Summer School

A special five weeks summer reading program is announced by Principal G. L. Dissette. The program is designed for children who will benefit from additional instruction in reading and profit by attending this reading program, which is planned to help children strengthen their reading skills, and will be taught by Mr. Dissette.

It will extend their reading to library materials and correct specific weaknesses in ready habits and encourage a liking for reading for educational and recreational purposes. Thought the program will be mainly remedial in nature, it will also be an enrichment program for those who are advancing above the average.

Registration will be held on Thursday, June 15 from 8 a.m. to 12 noon in the Sanibel Elementary School, where the classes will be held, and they will begin on Friday, June 16 and extend through Friday, July 21. Mr. Dissette will inform registrant's the time and hour when classes will be held. Late entries cannot be accepted. There will be a \$1.00 fee to cover the costs of material used, payable at time of registration.

Last year's program was well received by all concerned, and this year's promises to be as popular. In order to assure that your child will be admitted to this program it will be necessary for you to obtain an application from the school and complete it, returning it to the school no later than May 26 (Friday).



Plans For Fishing Pier

A committee from the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce is working with Lee County Commissioner Walter Shirey to have some changes made in the plans for the fishing pier which would lower the cost and might also attract local firms to bid on the job. The goal is the original \$20,000 estimate.

The county will pay half of the cost and the Chamber will try to raise the additional \$10,000 through pledges.

The county rejected the proposal to pay for the entire pier. Pledge cards are available at the Chamber building. For further information, contact either Ralph Woodring or Don Case.

Conservation Notes

1972 program for the Caretta Research project was reported to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation recently by Charles R. LeBuff, Jr., director of Caretta. "During the 1972 summer our sea turtle egg transplanting project will be expanded to bring an increased number of hatchling turtles through the critical period of incubation. At our tagging camp near Cape Romano, plans call for relocation of 50,000 loggerhead turtle eggs in a battle to ward off an anticipated 90% loss of eggs because of tremendous predator populations. Approximately another 15,000 eggs will be hatched at the Sanibel, Manasota Key and Indian Rocks Beach projects.

"Tagging of adult turtles, marking of hatchlings at Sanibel-Captiva, aerial nesting surveys, continued life history data collection, factors of nest site usurpation, rearing of young turtles in our improved holding facilities, and cooperation with the educational community in Southwest Florida are projects to be continued.

"A grant of \$1,500 from the Damroth Foundation and \$500 from Tom Mitchell has left a balance of \$1,300 to be raised. Although the Board of Directors of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has guaranteed this balance it must be realized from contributions earmarked Caretta. Won't you help? Contributions are tax deductible and should be made to the Foundation, marked 'For Caretta'."

Funds raised by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation in its campaign last winter totalled \$230,000. This is not final, since additional donations continue to come in and some pledged amounts have not yet been paid.

Major foundation grants amounted to \$100,000 of a goal of \$150,000, which constituted the biggest deficiency in the campaign. However, there are still several possibilities for additional grants, and the Foundation hopes one or two more will bring in most of the balance of the \$300,000 overall goal.

Special gifts totalled \$102,000 of the \$125,000 goal. New membership funds totalled \$21,000 from 556 individuals (368 family memberships) compared with goals of \$25,000 and 500. It is worthy of note that this was the first organized membership-fund raising campaign the Foundation has ever held. Membership now totals almost 1,600 individuals, with 1,060 family memberships, making the Foundation one of the largest local conservation groups in the State of Florida.

Mrs. George Winterbotham, chairman of the Foundation's Board and Mrs. Leigh Bair, chairman of the Membership Committee, wish to express their sincere thanks, and the apprecaition of the Foundation's Baord, to the campaign workers, to members, island residents and visitors who gave so generously.

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
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
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2ND ANNUAL ISLAND ARTS & CRAFTS SHOW ANNOUNCED

"We certainly are going to follow up on the tremendous support given to the initial effort to rally the artists and craftsmen of Sanibel and Captiva," beamed John Sallemi in an interview last week at his home in Tradewinds.

And we also hope to exceed the \$2400 donated to the Library's Building Fund last February," added his talented wife, Lena. Mrs. Sallemi has agreed to serve as his co-chairman of the 1973 Arts and Crafts Exhibition and Sale.

Jointly, they discussed the preliminary plans made for the event and revealed that the basic committee structure had just about been finalized. They expressed their appreciation for the enthusiasm shown by those asked to serve as chairmen of the several committees.

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OUTER ISLANDS FERRY SERVICE PLANS PROCEED

Interests concerned with establishing a ferry service to Cayo Costa and Upper Captiva Islands indicate plans are proceeding on schedule.

According to Arthur Arnold of Sanibel, public relations spokesman for the ferry group, preliminary inquiries regarding acquisition of a franchise has been made to pertinent county authorities

Arnold indicates that the ferry group is now considering two possible sites on Pine Island as the "originating site" for the ferry service, and that preliminary contacts in this regard have been made. Intermediate docking sites on Upper Captiva and Cayo Costs are not firmed but several sites are presently under study. In addition, according to Arnold, several optional ferry routes from Pine Island to the Outer Islands are under study and consideration. He further stated that inquiries have been made as to the availability of a suitable ferrying craft and that the ferry would be of the type capable of carrying both passengers and vehicles.

