Tornado Hit Sanibel Sunday


At least one tornado spun off Agnes, the first hurricane of the year, and hit down on Sanibel's Town Square, completely demolishing Serendipity Aniques, Jeanne's Snack Shack and the Island Travel Agency. The shopping center directly across Periwinkle Way, which houses Laughrey & Holtz Real Estate, Dotti of Sanibel, the Tender Touch, Jade Butterfly and the Shop suffered little damage --- shops with windows facing south had windows blown out. No windows, to our knowledge, were damaged on the Periwinkle Way side.

The Sanibel Community Church had portions of its roof blown off, and Ralph Woodring's front porch was demolished. (The tornado then lifted up and went on to Pine Island, where it destroyed three mobile homes, with no fatalities.)

"My Lord," said Dotti McQuade, whose husband owned Serendipity, "I can only say I'm glad it was on Sunday and that no one was hurt. Can you imagine the number of injuries or deaths which might have happened on Friday or Saturday? The fact that there were no injuries makes it a little easier to bear -- though I must confess I wanted to cry when I saw what had happened.

'Everyone was wonderful --- they helped salvage things from the wreckage and stored them across the street --- everyone helped, even strangers. It's something like this that makes you realize. . . " she trailed off.

We were not able to speak with Jeanne Hopwood of the Snack Shack, or with



the John Reynolds of the Island Travel Agency --- but the Snack Shack had absolutely no insurance, and, as we said, was completely wiped out. Funds are being collected to help replace the equipment and building through the San Carlos Realty office --- and we imagine, a donation for the church roof would not be amiss.

We also had reports that a condominium on Sanibel, still in construction was damaged. Phones and information were still unreliable at press time, so all we can do is report that neither Sundial nor Sunset South were damaged.


Also at press time, too late to get any pictures, we received reports that Captiva sustained extensive damage --- that Blind Pass was now open (we assume that the Pass was again out through Turner Park) and that some gulf front structures (and probably the road --- again) were damaged. We will have a more complete report and pictures on that Island for you next


We realize that most of our readers on the Islands know all of these facts --- this information is primarily for our off-island readers who perhaps might be worried about what they've read in their local papers. As far as we know, although the gulf tides were extremely high, there was little if any gulf front damage on Sanibel. And, as we said, reports aren't in about Captiva yet, but only heard definitely about Blind Pass being re-opened.

As for Agnes, she went directly north about 200 miles off the coast, and, except for the tornado, heavy rains, and a few palm fronds and signs down, more or less left us alone.

Thank goodness, these flags were flown instead of the other ones. These designate gale warnings "the other ones" are the dreaded square hurricane warnings.



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





The damage to the roof of Sanibel's oldest church, The Sanibel Community Church, located directly in back of the demolished Town Square.





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WATER RATE INCREASE DOWNED

The Pine Island Water Association's members voted against a request for a water rate increase to finanace the building of a desalination plant on Pine Island, according to president of the Association, Henry Nowak. In secret ballot on Monday, the increase was voted down 141 to 24, and the meeting was adjourned just before 10 p.m. Absentee ballots tallied 491 against the increase with only 24 in favor of it.

The vote followed a request by the Association's board of directors for an increase to pay for a loan from the Farmer's Home Administration for construction of the desalination plant, which was recommended in turn by Duane Hall and Associates, engineering consultants, who felt the plant would take care of the salt intrusion problem. Bill Thompson of Duane Hall thought the state would probably step in and prevent any additional hookups for water until the situation could be straightened out.

A tape recorder was played at the opening of the meeting clearing any employees of any devious operations in water stoppages or other wrongs. But employees Ted Fleck and Pat Casey remain on forced vacation until the board takes

The proposed rate increase called for a minimum charge of \$10 a month for private users for the first 5,000 gallons and \$1 for each additional 1,000 gallons with a \$4 per unit surcharge on hookups for motels and mobile parks. The present rates are \$6 for 7,000 gallons plus 65 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons. Mr. Nowak commented that "We directors were elected by the membership for one purpose; to serve the people. The people are our bosses.'

NEW FISHING LICENSES ON SALE

Fresh water fishing licenses for 1972-73 are on sale at the office of all County Judges or Tax Collectors and authorized license agents, according to an announcement by the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

Commission Director, Dr. O. E. Frye, said, "The new fishing license will be honored by wildlife officers starting June 15. The new license will be valid through June 30, 1973."

Sportsmen are also reminded that they may purchase a combination hunting and fishing license that will allow statewide hunting and fishing throughout the 1972-73 season.

Frye said, "Buying a license now may prevent embarrassment at a later date when a sportsman may decide on a sudden trip and find he has no license."

