

Is Your Sign Legal?

Many are those who have removed advertising signs to comply with the ordinance and make our islands more beautiful; the Baptist Church, The Beachcomber, Case's Harbor House, Mrs. Lauer, the Lions Club, Periwinkle Trailer Park, Ridge Trailer Park, Sanibel Arms, Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, Sanibel Moorings, Sanibel River Estates, Santiva, Shell Harbor Inn, Song of the Sea, the Island Huxter and Jerry Lewis Cinema.

Others have been advised that they are in violation of the law and, in view of the cooperation, the Sign Ordinance Committee has received from almost all of the Islanders, no doubt that the few remaining illegal signs will soon be taken down.

As one may expect, there are a few who think that the Sign Ordinance is for the birds, not for them, and who have not been swayed by friendly persuasion. A first citation by Lew County authorities has been served to one of this group.

Islanders are again reminded that some signs, though put up before the Sign Ordinance went into effect on Feb. 1, 1971, are illegal and that all new signs are strictly controlled. The Sign Committee would be glad to advise anyone in doubt.

The Board of Governors of the Captiva Civic Association has appointed one of its members to serve as the Association's representative on the Sign Committee. The committee represents also the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, and the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board.

Conservation Notes

Annual award for the outstanding conservationist in Lee County was presented by the Audubon Society of Southwest Florida to Roy E. Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Conservation Foundation at the Audubon group's annual dinner

Held at the Kiwanis house in Fort Myers, about 110 members attended the meeting. Retiring President Leo Boulris, who has served in that capacity for three years, presided and presented the award. He also introduced the new president, William Hammond, who is a director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

The rich abundance of plankton and marine life in Tarpon Bay amazed participants from all over Florida who attended the Florida Marine Science Education Association annual conference at the Sanibel Community House, April 27, 28 and 29. Part of the sessions included a trip into Tarpon Bay to examine marine life

Lee County schools hosted the meeting, attended by 90 teachers and college professors. Principal speakers at the programs included William Hammond, Association president and a director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation; Charles LeBuff, also a local foundation director and head of Caretta Research, George Weymouth also of Sanibel, Dr. Edward T. LaRoe, executive director of the Collier County Conservancy, and Bernard Yokel, director of the Rookery Bay Marine Research Station in Naples.



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





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CELEBRATES 50TH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY



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
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LADIES GUILD

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
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
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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

What the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation needs, instead of the \$300,000.00 they are asking for, is the support of the island people. This pressure group has already effectively halted or at the least, been indirectly responsible for the halting of several businesses on Sanibel-Captiva Islands and is out to further interfer with free

The members of the Foundation have already built their mountain cabins and would prevent the rest from building theirs. Free enterprise stops when government agency money is dangled before any organized groups when led by one or more zealots. Land grabs are the same whether practiced by the government or by government sponsored parties. In some cases land acquisition has been motivated by ultimate adminstrative positions to be tax supported.

The thinking of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, in general follows a pattern: anti-canal, anti-causeway, anti-condominium, anti-high density, anti-golf course, anti-signs and anti-people. If these people had had their way all along there would be about 150 people on these islands and no one else would be able to set foot ashore.

The 500 plus acres already set aside for the birds is enough when the relatively small size of the two islands is considered. Let's put it to a vote and see who wants more govenment land on Sanibel and Captiva.



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




UP UP AND AWAY

COUNTY BOARD NEWS

An engineering meeting among federal, state and county engineers to discuss beach erosion at Captiva Island has been set for May 16, Paul E. Stahlin, agent for the Captiva Erosion Prevention District, advised the commission. Stahlin requested county financial aid for a beach renourishment program at Captiva several weeks ago and was advised to set up a meeting of engineers to study costs of the program.

Bids for Sanibel pier construction were rejected as too high on a motion by Commissioner Walter Shirey. The project will not be rebid until the pier committee has had an opportunity to further study the project.

A series of Disaster Preparedness Seminars have been scheduled throughout the state by Gov. Reubin Askew for discussions on the coming hurricane season and radiological-accident hazards. The Lee County Commission authorized involved department heads and county board members to attend the seminar in LaBelle on May 18 at 1:30 p.m. at the American Legion Home.

WHO'S WHO ON PLANNING BOARD

Mrs. CHARLES PASCHALL, recording secretary, received an A. B. in History and English literature from the U. of Delaware, and has spent much of her life in Education. She served 10 years on the Mt. Pleasant, Del., School Board, 4 years on the Building Commission Special District, which included four schools and 7000 students. She is a past president of the American Association of University Women, Delaware Branch, as well as past president of the Delaware Division of the American Association of University Women. She and her husband have been property owners on Captiva since 1954 and are now residents.

