
Aluminum Cans

A study was made of the empty cans picked up at the high tide line on Sanibel's Gulf beach at The Rocks following a weekend holiday.

They were all aluminum and bore the words, "Please do not litter" stamped on each can. About one-third of the cans were Budweiser, one-fourth, Old Milwaukee and the remainder about evenly divided between Busch, Pabst and root beer.

These metal cans are a source of danger for months to barefoot shellers and bathers who visit the island.

How nice it would be if something could be done to encourage our visitors, and all who fish and picnic, to take the empties away with them when they leave. No one would willingly cause a serious cut from a half-buried can in the sand. Few people will agree with one visitor responsible for throwing a can away who said, when spoken to, "I pay taxes, let them pick it up."



New Hours For Fire Dept.

Chief Allen Nave of the Sanibel Fire Dept. announced new hours for application for burning permits which will only be granted if the calls to 472-1414 are made between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Reports for fires or rescue calls also between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. will be made to the same number. No permits for burning will be given except between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Fire to be reported before 8 a.m. or after 4 p.m. can use the regular number, 472-1717, to be used only for fire or rescue calls after hours.

There will also be regular meetings of the Sanibel Fire and Rescue Squads on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month at the little Sanibel Fire House on Palm Ave. Fire and Rescue officers are Allen Nave, Chief; Preston Woodring, Assistant Chief; Marty Holtz, Chief of Rescue Squad; Permanent Fire Captain, Phil Verdung.

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SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION NEWS

A donation of \$10,000 to land acquisition for the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands project was made to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation recently by the Alice M. O'Brien Foundation of St. Paul, Minn., of which Captiva winter resident, Mr. Terence G. O'Brien, is president.

This brings land donations from the O'Brien Foundation over the last three years to \$25,000. In addition, the O'Brien Foundation made gifts to the former J. N. Ding Darling Memorial Committee, predecessor of the local Foundation, of more than \$15,000. A number of improvements in the Refuge including the Alice M. O'Brien Bird Tower were constructed and paid for by the Memorial Committee from these funds.

A grant of \$5,000 from the O'Brien Foundation in 1967 made possible the organization of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, its first Annual Conservation Conference in January of 1968, and a feasibility survey and comprehensive plan for a Nature Center, made by National Audubon Society in 1967-68.

In recognition of the invaluable assistance given since 1962 by the O'Brien Foundation, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation will designate a tract of the Sanibel Fresh Water Wetlands Refuge as the "Alice M. O'Brien Tract."

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
A contribution of \$3,000 to the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation has been made by The Scherman Foundation of New York, N.Y. The gift is unrestricted for general usage.

This is the third year The Scherman Foundation has assisted the island organization, with annual donations increasing each year.

Mr. Axel G. Rosin is president of the New York organization and he and Mrs. Rosin are regular winter visitors to Sanibel. Mrs. Rosin (Katherine Scherman) is the author of the book, "Two Islands," published last year which describes Sanibel as one of her two favorite islands.



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ARCHEOLOGIST VISITING SANIBEL

Mrs. Marjorie Wheatley of Wey Bridge, Surrey, England, is presently visiting with Genevieve McCain and Marion Watson of Yachtsman Drive. Mrs. Wheatley is the aunt of Dennis Wheatley, a well known English author.

She is truly a world traveler. Five years ago, she was a member of the first party of English tourists to visit China, going as far north as the great wall. On the return journey, the party visited Cambodia to see Angor Wat, then on to Bangkok and finally to Delhi and Accra to see the Taj Mahal.


SANIBEL SALES

Other sales included the Mariner Group to Marvin C. Amos, two apartments, Sanibel Moorings Condominium, \$63,800.