COMMISSION TURNS DOWN STATE REQUEST

In a report to the Lee County Commission, Randolph Hodges, executive director of Department of Natural Resources, suggested that "prior to the issuance of any county building permits for construction along your beaches, it may be desirable to have plans and specifications reviewed by the staff of the Department of Natural Resources for the purpose of determining the effects of the proposed construction on the stability of the beaches and dunes. It may also be desirable to have plans and specifications reviewed by the staff of the trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund to determine possible encroachment on sovereignty lands." Chairman Kenneth Daniels dismissed this suggestion as superfluous.


EXCESS WATER COST INCREASED

By resolution, the Board of Directors of the Island Water Association, Inc., at their regular meeting on June 15, adopted the following:


1) In accordance with the amortization conditions of the loan approved by the Farmer's Home Administration, the Association agreed to increase the water rate for excess usage above the 7,000 gallons monthly minimum from the present 75 cents per 1,000 gallons to \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons. This new rate schedule will become effective July 1, 1972 and will be reflected in billings received Aug. 1, 1972.

z) All applications for future service connections to the present system must be approved by the Board of Directors, at a regular or special meeting. The Board's regular meeting is a 9:30 a.m. on the third Thursday of each month. Applications will be received at the Association's office throughout the month and considered at the next Board meeting.

The Board also received a progress report from the Association's recently appointed rate study committee. This report indicated that the committee was fully organized and the members now actively working on their individual assignments. The members of this committee are: Byron Kirby, chairman; Bernard LeRoux, James Robson, Charles Werkheiser, and John Willard.

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\$676,000 Condominium STARTED ON SANIBEL

A new 170-unit condominium complex on almost 10 acres of prime Sanibel Island property fronting on the Gulf of Mexico was started last week with the issuance of a building permit from the Lee County Building Department. The permit was issued for the first 68 units in Loggerhead Cay Condominiums located on Old Bailey Road.

The permit, for \$676,000 worth of basic construction, was the leading one issued during the past week in Lee County. The countywide new building total reached \$1,948,769 for 137

permits issued by the County building department, the Fort Myers Building Dept. and the Cape Coral Building Dept.

The Loggerhead Cay project was listed by the county building department as a four-story project, but only parts of the building will reach a maximum height of 34 feet 10½ inches. There is a height limitation on Sanibel Island restricting buildings to no more than 35 feet tall.

The permit for the construction of the Loggerhead project was issued to Sanibel Association, Ltd., which was also listed as the general contractor.

The construction of the project will be of reinforced concrete but many

exterior wall areas have been slated for covering by wood panels to provide warmth in the general appearance. Apartments, all two-bedroom, two-bath units with dining rooms, living rooms and screened balconies, will follow a contemporary design.

In a landscaped center courtyard there will be a swimming pool and other recreational ammenties located in another area will include tennis courts and a children's play area.

STATE POLLUTION CONTROL LETTER

A letter from the State Dept. of

Pollution Control was read at the Wednesday meeting of the Lee County Commissioners offering the county a contract for the handling of sewage disposal problems in regards to sanitation rules, by a local firm. Under this proposed plan, the county would receive \$20,816 to supply the manpower and office space for regulating septic tanks and sewage treatment facilities. Mrs. Lavon Wisher was asked to consider and study the proposal to decide whether the state money would cover the salaries and other expenses involved.

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
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
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
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BROWSING AROUND by fran o'callaghan

Iva Lee Dugger won another award on Friday when the National Hibiscus Society held its annual convention at the Sheraton Inn in Fort Myers. This award goes into a cabinet full of awards won by the Robert Duggers at various ceramics shows, which are on display in their new shop on Gulf Drive, but this one was for china painted earrings in a new category of arts and crafts displayed at the Hibiscus Society's Convention. And they have all kinds of ceramics on display, but the choir boy with the candles and music box is truly a favorite suitable for many occasions. "Cookie" and Bob invite you to come in and browse around, or join their new classes to learn all the secrets they know about this ancient art.

