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



Water Association Gets Million \$\$\$ Loan

The Island Water Association is going ahead full speed with its planned desalinization plant which is scheduled to turn out 1,200,000 gallons of water a day by March, 1973, according to the executive director, Pat Murphy.

On April 25, the Water Association was notified by the State Agency and also by C. Williams, the local FHA representative, that the loan of \$1,129,000 for the new plant had been granted. Production will start June 1 and a contract for construction has already been awarded to Ionics Corp. of Watertown, Mass. President of the Island Water Association is Walter F. Emmons.

The feeling of the Island residents who have been complaining for some time about the lack of water has been extremely gratified by the current situation and the quick action of the Water Association after having received the go-ahead.



School Pre-registration

Pre-registration for all new first graders started last Monday at the Sanibel Elementary School. Children also were enrolled yesterday and tomorrow will be the last day, said the school principal, G. L. Dissette. The time will be from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. regular school hours.

A child may be admitted to the first grade if he is six years old by Jan. 1 of the school year in which he enrolls, provided he enrolls during the first month of a school year.

State law requires that parents present the principal a birth certificate or other evidence of the child's age and a health certificate stating that the child has no contagious or communicative disease.





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

Mrs. David Routhead has a vase of six sheaths of miniature orchids given her by Gerard Kinzie, who says the orchids are native to Florida but only grow as far north as Bonita Springs. They are beautiful yellow with a bronze lip and bronze spots. Sylvia says they remind her of the spring colors of the Jack-in-the-Pulpit blooms up north, but the blossoms are myriad and last for weeks.

All of the regular winter blooming flowers are in bloom now, as though they waited all winter for a cold snap to come along, and when it never materialized they finally bloomed out in all their glory. The amaryllis which normally bloom around Easter are making their appearance in all their brilliance. Red and purple bougainvillea and oleanders, plus the golden shower trees and jacanandas, are at last in full glorious flower. Even spodilla trees are in new leaf, and the Australian pines are festooned with brown seed spores on their drooping tips. This is spring on the Islands with all the hibiscus in showy flower.

WHO'S WHO ON PLANNING BOARD



Lauderdale and treasurer, Pathway Optical Products, New York. He has been a Connecticut trial justice and has worked with planning and zoning, the Conservation Commission and School Board Committees in Woodstock, Conn. He has been a member of the Conn. Republican State Central Committee and an advisor to the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board for the past year.

Mr. DON SEYMOUR, 2nd vice president representing the Captiva Civic Association, first came to Captiva in 1962 and has been a resident for three years. A New Yorker, he retired from his automobile business there in 1966. He is a member of the advisory committee of the Captiva Erosion Board, a member of the Waterways Committee and a life member of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

Mr. DON MARSHALL, treasurer, completed two years at the University of Pittsburg, Pa., and went immediately into sales work. He was 10 years with Colgag-Palmolive, 5 years as a wholesale grocer, 5 years with Curtis-Wright Corp. in personnel work, and the last 25 years before retiring with Peavey Flour Mills as salesman, sales manager, and special representative selling bulk flour. WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

The transition period for birds on the islands is just about completed. Most of our winter birds have departed, most of the summer replacements are here and most of the migrants have passed through.

One may determine this easily by looking at the wires and utility poles along the road. A short while ago sparrow hawks, our miniature falcons, were perched on the wires every few hundred yards, over the dry areas.

Over the canals and wet areas, in almost equal numbers, were the kingfishers. Neither of these birds nest this far south and they are gone. But their places on the wires already have been taken by the grey kingbird, a large flycatcher who comes this far north only to nest.

In the sanctuaries one notes the absence of ducks and coots, most of which are gone. But our resident mottled duck and a few blue-winged teal will linger and nest here. And the colorful black-necked stilts have arrived in larger numbers than usual.

On the beaches things haven't yet changed so much. Most of our shorebirds, plovers and sandpipers, are long range migrants, travelling far to the north, some clear into the arctic circle, to nest.

Here they have a short breeding season. They cannot arrive in those inclement places until the weather gets warm. So the shore birds are usually the last of the winter birds to leave. They will be around yet a little longer.

But there is one notable population shift on the beaches. The large white ring-billed gull that is here by the thousands all through the winter has just about vanished. This gull nests in extreme northern United States and Canada.

Of the gulls only our smaller, darker laughing gull, who is here all the time and nests here, remains in quantity. But there is one beautiful newcomer on the beaches, the tiny least tern, quite properly sometimes called the sea swallow, are here now in great numbers. They will nest here as well as up the coast as far as New England.



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


Lake switching center.

A June 10 wedding is being planned at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Seneca.




AMERICAN LEGION POST 123

He can provide you with practical answers to problems dealing with water pollution or erosion or he can tell you the best method for improving unsightly areas," Welker pointed out. "But the real job," Welker said, "is up to each and every one of us who wants to continue living and breathing. The program of 'Green Survival' was started to relay this message to everyone and everything is

being done to let everyone know the role he can plan in cleaning up our dirty world. Part of the answer is in 'Green Survival' and it depends on you."

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TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

Florida, along with many other areas, will face a transportation crisis and probably a power crisis this summer.

Recently, a serious traffic tie-up occurred between Tampa, Orlando and Disney World. Cars crawled along bumper to bumper for many miles. Commercial and business traffic mingled with the heavy tourist and fun seekers, with everybody unhappy.

In metropolitan areas like Miami, Orlando, Jacksonville, Tampa and St. Petersburg motorists vied with each other to get where they were going. Traffic arteries between city centers and suburban areas were jammed, making motor travel an irksome chore. Numerous accidents added to the general confusion as impatient drivers sought personal advantage. Nobody was thinking about anyone or anything but his own personal problem. The situation promises to get much worse before it gets better.

Some northern cities have helped reduce heavy traffic by providing mini-buses carrying from 10 to 30 people to move in suburban areas. These buses carry passengers to pick-up stations where they can change to main route city buses. Other cities have provided parking facilities where motorists may park cars in the morning and pick them up in the evening, using regular buses to carry them to the central city area. Manufacturing plants

and other firms employing a large number of persons are encouraging "Reduce Traffic-Share a Ride" programs listing employees living in the same area, to pick up three or four others when driving to and from work.

Power and light companies, hoping to meet the ever increasing demand for power, have planned nuclear plants capable of doing the job --- but construction of these plants has been delayed by action of environmental groups who feel these plants will damage the ecology. Labor disputes and strikes have also a part in the delay.

Last year the Florida Power & Light Co. found it necessary to purchase power from other companies to meet the summer demand when use of air conditioning is heavy. Construction of their Turkey Point plant has been delayed two years. Areas served by FP&L face a serious brown-out or black-out this summer as a result.

Look about your home, note what the loss or limitation of electricity would mean to your normal living pattern. Among the items you can't use will be your light fixtures, your stove, your toaster, your water heater, radio, vacuum cleaner, razor, toothbrush, air conditioner, can opener, refrigerator, lawn mower, hedge trimmer, water pump, and on and on.

Will the few fish that might be killed by hot water discharged from such plants or a limited amount of radiation justify the loss of electric power? Think it over. Exercise common sense.





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
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
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HIBISCUS DETAILS
