Water Studies Almost Complete

The U. S. Department of the Interior has been conducting tests and water quality tabulations on Sanibel. Six geological recorders tabulating water stages in artesian wells, the water table aquifer and tide changes at Point Ybel and the Sanibel slough aquifer will continue their recordings until July, according to information received by Roy Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.

After July the network of six geological recorders will discontinue four of the recorder operations and discontinue water sampling at 50 well locations and 40 surface water locations in canals, ponds and the Sanibel Slough. Then the Dept. of the Interior will begin tabulating and evaluating the collected data, so that a complete report can be made. This is a very valuable water study of the islands, and will reveal much of interest to all.

Visitors to the Island are as welcome as residents. It's a program that will long be remembered. Tuesday, June 5, 8 p.m. at Sanibel Community House.


Help! Help!

LOGGERHEAD TURTLE PATROL

A sea turtle patrol vehicle is being used along Sanibel and Captiva beaches to rescue baby turtles. The patrol is an effort to insure the survival of the loggerhead sea turtles, and the patrol has been in progress since early this month and will continue until early AAugust.

Looking something like "Moon Rover" the sea turtle patrol vehicle is made from converted motocycle components and the program is under the direction of the Caretta Research Laboratories with Wayne Parker of the Big Cypress Nature Center in charge of the program, but islanders who are interested in the project may contact Mr. Charles LeBuff of the U. MORE ABOUT ADVERTISING SIGNS


With the removal of the Sunset South Condominium billboard on the causeway road the entrance to the island is now free of all advertising signs but for those of one development.

Of interest to prospective property owners on the islands are statements made at a recent meeting of County Commissioners James Sweeney and Kenneth Daniels with sanitarians from the Lee County Health Department.

"The individual owner of condominium units is going to have to pay when the county system comes in and they should be made aware of it right now," stated consultant Bill Thompson. Subscribers to private sewer service will be forced to lay out additional conversion money when a county sewage system in constructed, he added.

Teachers hope that all children will have a happy and safe summer holiday and return on Aug. 24 for the first day of school in the fall session.





WHO'S WHO ON PLANNING BOARD

Mr. JOSEPH McMURTRY, Advisor, received a B.S. in Landscape Architecture from Penn State University and did special studies in community planning at Carnegie-Mellon U. He was chief planner and assistant to the director in the Dept. of City Planning, Pittsburg, then became the first director of the Bureau of Advanced Planning of the Pennsylvania Highway Dept. A registered professional engineer, he was active in the passage of the Urban Redevelopment law and the Limited Access Highway Act. He served as president of Planners Associates, a private firm doing city planning, until his retirement and was a member of the American Society of Landscape Architects, Amer. Later, he was a field director with the American Red Cross, serving in New Guinea, the Admiralties, the Philippines and Japan. A good friend of the late Ding Darling, he and wife, Pintard, have operated the Captiva Island Store since 1949. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Captiva Civic Assoc., the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, and is currently on the membership committee of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation.




SANIBEL ALLIGATOR RESEARCH

Upon moving to Sanibel in 1959, Charles LeBuff began a study of Sanibel's 'gator population; movements, growth, and various other aspects of their life history. As a biologist for the Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge, Mr. LeBuff has gained much insight into the natural problems facing this reptile, and its relationship to the Island's growing human population.

He and George L. Weymouth, also of the Refuge, have joined efforts to research this unique creature even deeper. They wish to relocate all specimens endangering man (usually as the result of such practice. By year to year study of the areas of highest juvenile survival, and reasons why, also by tagging and color marking, they hope to compile new life history data and substantiate old findings by other herpetologists.

Film presentations are to be prepared to enlighten different age groups on the American alligator and its habits, its history, and past and present research being done in Florida and other areas of the U.S.



