
Canals Halted

Circuit Court Judge Thomas Shands ruled that Jamestown-Beachview Developers on Sanibel cannot dig any more canals and may even have to have present ones dug by them filled in, if salt water intrusion on the island can be traced to them.

The suit was brought by the state against the developers, and Shands has issued an order that a survey team composed of a representative of the Geological Survey, U. S. Dept. of the Interior, and Dr. H. K. Brooks of the University of Florida' monitor the canal system to decide if existing canals are causing permanent salt water intrusion. Shands further ordered that Jamestown-Beachview shall dig no further canals, ditches or other excavations upon its property on Sanibel unless the survey team determines from test borings that such canals, ditches or other excavations can be dug or maintained without breaking the fresh water seal or introducing significant salt water intrusion into the fresh water table.

A canal which is a source of continued salt water intrusion will have to be filled in, said Shands.

If after a year, the survey team decides the canals are not causing any salt water intrusion, then the system may be connected to the Sanibel River. Jamestown-Beachview has been ordered to pay \$2,000 for the year's expense for the team, and each party will assume his own individual court costs. Conservationists have been working to prevent the salt water intrusion into the Sanibel River since June 1970.



New Firemen

Chief Allen Nave of the Sanibel Fire Department welcomes six young and vigorous men to the Fire Department. The Fire Department holds meetings on the second and fourth Thursdays at 8 p.m. at the new Palm Ridge Road Firehouse.

Phil MacDonald is on call daily for routine fire calls and may be reached at 472-1414, and he asks that the emergency number 472-1717 be used only in true emergencies, and at nights. "When the 1717 number is dialed, 14 phones are activated, and usually needlessly. For example, if a person is seeking information only about the Fire Department or the Sheriff's Department, it is not necessary that these 14 phones be rung, but of course in case of a real emergency this number will be used."

Chief Allen Nave also wishes to remind all that the Rescue Unit is not an ambulance service per se. "When the Unit is asked to act in this capacity to take a person to the hospital, both Sanibel and Captiva are left without rescue coverage, as there is only one rescue van," says Nave. Whenever possible he suggests ambulance service from Fort Myers be used in order that the rescue van can remain at the ready on the Island for a real emergency.

Agnes Was A Wet Blanket

Tropical storm Agnes, which caused the disastrous flood on Sanibel and high tides and flooding on Captiva, has been described as one of the greatest rainmakers in years, but there must be an easier way. Agnes left more than 100 people dead in her rampage through five seaboard states and dumped 28.1 trillion gallons of water on New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey and Virginia, according to the National Hurricane Center.

The biggest previous storm was Camille which caused flooding in Virginia in 1969, not to mention the damage to Louisiana and Mississippi, done by this fatal lady. Agnes flooded first Cuba, then Florida, spawning tornadoes, and then poured deluges of rain on Georgia and North and South Carolina, before causing all the flooding in the northern seaboard states.

Beginning as a tropical depression over Yucatan, it became a tropical storm while moving out to sea, and then it reached hurricane force as it crossed the Gulf of Mexico, with only the fringe winds hitting the Florida Gulf Coast, but the brunt being borne by the panhandle. It weakened to a tropical storm again as it crossed land areas, but dumped tons of rain on all. You can imagine what would happen to New York City, say, if 200 mile an hour winds were to strike it as they have here,

NEW INDUSTRY: FRESH WATER SHRIMP

A new industry is being started in Florida. The raising of fresh water shrimp, which weigh up to one pound each, and they will live in any fresh water stream or canal which empties into salt water along Florida's coasts. The shrimp are territorial rather than gregarious by nature, and adults will guard their water territories with ferocity.


The adult shrimp inhabit only the fresh water part of the stream, but during the breeding and spawning time they move to the periphery where salt and fresh water meet. When the eggs hatch, the larvae move into the brackish water and stay there until they become juveniles of about an inch and a half long. Then they move into fresh water parts of the stream and begin the cycle all over again. That is, unless they become a delectable entree on someone's plate.

Many believe the fresh water shrimp tastes like crabmeat, and of course, they are larger and tender with low cholesterol and no iodine taste and less allergens. The shrimp can grow as large as 3 lbs. but are not as edible and tender. What makes them so amazing is that unlike salt water shrimp, they can and are grown in captivity. A Vero Beach project of the Jacksonville University is in full swing, and this first year's crop will run between 4 and 5 million shrimp.

Shrimp has been raised and marketed successfully for years in Hawaii, that is, the fresh water variety,

which looks somewhat like a small lobster, with claws.

LICENSE TAGS ON SALE



ENVIRONMENTAL WORKSHOP



HURRICANE AGNES IS GONE **BUT NOT FORGOTTEN**

Two federal relief agencies are working to alleviate the disaster caused by hurricane Agnes. Mrs. Luella Mullens, manager of the unemployment compensation division of the State Department of Commerce said that 14 Florida Counties will be receiving a total of \$200,000 in unemployment benefits for people left jobless by the storm.

The Farmers Home Administration will give emergency credit to residents whose homes were damaged by the storm, according to Claude L. Greene. State director of the agency. Payments of both principal and interest on emergency housing may be deferred up to three years.

Applications for local emergency loans may be made at the Farmers Home Administration office, Room 201, Federal Bldg., Fort Myers, or you may call 334-8761.

Other results of the hurricane have induced the speeded up production of hurricane flood zone maps by the Florida Coastal Coordinating Council, and the Lee County Commissioners approved application for \$172,000 in federal funds to help in beach erosion repairs caused by the hurricane.
