Ralph Woodring, chairman of the Fishing Pier project for the Chamber of Commerce, reports that revised specifications have been sent to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Regional office in Atlanta, Ga., and returned by them with their sanction and approval. And now the County Commissioners have received them also, and hopefully will have the building of the new pier out for bids this week.

The pier is to be built for approximately \$20,000, \$10,000 of which is to be subscribed by the islands. Anyone wishing to donate any sum of money to this cause or to pledge a sum will be welcomed with open arms by Mr. Don Case, Harbor House Restaurant, Ralph Woodring of the Bait Box, or the Chamber of Commerce.

So Mrs. Arthur Perry has escorted them on a tour of the islands in her station wagon (with a goodly supply of Kool Aid) while they walked toting large plastic bags and filling them with bottles, cans and other refuse strewn by thoughtless people, who are anything but ecology minded. 
He would accept no more than a thank you for what otherwise would have cost many dollars and much inconvenience. It is invaluable people who are willing to volunteer their services.

The News Press failed to report that the July 26 Commissioners meeting was probably the most improperly conducted public hearing ever. Chairman Daniels held the gavel but was not really in charge --- the attorney for the developers was --- a man Mr. Shirey called Art. The Commissioners heard mostly each other, in a caucus insisted upon by Mr. Shirey who remarked that since he had received "more than a hundred letters from experts and everybody," he already knew what people thought. For about 11/2 hours they worked over quickie plan No. 3 after which they heard the proponents of the Adley Plan, by then a carcass picked clean.

The room was packed with at least 300 people, about 250 of whom strongly favored the public-funded Adley Plan, a low rise, low density approach to safeguard Lee County's beaches. Despite this and the recommendations of environmental and planning experts, our elected officials seemed more concerned with satisfying the developers. As his last act of public service, Mr. Scott urged haste in granting building permits in order that construction might proceed on projects to be built on the Gulf beaches to the damaging density of 30 units per acre.

Obviously, we need more, not less, help from Tallahassee and must find ways to get it. Also, I would point out that financial backers cannot put a candidate in office, only the voters can. In my opinion, Commissioners Scott and Sweeney, running for the U. S. House of Representatives and the County Commission, respectively, far over-reach themselves. I recommend a write-in vote - for dogcatcher.

#### WHALE KILLING BAN

#### HUMERUS-LY SPEAKING

Conservationists won a victory in the Senate when it voted to place a 15 year ban on the killing and importing of whales, sea otter, dolphins, and other sea mammals. The bill was approved by 88 to 2 vote, and sponsors say it is a middle course between conservationists and commercial interests, who fear a permanent ban would hurt the fishing industry and other occupations, particularly in Alaska and the Pacific Northwest.

As passed, the bill will give the Secretary of Commerce authority to issue permits for scientific and commercial fishing purposes, and exempts Alaska's Eskimos. The tuna industry is also exempt from the first two years of the 15 year moratorium, so that tuna fishermen can find a way to catch tuna without endangering the porpoises.






#### MUSICAL WORSHIP SERVICE WILL BE HELD AT SANIBEL

#### SANIBEL-CAPTIVA CONSERVATION FOUNDATION

Attending the summer conference of the Florida Chapter of the Nature Conservancy at Mowey-in-the-Mills August 11 through 13 are Mr. & Mrs. Willis Combs and Mr. Roy Bazire.

The next meeting of the state conservation organization will be held on Sanibel, November 17 through 19 at Island Inn. The Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation will host the affair.

#### **CONSERVATION FOUNDATION NEWS**

An environmental inventory of Southwest Florida will be completed and disseminated throughout the area under terms of an \$11,000 federal grant to be administered by the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation through the Environmental Confederation of Southwest Florida (ECOSWF).

The Sanibel group was chosen since it provided funds over the last two years for the organization of ECOSWF, a coalition of almost 50 environmentally concerned groups in Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Manatee and Sarasota counties. The regional effort was first proposed by Roy Bazire, executive director of the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation and Joel Kuperberg, then executive director of the Collier County Conservancy and now executive director of Florida's Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund.

Funds from the pioneering grant which will be a national pilot project, will be used to develop an environmental index for the five southwest counties; to train leaders in the area and other regions in the State in the compilation and use of the index; to document the proceedings of the January conference held by ECOSWF at Edison Junior College which first proposed an Environmental Index for the area; and to make publication of the Index an annual tool as a basic aid in long-range planning. The grant was made by the U.S. Office of Environmental Education.

#### HURRICANE MEETING GREAT SUCCESS

Over 200 attended the Sanibel Community Association meeting Tuesday night, August 1, to hear Colonel Turon discuss hurricanes.

Col. I. J. Turon, head of Civil Defense for Lee Defense started his talk by reviewing the hurricanes that have hit this area over the past 100 years.

The first storm on record was in 1873; the center hit Punta Gorda with a tide of 14 feet.

The next storm was 1910. It came up from the Keys and the center hit Marco Island. The tide was 9 feet.

In 1921 the Islands were hit again with another 9 foot tide; the center of that storm hit just above Tampa.

In 1926 a storm crossed the state from Miami with the center hitting around Marco Islands and there was a 14 foot tide. 1944 brought another 9 foot tide and this one hit around Sarasota.

In all of the above storms not only were the Islands of Sanibel and Captiva covered, but Cape Coral, Fort Myers Beach, and parts of Fort Myers itself.


For contrast "Donna" which hit the Island in 1960 brought with it a tide of just 4 to 5 feet.

To show the intensity and strength of hurricanes and the damage they can cause the Colonel showed a movie of Camille and the destruction it caused. This in itself was a warning to the people present, in case of a hurricane to please leave the Islands.

The Colonel ended his talk by reviewing a specially prepared list of "What to do Prior To, and the Day the Storm Warning is Given."

At this same meeting the Association paid special tribute to all of the Volunteer Firemen on Sanibel and their wives for the fine work they are doing and their devotion to duty. As a token of the Association's appreciation, which was a complete surprise to the firemen, Duane White, president of the Association, presented Alan Nave, Fire Chief with a check for \$200 dollars with which the men could get jump suits and all weather gear.



#### **BAKED PAPAYA**

Papayas are truly a tropical fruit, often referred to as the melon which grows on a tree, and they know no season, being "in" all the time in our climate. Most people are used to eating the ripe fruit as is or with a squeeze of lime or lemon over it, but there are other ways of using them. Mixed with fruit cocktail, they are a delicious and exotic addition to it, and the green fruit can be cooked, seasoned and eaten as a good substitute for squash. Also, the green fruit can be used as any other fruit used for preserves, and it is delicious with a little preserved ginger and sugar or a handfull of raisins. Wrap meat in leaves for a tenderizer. Here is a recipe from the Virgin Isles, where the fruit is a staple of the diet:







Cut papaya lengthwise, scoop out and leave shell 1/2 inch thick. Dice pulp. Saute onions, peppers, garlic and tomatoes in a skillet, add chopped meat and chili peppers or pepper, plus the rice and cook all for 5 minutes. Then add chicken or beef stock and simmer five more minutes. Add diced papaya and stuff in shell, topped with Parmesan cheese. Bake 15 minutes at 350.