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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO THE ISLANDER:

We returned to Sanibel yesterday afternoon (Monday), completing a nice trip to Crystal River and return. We took a "shunpike" route in the middle of the state by way of Route 98, and, except for a little way on the return trip, the traffic was light but the "love bugs" were heavy. These are little black bugs that smear the windshield and everything else they hit, and to remove them we use a fine grade of steel wool and a detergent, in this case Ajax. On the return trip we got a pice of fly screen to cover the front of the car, radiator and headlights. This was the first experience we had had with the love bugs, that fly coupled.

The principle subject of the program of the Florida Nature Conservancy was the Crystal River manatee and the ecology of the area. The Paradise Inn, where we stayed, is located on King's Bay on Crystal River. There is a huge fresh water spring in the bay and this water forms the Crystal River, which flows several miles into the Gulf of Mexico, forming an estuary. The shore line is dotted with many islands on which mangrove and cabbage palms grow.

We were on three boat trips during the 2-day meeting. The first was a 2-hour trip down the Crystal River to the Gulf, passing several bird rookeries. The second was a shorter trip around King's Bay, and the third trip, on Sunday, started at Yankee town and toured the area around Gulf Hammock. All trips were taken in small boats carrying 6 passengers each. The boats were furnished by local residents or Coast Guard personnel.

The Crystal River is threatened by developers who wish to build high rises and houses on the nearby islands to be connected by a causeway. The program of The Nature Conservancy is to secure control of these islands ahead of the developers. We fear pollution of the river and spring and the extinction of the fresh water manatee that live here. A local committee is working hard to prevent this pollution by buying the islands in the area. This committee has secured almost 100 new members for TNC in recent months.

The manatee is a huge animal that eats water hyacinths, which is a noxious weed that clogs rivers and the owners of power boats do not like the weeds. However, we learned that the propellers of power boats often injure the manatee, so that raises another problem. On the way back we drove south on

US 19 and found out that because of congestion at Disney World, no eastbound traffic was allowed until we got as far south as Clearwater. There we turned east on route 60 and spent the night ab Babson Park with an old Audubon friend of ours. All in all we had a very pleasant trip.

The fall conference of the Florida Chapter of Nature Conservancy will be held on Sanibel Nov. 17-19 at Island Inn. Mark the date.

No one had informed us of the lack of police protection during the early morning hours, but our assailant knew.

Good people of Sanibel, no one will be safe until this man is found. Apparently, he is familiar with the island and the next victim may not be as fortunate. At least, I am able to write this letter.

My dreadful experience will take many years to erase. What happened to me could happen to anyone on that island. I want to return to Sanibel more than anything else in the world. It will take great courage to make the next trip. We have purchased a condominium and had such great plans. Sanibel should be one of the safest places in Florida.




RAISING TOMATOES ON SANIBEL ISLAND by W. B.-Combs

Hope springs eternal in the human breast! Could be a good sub-title for this article. Last November at the Garden Center in Fort Myers they were selling tomatoes in baskets filled with woodchips for about a dollar and a half with the tomato plant already started in the center, but for a dollar and a half more you could buy one that had small tomatoes already started, and we got the more expensive one. Opal nourished it carefully during the winter putting a half gallon of water in the evening and a doze of plant food in the morning. Seven or eight small tomatoes ripened, then the plant gave up and died.

However, we planted some seed of the Big Boy variety in the ground and while most of these plants failed to survive, there were about a half dozen that grew slowly and we are now harvesting the crop. As fast as a tomato began to ripen, a bird was there to sample it. I hung up a tin disc that would swing in the wind, but this did not seem to deter the birds. Then we called on Petunia to help. Petunia is our little stuffed skunk. We placed Petunia near the vines, and also covered some of the remaining tomatoes with cellophane bags. Our prize tomato was picked yesterday and measured 4[inches across and 13 inches in circumference. In all. our crop may amount to one-half bushel.

The Fort Myers News-Press carried an ad for vine-ripe staked tomatoes for \$2.50 per bushel, 3 miles north of Fort Myers on State Road 31, pick your own, bring container. However, to this should be added a bridge toll of \$3 and 90 miles of driving, so all things considered it was probably just as cheap to raise our own and think of the fun and exercise we had in doing it.





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

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


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
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
