

Bridge And Causeway In "Good Condition"

The engineering firm of Ford, Bacon and Davis reported on Wednesday to the County Commission that from an engineering standpoint, the Sanibel bridge and causeway is in good condition in general maintenance and that the operation is "staffed with pleasant, dedicated personnel."

Robert O. Vernon, director of the State Division of Interior Resources, directed a letter to the commissioners asking that they consider an additional budget of \$6,000. Vernon stated that the State Dept. of Natural Resources will not be able to contribute to a study of the water resources of Lee County for the fiscall year of 1972-73, and suggested that the commission provide the money for the continuance of the U. S. Geological Survey with water resources study coordinated with it. The County Commissioners are studying this proposal to continue county water resources



New Erosion Device

The Captiva Erosion Prevention District, headed by Paul Stahlin, is studying a plan for a device to prevent beach erosion. The plan was submitted to Stahlin by aeronautical enginner Arthur Whaley, who invented the device.

He at first told the County Commissioners of the device who referred him to the Captiva District, thinking they might be interested in testing the device, at a cost of \$5,000, but if it is successful, \$5,000 for 500 feet is a fair price if the triangular shaped gizmo will actually prevent beach erosion.

New Refuge Ass't. Manager

Glenn A. Carowan, Jr. arrived on the Island June 1, to become the new assistant manager at the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge. Glenn is a native of Pantego, N.C. He received a B.S. degree in Wildlife Management from North Carolina State University at Raleigh, where he was a member of Alpha Zeta, Ag. and Life Science Honorary Fraternity, and Farm House, Social Fraternity.

His career with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service began in 1971 at Mattamuskett N.W.R. in North Carolina, where he was a student trainee. This is his first assignment to permanent duty. Glenn is single, and is currently residing at the old Dewey's Marina on Tarpon Bay.

Conservation Foundation Notes

Nathaniel P. Reed, Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks, U. S. Department of the Interior, has written the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation regarding the interest of the federal government in the preservation of the Sanibel River and the Sanibel fresh water wetlands.


"The Department of the Interior has a very real interest in the ecological preservation and the wildlife enhancement aspects of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation project areas. Our investment in the J. N. Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge and the Department's broader concern for maintaining a healthy and viable environment for all Americans necessitate positive input from us wherever practical and when within our authorities.

"I am very much interested in the success of your project and will certainly be alert to assist you wherever I can," Secretary Reed stated.

Efforts to maintain the network of wells and recorders established on Sanibel by the U. S. Geological Survey to study and monitor its unique fresh water system have been initated by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, with the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board cooperating.

The network includes three water stage recorders on artesian wells, one recorder on the water table aquifer, one recorder on the Sanibel River, one recorder reflecting tide changes at Point Ybel, approximately 50 weels, both water table and artesian aquifers, and 40 locations in ponds, cnaals, and in the Sanibel River for obtaining chloride concentrations. Data collected from this network during the last year will be evaluated and reported to the Lee County Commissioners before the end of the calendar year, but the network itself may be discontinued unless funds are provided to maintain it effectively another year.

The current hydrological study of Sanibel's fresh water environment is conducted under a cooperative agreement with the Lee County Commissioners, with funds provided by the county, State of Florida, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and the U. S. Department of the Interior.



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
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

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


COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION MEETS