The Herb Purdys invited us in for a cup of coffee and a view of their lovely home, which is furnished and airily decorated in white rattan and wicker, making it a real island house. The lanai looks out on a captured part of the Sanibel River, where a million birds go about their daily life, singing all the day, and another million fish feed and jump in the waters of the river in their subdivision called Sanibel Lake Estates. Herb has spent much time and effort in trying to maintain the freshness of the river, while other developers built canals to the Gulf permitting the salt water to intrude and pollute all the fresh water areas around. When this happened, all the fresh water plants and fish died, and the more that died, the less oxygen there was in the water to sustain any life at all. Finally, after damming up the river, he has been able to produce a lake that will sustain bluegills and bass, but all the fish are fairly small, as it will take a long time for the water to become truly fresh. "And right now the water level is low. We need the rainy season to come and freshen and renew the

And along with all this natural beauty, he has built a native type swinging foot bridge across the river, which at this point is a 75 foot span. The bridge is sturdily built with cables capable of holding a four ton weight and cables attached to foot posts sunk in four feet of concrete. The bridge leads over to a piece of wild land with leather ferns and trees with Spanish moss hanging down. Wild orchids festoon the trees, and an occasional banana or coconut accent the wildness of a small woodland pool with tiny tropical fish in it. Herb says the fish keep the mosquitoe larvae under control, and it must be true, for we were not bothered by them at all.

Sanibel Lake Estates goes off Periwinkle Drive and originally encompassed 49 lots, most of which have been sold, and there are some lovely new homes in the Estates, surrounded by the wilderness for which Sanibel is noted.

And on another theme, if you are looking for some fun and food, in a happy mood, do go down to Scotty's sing-along on Friday evening. Everybody lets their hair down and joins in the spirit of music and merry making. So informal is the group, many bring along their own instruments and play and sing. "And if you can't do either, then you can dance or just be an enthusiastic watcher," says Scotty

There is a new and colorful look at Priscilla Murphy's in both the offices. A portion of the main office is being remodeled with two additional office spaces and new carpeting in it and in the branch office. Green shag is the new soft look and foot touch, a color most appropriate for our beautiful green islands.

The strangely beautiful tree outside the Red Pelican Shop on Tarpon Bay is in bloom. There are no leaves on this exotic tree, and clusters of tiny white sweet pea blossoms festoon its branches. So far we have been unable to learn anything about this gorgeous tree, which will have compound leaves later on with a grayish green color. It appears to be an old tree, with gnarled old grey bark, and the Edmondsons have sprayed it to protect it from insects. But it remains a mystery as to where it came from, and what kind of tree it is. And there are other exotic trees in the area also. A Geiger tree, with its flame orange blossoms, is thriving in the area in bloom now. This tree is named for a Capt. Geiger who brought the tree from Asia to Key West, where it flourishes. Birds have carried the seeds all over Southwest Florida, and propaged the tree, considered a rarity in botanical circles. And no wonder, for the seeds smell like apples and have small seeds which sprout readily with little attention

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CONSERVATION FOUNDATION NEWS

Attending the summer meeting of ECOSWF (Environmental Confederation of South West Florida) in Port Charlotte Monday, June 19, were Mario Hutton, President of the Sanibel-Captiva Audubon Society, Vernon MacKenzie, President of the Sanibel-Captiva Planning Board and Roy Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Conservation Foundation.

The meeting was primarily concerned with working on the completion of the first Environmental Inventory of the five southwest counties included in the regional organization's geographical area, and the adoption of by-laws preparatory to incorporation of the group. The environmental legislation passed by the last legislature was reviewed, and a committee will work on changes to propose for the next session to assure that environmental interests in the region will have a strong voice in the planning process.

ECOSWF was created at a workshop conference on Sanibel in January 1970, after almost a year of exploratory talks initiated by Joel Kuperberg and Roy Bazire. That conference and a highly successful regional planning conference held last January at Edison Junior College were both hosted by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation. The Foundation, as a public service, has borne all organizing expenses of the regional group. ECOSWF started with 13 conservation organizations and now includes more than 50 conservation and environmentally concerned organizations.

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
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MEETING OF CONSERVATION CLEARINGHOUSE

At a meeting of members of the Southwest Florida Conservation Clearinghouse on Wednesday, where the proposed county park along the Bonita-Fort Myers Beach Causeway was discussed, Roy Bazire attended representing the Islanders.

Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Society said that for personal reasons, he would hate to see the proposed park, with recreational facilities and community activities in a natural park setting, because of the impact on the natural environment. He said, "There is no doubt that you have to provide some place for people to go but it must be controlled and supported properly. I think this park could produce a possible economic catastrophe with a heavy financial investment and not enough money to amintain it. It could become a park ghetto. I think this might require some re-education of the public as far as public use of lands is concerned.'

But the meeting ended on a happy note with Bradford Patton, chairman of the Clearinghouse stating, "I think it's a very fine idea, and I hope there will be some dialogue on it. This is something the Beach and the county needs.'

There are no plans for dredging in the Gulf park, and very little fill will need to be brought in. There will be no vehicular traffic on the beach area and a sanitary sewer system will be installed.

The County Commission approved the concept of the park plan and directed the Parks Committee to proceed with it.

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
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
