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, will make a further contribution of one thousand dollars to the current fund raising campaign of the Foundation. The fund will also benefit from a generous share of the 45 dollar daily jackpot, contributed by its winner Mr. Roderick Jones of Lighthouse Way. SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION **FOUNDATION NEWS**

Action by the State of Florida to obtain \$400,000 in federal funds from the Land and Water Conservation program of the U.S. Dept. of the Interior for acquisition of lands to be included in the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands project is expected this month, Mr. Ney Landrum, Director of the Division of Recreation and Parks has reported to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

This will match land gifts in that amount by The Nature Conservancy, National Audubon Society and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. The local foundation is in the midst of a fund raising campaign to obtain \$300,000 to purchase lands that will complete the \$400,000 share of the private conservation coalition for the first phase of the project.

It will also provide \$100,000 to \$200,000, depending upon the success of the campaign, towards the proposed \$800,000 second phase of the federal-state-private conservation project. The cooperative effort is a pace-setter, first of its kind in Florida, and believed to be a first in the nation. Initial application was filed Feb. 1971, but its provision for County participation with lease arrangement to the private conservation groups was ruled illegal by federal attorneys. Then followed a long exploration for an acceptable new method, not settled until early this year.

Two challenge gifts of \$50,000 and \$10,000 have been met by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation in its fund raising campaign to obtain a total of \$300,000 for land acquisition for the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands project.

The \$50,000 pledge gift to The Nature Conservancy required the local organization to match it dollar for dollar. The entire amount, raised locally from more than 300 donors, has been sent to the Arlington, Va., main office of The Nature Conservancy, and the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has just been advised the \$50,000 pledge is being transferred by the donor. This will provide the first major uncommitted funds actually available to spend for new land acquisition. Negotiations have already been initiated for the purchase of additional tracts in the interior of Sanibel.

The \$10,000 pledge gift was made contingent upon the Foundation raising at least \$20,000 in gifts of \$5,000 or more from private individuals. Five \$5,000 pledges have been made, assuring the Foundation of another \$35,000 in land acquisition funds.

By April 1, two-thirds of the way in the February through April campaign, the Foundation had achieved two-thirds of its objectives in funds raised and new memberships signed up. Mrs. Leigh Bair is chairman of the membership drive. Mrs. George Winterbotham for Sanibel and Mr. Erard Matthiessen and Mrs. Martin L. Cannon for Captiva are in charge of the Special Gifts Division. Final report will be made in May.

SANIBEL SALES

Two small parcels of land located between Fulgur Street and the Gulf of Mexico on Sanibel Island have been purchased by Investment Dynamics Inc. in a \$630,000 transaction completed here last week.

In the transaction, Investment Dynamics Inc., which is owned by a group of business and professional men in the Minneapolis, Minn., area, increased its Sanibel Island holdings by about eight acres with the purchase of two Gulf front parcels from Charles C. Bewley of Naples and William A. Kohler of Niagara, N.Y.

Last year Investment Dynamics purchased well over \$1 million worth of Sanibel Island property. The group also reportedly has holdings in Collier County. The property is part of the beachfront which was developed into commercial lots a few years ago by Jamestown-Beachview Inc. and sold to investment groups. The two parcels are zoned for use for either apartments or hotel-motel resorts.

Other island sales included: A Captiva Island property which was purchased for \$112,000 was by Lyman E. Wagers from Betty Jane and John Henderson. The purchase included an island home and property surrounding

Marine Properties Inc. to Crawford N. Cate, House, Gulf Pines S/D, Sanibel Island, \$52,000.





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

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

Blain is relieving Alvin P. Mast who has done an outstanding job as clerk in charge during the past two years. Mast will retire from the Postal Service on June 30.



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


TRAVEL MOVIES FOR BENEFIT OF SANIBEL PUBLIC LIBRARY

There is no charge for admission, however, donations will be accepted for the Sanibel Public Library. Films supplied at no charge by Island Travel Agency.



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

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
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WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

This is a story of two little hawks and two girls. The hawks, so far, are nameless. The girls are Shirley Walter and Jessie Dugger who run the store called Fur Feathers and Scales but who seem to spend most of their time exercising their gift of caring for wildlife in distress.

It started this week when, on a bird tour, we went to look at the young hawks. I had been watching them almost every day. Their parents, our resident red-shouldered hawks, had started incubating eggs on Feb. 1.

There is a 28-day incubation period, so the babies now were five weeks old, more than half grown and clearly visible from the ground in their nest high in an Australian pine.

But this morning they were not visible. When we arrived both parents were circling the tree, screaming as they flew. The nest appeared partly blown away, the babies no where in sight.

What had happened? We could only guess. It must have just happened, with the parents still around screaming their distress. There had been no storm, but an airplane had been circling about in the area. We could only conclude it had passed low over the tree and caused the havoc.

Under the tree we found the babies, unhurt and defiant. They lunged at us and screamed. The parents screamed back. The babies could not survive on the ground, what with our population of raccoons, feral house cats and other predators

There wasn't enough of the nest left to put them in even if we could have made the climb. So we took them to Shirley and Jessie.

They were received with love and tender care. Shirely started cutting up little pieces of meat and with a toothpick shoving them down the young throats. Jessie fixed comfortable quarters.

We looked around this animal hospital. There was a huge great blue heron that I had brought in a few days earlier so weak he was unable to stand. Now he was

There were two pelicans whose wings were healing, a beautiful full grown hawk from Mexico, a little screech owl huddled in a box and other patients all awaiting health and liberation.

As for our baby hawks, they are strong and active and no longer have to be fed by force. Says Jessie, "They are eating like pigs."