A target date for the beginning of ferry operations has not been set but interested persons can look for a firm date in subsequent news releases.







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





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

Silly me, it never occurred to me that somebody maybe wasn't wanting me to come back.




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

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WHO'S WHO ON PLANNING BOARD

Mr. MALCOLM BEATTIE, director, representing the Island Inn Association and the Palm Lake Association received his B. S. in Engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1923. He was management engineeer, Cresap, McCormick ang Paget, N.Y.; vice president for planning and vice president and general manager, South American Div., Champion Paper and Fiber Co.; president, Champion Cellulose, S.A.; president, Chamption Fiber, S.A.; vice president, Logistic Management Institute, Washington, D.C.; consultant, Secretary of Defense, Washington; president, Sanibel Library; member, Lee County Zoning Board; treasurer, Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation; Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board since 1969; retired Colonel, USA, awarded Legion of Merit.

Mr. MARIO HUTTON, director, representing the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, was born in Rome, Italy . Before coming to America, he owned and operated an art theater that toured 55 European cities. He was program manager of Radion Station WOV in New York and for 20 years was executive secretary of the Italy-America Chamber of Commerce, N.Y. He was awarded Star of Solidarity, appointed Knight Commander of Order of Merit, Republic of Italy. Served overseas in World War II. Presently, writer, lecturer, has presented photo-verse programs to National Audubon, Nature Conservancy, Wilderness Society (U.S. and Bahamas) as well as area schools. President, Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society; director, Florida Audubon and Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation; Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board since 1968.

Mr. LEONARD LE ROUX, director, representing the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce, was born in Normandy and graduated from the Sorbonne, specializing in biology, electrical and civil engineering. During World War II, he was first a tank officer, then headed a large irrigation project near Timbuctu. He joined the French Free Forces in 1942, liason to the US Air Force. The French government sent him to the U.S. in 1945 to study and spearhead industrial development of the French Colonies after which he managed the affiliate of a French firm distributing earth moving equipment in Africa. While in the U.S., he joined Cummins Engine Co. and became their European Marketing Director. After many years of living in Europe, South America and the Near East, he and his wife, Billie, discovered Sanibel and in 1969, they built and have been operating the Song of the Sea Motel.

Mr. ANDREW MELLODY, director, was an insurance broker for many years before moving to Sanibel in 1957. He was treasurer and a director of the Sanibel Improvement Association, which was instrumental in promoting legislation resulting in the Sanibel Island Planning and Zoning District in 1959. He was employed by this body as Administrator for about a year prior to 1963 when it was merged with the Lee County Planning Board by a superceding act of the legislature. He was appointed to the Lee County Zoning Board and remained until June of 1968. He served as treasurer and a director of the Sanibel-Captiva Chamber of Commerce during its early years and was active in organizing the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board on which he has served since its formation

Traveling about and around the islands, very few live shells are seen by yours truly. Maybe we don't know the right spots to look. We do so hope that is the case, and that our beautiful shells will recover from the devastation of last year's Red Tide.

McCauls has some beautifully colored Jim Beam bottles, which are now collector's items. Some very lovely lucite encased shells too are on the shelves, and some magnificent lion's paws. Maybelle Stamper, long time resident of Captiva for thirty years or so, has done some imaginative decoupage, hyrogliphics and other work on driftwood pieces. On lovely textured coconut fibers, she has pictured a bird and on another, a racoon, and these artistries are worth a visit to the shop just to see.

We had the pleasure of a sneak preview of the new development off Dixie Beach Road called Gumbo Limbo, when we visited in the lovely home of Mr. & Mrs. Bill Bunting. You may remember him as the man who went in front of the bulldozers to make sure they destroyed no trees which could be saved, even if it meant moving



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them, which he has done. He also closed up the old ditches which allowed salt water intrusion on the islands and made some lovely lakes. "The water in the lakes is brackish, a holdover from the salt ditches, and it will take about five years for the water to become fresh again, but it will, eventually," says Bunting.

"Originally, the Sanibel River was and still is, just a slough, not a true river, and in the dry season, it would dry up. However, with a little digging, you could easily reach fresh water even then, and this is what has always made Sanibel known as a place to obtain fresh water, even in pirate times," he states. He has preserved the Gumbo Limbos and the Sabal palms and as much of the original flora as possible in his new development. Both Bill and his charming wife are native Floridians.

The Robert Duggers of Tropical Village are new in some ways to our islands. They were often visitors, coming to stay here whenever they could get away from their successful dancing school in St. Louis. Mrs. Dugger taught ballet and toe dancing while Mr. Dugger taught tap, and they operated one of the largest schools in the country. Meanwhile, they pursued their hobby of ceramics, and Mr. Dugger has become a master of the one stroke technique. He won the Best of Show award in ceramics last year when he exhibited in St. Louis and was written up in Ceramics Magazine complete with picture and all and has won many other awards, too. 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


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