Mrs. ROBERT DORMER, corresponding secretary, received an A. B. in English Literature and History from the U. of North Carolina in 1941. During WW II, she was a Lieutenant in the WAVES, Communications Intelligence, followed by a similar job with the U. S. Civil Service. A part time resident of Sanibel since 1919, she has also lived in Erie, Pa., Washington, D.C., Hawaii, Germany, Turkey and Japan. With husband, Bob, Commander, USN, Ret., and three sons, she is now a permanent resident and official island historian. She served two years on the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation Advisory Board and on the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board since 1969.

Mr. ROY A. BAZIRE, director, representing the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, received an A. B. degree in journalism from the U. of Iowa and did graduate work at Denver, Stanford and the Asia Institute. During WW II, he served in WDGS, Arlington Hall, later was Senior Credit Analyst, Foreign Div., Irving Trust Co., Editor, Washington news reports and market analyst, food industry publications, New York and Washington. A founder and executive director, Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation; a founder and director Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board; a founder Sanibel Rocks Civic Assoc.; a founder and director Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society; member, former J. N. Ding Darling Memorial Committee and member, former Sanibel Improvement Association. He was a founder of the Sanibel-Captiva Democratic Club.

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
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WILDLIFE NOTES by griffing bancroft

For the first time in several months, as far as this observer knows, a reddish egret has been observed in the Ding Darling Sanctuary on Sanibel.

This rather rare and interesting bird was putting on a good show with its distinctive manner of obtaining its food --- called "canopy feeding." This consists of the bird running about in little circles in the shallow water, alarming and stirring up its intended victims, little fish, crabs, shrimp and other animalcules.

Then the egret will stop and spread out its wings. This creates a shaded area which the frightened little animals mistake for a place for concealment. As they try to hide under the bird's wings he deftly plucks them up with his bill.

Other herons, especially the Louisiana herons, sometimes can be seen engaging in this "canopy feeding" but no other bird does it as consistently as the reddish egret.

Most of these birds in Florida are, as the name implies, quite reddish. They are about half way in size between the smaller herons, like the little blue herons, and the larger American, or common egrets.

There is another color phase of this same species, a reddish egret that is all white. This phase is the predominant one further south, through Mexico and the Caribbean, but is seldom seen here.

A few days after the reddish egret was seen in the Darling Sanctuary another, or the same bird, was seen in a heron nesting colony on a mangrove island in Pine Island

As we have reported previously this egret has been found nesting in this rookery; the first time this century a reddish egret had been found nesting anywhere in Florida outside of the keys.

Back in the days of Audubon and other early observers, great flocks of them were seen in Florida, and there were nesting colonies of the reddish egrets as far north as Tampa Bay.

Then they began to pay the price for their lovely plumes. Hunters slaughtered them, as they did other egrets, to sell their feathers. For a time they were believed to be extinct in Florida, but, slowly, they have been making a come back.

SCHOOL CHILDREN HAVE SALT WATER AQUARIUM

Grade school children in classes held by Mr. B. G. Runnels and Mrs. Hedwig Winans have a real salt water aquarium with live specimens which are attracting all sorts of interest and comment far and wide. Mr. Runnels, who has a combination class of fourth and fifth grade students, has interested the children in a ten gallon salt water tank. The children have brought in plants, living shells and other food for the collection of live seahorses, shrimp, sea anemones, scallops and sea hares. There are also king's crown, murex, starfish and hermit crabs. The children have managed to keep the fish well fed and living in aerated salt water.

Mrs. Winan's class of second and third graders have several tanks of fish, and sea life too. In a ten gallon tank, there are sea urchins, brittle starfish, sea cucumbers, various crabs and acidians (sea port), along with many common shells such as coquinas and tulips and others inhabited by hermit crabs and also the original shell animals. The children have been enthralled by two pregnant seahorses, expecting a blessed event momentarily. In another aquarium, which contains fresh water, there are several fresh water tropical fish which were gathered from the canals on the

And besides this absorbing program, Mr. Runnels' group has been engrossed with a cultural environmental exchange with a similar classroom in a Tom's River, N.J.,

The children have sent a picture of their classmates in a group to the Tom's River class. This acted as an introduction. Then they have sent material from the Chamber of Commerce and also newspaper clippings about local events of interest, such as temperatures and weather reports, prices and ads from newspapers, and local problems, and this group has received a similar packet of information from Tom's

They also collected some material from Tallahassee about governing, plus a map of the state and in particular our islands, showing their location in the County and State. They have sent post cards and bird and wildlife photos and received comparable material from Tom's River.

In the second phase of the environmental exchange between the two schools, the children have sent shells, leaves, seeds, pressed flowers, and seaweeds, plus some sand and soil samples. They have sent egret and roseate spoonbill feathers and others plus a collection of seashells and dried sea life specimens.

The third phase will be completed around June 1. When they receive their final package from the Tom's River group, they will have the things on display. This will give them the opportunity to investigage the different environments and share with others the new found knowledge. It is to be regretted they will not receive a snowflake in the package, but they will probably see pictures of this phenomenon. The final correspondence will relate their discoveries and convey thanks to Tom's River.



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
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
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
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
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
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
